We quote— "Creameries that continue to accept second grade, or even "Liner" first grade, Cream and pay for it as first grade, are maintaining an almost insurmountable obstacle in the way of quality improvement. It may well seem hard-boiled and undesirable to the producer to have Cream that is even questionable put down in a lower grade and paid for as such, or else refused, but in the long range, Cream shippers who persistently produce a poor quality are doing themselves little good and are a tremendous detriment to the industry. 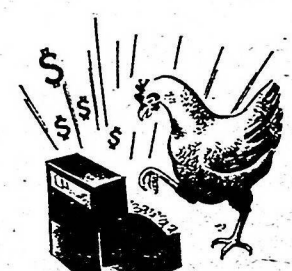
