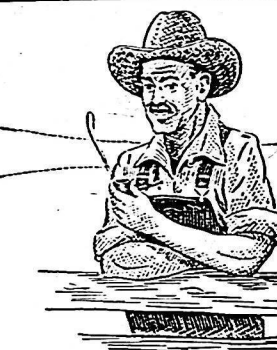

Ford Forty-Niner On Display

Just completed, the modern new garage on Main St. of York Bros. will be officially opened on Friday evening, at 8 o'clock. All the citizens of Markdale and the district are invited to attend the opening, which will feature dancing to Russell Hill's orchestra and old-time fiddlers. The 1949 Ford will be on display, also Ford tractors.

The new garage is considered to be one of the finest in this part of Ontario. It is a fireproof building of cement block and steel, with a floor of 50 feet wide and 100 feet long. It contains an office, a showroom, and a garage workshop.

Fluorescent lighting has been installed throughout the building. The showrooms are a cream color, with natural wood trim and a blue ceiling. The showroom has large windows. There is an asphalt tile floor in the showroom and on the garage part is all white with a blue wainscoting. Rest rooms for men and women are provided in the building.

The garage has two hoists as part of its latest equipment and the service of cars, trucks, and tractors. Modern lubrication equipment is also featured.

In a basement under part of the building there is a forced-air heating system, which will provide for air conditioning in winter and summer.

York Bros. have been in business in Markdale since 1939. The two brothers, Stan and Pat, were raised in Markdale. Both take an active part in the community's activities. They have the agency for Ford and Monarch cars and trucks, Ford tractors and farm machinery, they also handle Imperial Oil Company products, and Firestone tires, as well as accessories needed by motorists, truckers, and tractor owners. With their garage, they also provide welding service.

Lloyd Lyons and his son, Laverne Lyons are on the garage's staff. Howard York, son of Mr. and Mrs. Pat York, was with the garage for a couple of years, leaving to go with the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission in Toronto. Bud York, son of Mr. and Mrs. Stan York, spends his summers at the garage. He leaves on Monday to return to Queen's University, Kingston, where he is specializing in mathematics and physics.

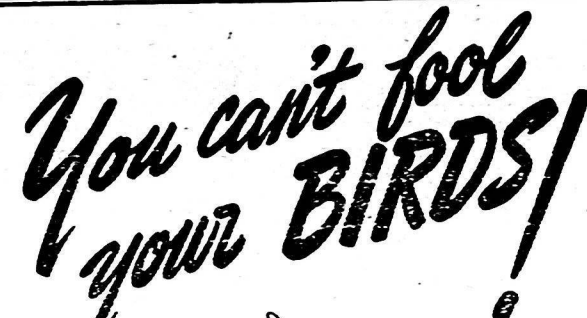
