The funeral of Arthur Torrie was held on Friday afternoon, August 26th, at the home of his son, Clayton. In his 86th year, he was one of the oldest residents of the district, and was held in the greatest esteem. He had been an honorary deacon of the

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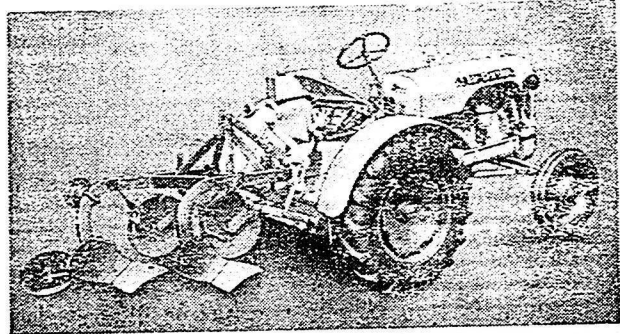

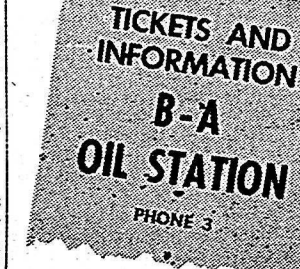
