The arena measures 75 by 182 feet, and it will have an ice surface of 63 by 168 feet. It is being built under the Community Centres Act, and the Ontario Department of Agriculture assists it on 25 per cent. of the amount spent with a grant up to \$5,000. The Township of Euphrasia gave \$3,000, the County of Grey, \$1,000, and individuals and organizations have donated \$4,500. As well as this money, about \$3,000 in free labor has been given \$3,000 in free labor has been given

\$3,000 in free labor has been given also Mr. Lanktree estimates that the arena will cost between \$15,000 and \$20,000, but the actual cost will be less the value of the free labor. The arena is of the Hipel-truss type of building. It joins the former agricultural hall, a brick building, which is to be the Community Hall, and in it will be the dressing rooms. The new arena is on the community's agricultural grounds, and it really comprises three separate projects, on each of which the community will be eligible to receive provincial grants. These are the arena, the Community Hall, and the agricultural grounds.

Rocklyn has not had a hockey team for several years, and some of its hockey-minded boys have been playing with Markdale. It hopes to have a team this year, also that the arena will be the home centre for other teams.
