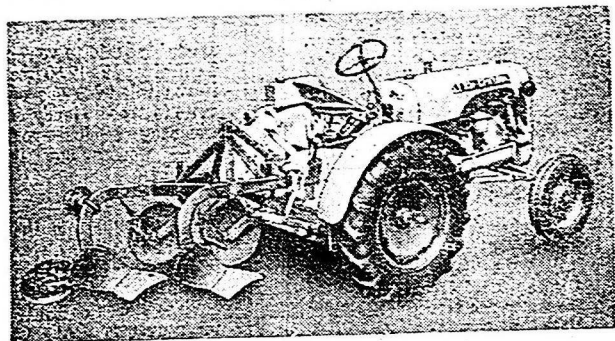

Butter IS Needed

An emphatic denial that substitutes are as good as butter was given in Ottawa recently by Dr. Christian Segard, Director of Medical Research, Wisconsin Research Foundation, and one of the World's best known food scientists. In response to a question following an address before an Ottawa school assembly, Dr. Segard stated definitely that substitutes are not as good as butter for the following reasons:

- Butter has more vitamins
- Butter is more digestible
- Defects, such as eye defects, begin to show in persons of the second and third generations where substitutes are used exclusively for several decades.

He cited the example of one European country which sold all its dairy products abroad and used substitutes at home. He said that medical authorities in this country began to notice eye defects appearing in a large number of persons whose families had not been using butter for several years.

Rt. Hon. J. G. Gardiner stated in the House of Commons

That a friend of his owned a massive Great Dane dog who was very fond of butter. His mistress gave him bread with butter spread thickly on it: but being Scotch, she came to the conclusion that substitutes would cost less and would serve the purpose. But the dog would have none of it, he merely sniffed at it and then went and laid down. In other words, if humans do not know the difference between butter and substitutes, dogs do.

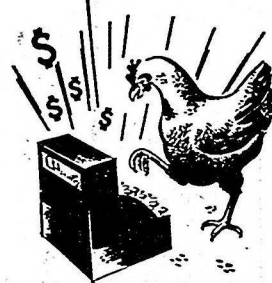
Climbed out and surveyed the Centennial Posts, or Gates, with their varied-colored rock faces and neat, white linkings.
