The council of the Township of Holland met on November 1st for the transaction of general business. All the members of the council were present. Stuart Howey, the reeve, presided.

The minutes were read. Hansen - Sellwood, that legal advice be procured regarding townline road allowance between Holland and Glenelg leading to Bell's Lane and new owners of tracts of land be notified.

Morrow - McFadden, that the following amounts be received for motor grader rentals— Clarence Seabrook, 4 hours, \$18; Morley Way, 4 hours, \$1.13; Archie Castle, 4 hours, \$2.25; Percy Rosenberg, 4 hours, \$1.13; Emerson Craven, 1 hour, \$4.50.

Morrow - Sellwood, that the sum of \$44 be received from Sixth Line North Snow Club.

McFadden - Hansen, that pay roll and Voucher No. 11, amounting to \$48,762, be passed and paid.

Sellwood - Morrow, that tax notice of T. D. Berry be referred to the assessor, asking that an investigation be made.

McFadden - Hansen, that the following pay roll and vouchers be endorsed: February 2, \$1250.21; July 7, \$2520.81; August 8, \$1918.72; September 9, \$691.16; October 10, \$789.42.

Morrow - Sellwood, that Mrs. T. Shaw be authorized to purchase three dozen cups for Township Hall, price not to exceed 20c each.

Sellwood - McFadden, that the sum of \$1.00 be paid to Mrs. T. Shaw, balance due on caretaking account for month of October.

Sellwood - McFadden, that Stuart Howey be representative to the Saugeen Valley Conservation meeting to be held in Walkerton on November 8, 1949.

Hansen - McFadden, that treasurer receive the sum of \$161.60 payment of 30% dental fees for Township School Area, from the Department of Dental Services, Department of Health, Ontario.

Morrow - Hansen, that leave be granted to introduce a by-law for the purpose of appointing D.R.O.'s and poll clerks for 1950.

Leave granted and by-law read. Sellwood - McFadden, that By-Law 350 be now read a second time.

Hansen - Morrow, that By-Law 350 be now read a third time, finally passed, signed by the Reeve and Clerk, and engrossed in the By-Law Book.

Hansen - Sellwood, that accounts for portion of snowplowing due Township of Euphrasia be passed and paid.

Hansen - Sellwood, that indigent notice from Hospital for Sick Children, Toronto, be certified O.K.

McFadden - Morrow, that Mrs. Wilbert Sutcliffe be appointed to represent the Township of Holland on the board of Centre Grey Hospital at Markdale.

Hansen - Sellwood, that the Federation of Agriculture be given a grant of \$100.

Morrow - McFadden, that Wednesday, November 23rd, be set as date for Court of Revision at 1 o'clock p.m.

Sellwood - Morrow, that the tenders of W. C. Seabrook, Mr. E. Quinton, and Chester Holley, with F.W.D. only, be accepted, mileage to be allotted later.

## Weekly Newspaper Dean Passes Away At Paisley

## Veterans At Annesley Anniversary Service

"The year 1949 has been an important one for our church," Rev. W. M. Lee, M.A., the minister of Annesley United Church, told a large congregation present on Sunday morning for the anniversary service. "We had our moderator for the Centennial Rev. Stewart B. East, B.A., B.Paed., M.B.E., M.C. of the Islington United Church," he continued. Rev. Mr. Lee said it was the 99th anniversary of the church.

The members of the Markdale Branch, No. 205, Canadian Legion of the British Empire Service League, and the Ladies' Auxiliary to the Legion paraded to the service, led by members of the Grey-Brace Pipe Band. The groups occupied the middle pews of the church. They were welcomed by Rev. Mr. Lee.

"It gives me great pleasure to be in this important pulpit of the United Church on this most important occasion," said Rev. Mr. East. Addressing words of welcome to the veterans, he said the choir's selection was especially in their honor.

For his sermon subject, "Courage and Thanksgiving," he chose as a text, Acts 28: 15. He said the verse describes Paul, who thanked God and took courage. Gratitude and courage are meant to be together, said Rev. Mr. East. Paul's outlook was always courageous. When he was shipwrecked, imprisoned, and put in chains, he thanked God.

"We have anniversaries in order to take a backward look that we may see gratitude and take courage," said the speaker. He prescribed for the congregation, and "our own personal living," the contemplation of the goodness and mercy of God. "It will lift us," he said, "above littleness to bigness. Spiritually, we need to be lifted out of our littleness."

Himself a veteran, Rev. Mr. East said "Remembrance Day reminds us of the sacrifices of young men who did not put themselves first. Whenever we become engrossed in greed and selfishness, let us remember the crosses over there."

The speaker said it is not "Why more do we go to church?" but rather, "Why so many go to church?" He said it was fatal to judge the battle in the recent war from what could be seen from a slit trench. "There are many things for which you can be thankful," he told the congregation.

Mrs. Walter E. Harris, the organist and choir leader, presided at the organ and chimes. The choir sang an anthem, "The Resurrection," in which solo parts were taken by Mrs. Bert Armstrong.

The Hillsburgh Male Quartet, accompanied by Mrs. Morgan Graham, sang two selections at each service. In the morning, the quartet sang "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name" and "Jesus Our Lord is Crucified." The evening selections were: "Just a Little Talk With Jesus" and "Shine On Me." The quartet members were: Howard Graham, Donald Graham, William Currey, and Harry Burt.

The evening anthem sung by the choir was "The Radiant Morn Has Passed Away." Appreciation was voiced to the Hillsburgh Quartet and the choir and organist by Rev. Mr. Lee.

In the evening the speaker was Rev. G. Keith McMillan, B.A., B.D., of Division St. Church, Owen Sound, with whom Rev. Mr. Lee exchanged pulpits. Rev. Mr. McMillan, who is former Flesherton minister, was introduced to the large congregation by Aubrey Foster.

"I see evidence of a healthy condition in Markdale," Rev. Mr. McMillan said. "One usually concludes that on seeing a church building in good condition. His subject was 'The Good Pagan's Failure,' for which he selected as a text, II Chronicles 27: 2. "A great many people of our time think that to be good without religion," the speaker remarked. He said the virtues which men acclaim would not exist if it were not for the church.

His sermon setting portrayed three generations—a zealous father, an indifferent son, and a rascal of a grandson. He said the same condition is true of generations. "They say," he explained, "that we are going from the dynamic left to us."

He said there is need to come face to face with God as Jacob did. The great humanitarians are the people who cross the threshold of God's house regularly. "In church, in worship, the evil in us is challenged," said Rev. Mr. McMillan. "We come into church and test our lives with His."

"Worship reminds us of values the world lets us forget," he stated. "The only real answer to purposelessness is to get into the program of Jesus Christ and help make this world a little better."
