Mr. Savage said it isn't always the price that counts. "You know that in the long run you will win by sticking to the Co-operative. Co-operatives everywhere have been a control on price structures in communities."

The speaker said the manager and directors need three tools from the members. The first is loyalty from the members, the second is efficiency in operation, and the third is finances—the most important one. most important one.

Mr. Savage, who said there are 228 Co-operatives in Ontario, lauded the local group on its substantial profit for the year.

"We, the farmers, are the greatest producers of wealth in the country," said Mr. Savage. "We produce and let someone else handle it." He said the Co-operatives are changing this condition, explaining that the Co-operatives have gone into banking and insurance. He introduced Ed. Lang of Flesherton, who represents Co-operative insurance in the district.

Russell Boyce tendered thanks to Mr. Savage.

The group stood while Howard McGee led in the singing of several wellknown songs.

In his short report, Manager Stevens said it had been a much better
year for the Co-operative. He thanked the visitors and members for attending the banquet, and he also expressed appreciation to the Annesley
W.A. for the way in which it co-operated in arranging and serving it.
