Outstanding Year Reported For Annesley Congregation

Following a potluck supper on Wednesday evening last, the minister, Rev. W. M. Lee, opened the annual congregational meeting of Annesley United Church with the reading of a Bible passage and offering a prayer. Rev. Mr. Lee presided, and Aubrey Foster was appointed secretary.

Reports presented during the evening reflected a year of much progress for the church. Nelson Armstrong, the clerk of the Session, reported a resident membership at the end of the year of 274, and a non-resident membership of 41. Additions to the membership in 1949 totalled 34. There were four removals. In the last four years, the church has received 100 new members. The report showed eight marriages, 16 baptisms, and 17 funerals.

W. R. Graham, the treasurer, reported that approximately \$4,700 had been raised, an increase of \$400 over the preceding year. Many improvements were made during the year, including the redecoration of the church, electrifying the organ action, installation of chimes and an amplification system, and many memorial gifts. The treasurer reported a balance at the year's end of \$775, with all accounts paid. Mr. Graham was thanked for his work. A. E. Hunt, the auditor, reported the books exceptionally well kept.

Mrs. S. L. Hare, the treasurer, reported that the Women's Association had raised more than \$1,085. The association, with 54 members, gave assistance to the Committee of Stewards in the redecoration of the church and in other work.

Mrs. J. E. Crone reported that the Afternoon Auxiliary, with 25 members, had raised \$266.

Mrs. Vic. Ward reported that the Evening Auxiliary, with a membership of 24, had an average attendance of 25, accounted for by visitors. The sum of \$811 was raised by the group. George Burritt, the treasurer of the Missionary and Maintenance Fund, reported that the church had contributed more than \$560 for missions, and \$52 was given for the work of the Ontario Temperance Federation.

Hillis Burnside, the superintendent, reported that the attendance at the Sunday school had increased materially. Its receipts for the year exceeded \$272.

Many complimentary remarks were made about the choir leader, Mrs. Walter E. Harris, and the choir when his report was presented. Mrs. Harris said in her report, stating that \$83.46 had been raised.

Outstanding among the reports was that of the C.G.I.T., which showed much fine work done during the year. Numerous features were mentioned. The treasurer's report, showing \$196.98 raised, was given by Fern Harris, and the secretarial report by Iovna Alexco.

Other organizations reporting, in which the congregation showed its pride, were the junior and intermediate choirs, under the leadership of Mrs. Lorne R. Dennison. Each choir has a complete organization. Out of total receipts of \$92.81, the choirs contributed \$35 towards the general work of the church, Maryon Alexco reported.

Following the presentation of the reports, several resolutions were passed, expressing appreciation to many who did special work during the year—to Gordon Beaton, as chairman of the Committee of Stewards; to the Markdale Standard, for its service; to T. Stewart Cooper, for work in connection with the church calendars; to Wilfred Graham and others for work in and around the church building, and to Mrs. Walter E. Harris for her work with the choir.

To take the places of the retiring members of the Committee of Stewards, W. R. Graham, W. M. Sutton, Hillis Burnside, George Shaw, and J. R. Dillon were elected for three-year terms. Bert McLoughry was elected to complete the term of the late C. W. Oliver.

George Burritt was re-elected as treasurer of the Missionary and Maintenance Fund, with Mrs. George Shaw as assistant.

Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Hunt were asked to act as auditors again. A committee to look after the ushering was appointed as follows: W. J. McFadden, W. M. Sutton, and the chairman of the Committee of Stewards.

It was stated that, as far as historical data is concerned, it appears that 1950 should be the centennial year of the congregation. It was felt that this event should be suitably observed. A committee was appointed to act with the minister in arranging for it, the members of the committee being the clerk of the Session, the chairman of the Committee of Stewards, the president of the Women's Federation, the leader of the choir, and Mrs. W. N. Burnside.

Before the meeting was adjourned, Aubrey Foster spoke appreciatively of the work of Rev. and Mrs. Lee. He moved a resolution of thanks to them, which was enthusiastically seconded and carried. In replying, Rev. Mr. Lee thanked all who had helped during the year to make such marked progress possible.

"Undoubtedly," he said, "1949 will go down in history as one of the most outstanding years in the life and work of the Annesley congregation."
