Must Be Under Control
Says Conservation Officer
By W. H. Cantelon
(Conservation officer, Department of Lands and Forests, Meaford)
In the past few weeks there have been several cases of dogs running deer, in some instances the deer have been pulled down by the dogs and chewn severely.
It is a pitiful sight to see a deer that has broken through the crust on top of the snow, standing helpless, while the dogs literally tear pieces of hide from its body and give the animal a general mauling until the animal drops from exhaustion.
Dogs, being lighter than deer and having a wider foot, are able to keep on top of the crust, while the deer, with narrow hooves and more weight, generally break through with every step and therefore in most cases cannot outrun the dogs or fend them off.
Due to these circumstances, a strict warning is issued to all dog owners to keep their dogs under their control at all times and to cease the practice of permitting the dogs to run at large. Any dog found running deer is liable to be destroyed, and the owner of the offending dog liable to a prosecution and fine.
Section 30, sub-section (3) of the Game and Fisheries Act and Regulations, reads as follows: No person owning, harboring or claiming to own a dog shall allow it to run at large during the close season for deer in a locality which deer usually inhabit or in which they are usually found.
Section 30, sub-section (4) of the said act reads as follows: A dog found running deer, moose, etc., during the close season for deer in that locality shall be deemed to be at large with the leave of the owner and may be killed on sight by an officer without being liable for damages to any other person or to a penalty.
