The W.A. met on Tuesday at the home of Mrs. Robert Chard.

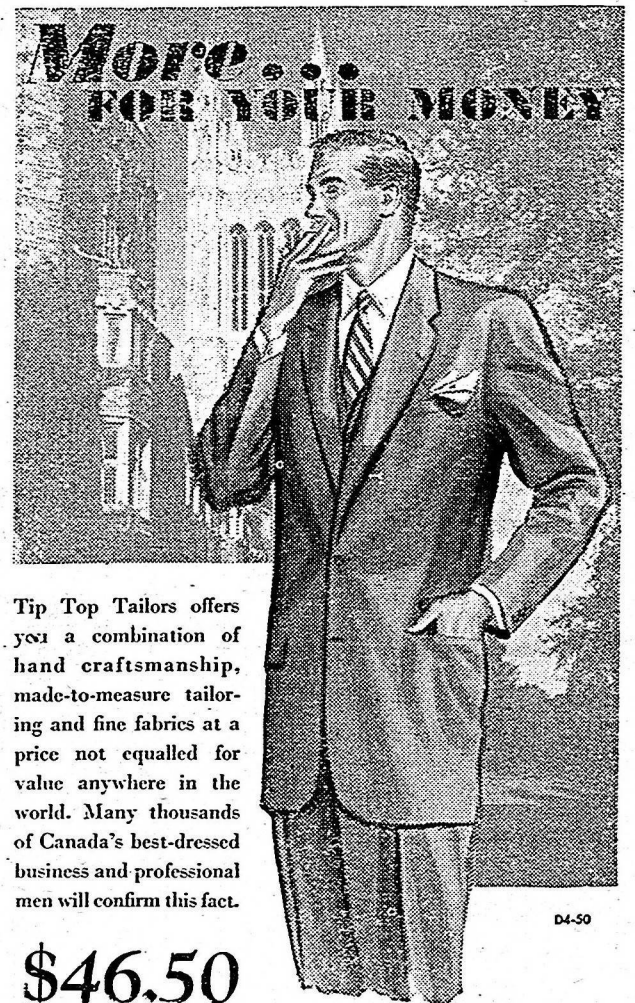
