Warble Fly Petition Short On Names In Holland

Sellwood - McFadden, the clerk contact the treasurer of the Grey County Federation of Agriculture regarding the grant of \$100, which apparently has been paid in error, and request the return to the Holland Township branch.
Hansen - McFadden, that the Sandy Construction Co. be awarded the gravel contract at 70 cents per cubic yard (12" screen).
McFadden - Sellwood, that the treasurer receive the sum of \$6 payment of dog tax for 1949 from W. J. Jackson, said dog tax being an amount overlooked by the assessor.
Hansen - Sellwood, that the treasurer receive the sum of \$73.40 to be credited to the 10th Line North Snow Club, \$12.50 to be credited to N. and S. 10th Line Snow Club on equal proportions, and \$12.50 to be credited to Walter's Falls and a portion of Townline, Holland and Euphrasia.

McFadden - Sellwood, that By-Law 1950-3 be read a third time, finally passed, signed by the reeve and clerk, and engrossed in the By-Law Book.
