In the evening the Orange Hall was well filled with ratepayers anxious to hear a discussion of municipal affairs by the candidates for Municipal honours. Many were called, few responded, and the evening was voted a tame affair. Mr. Geo. T. Hamilton occupied the chair in his own inimitable manner.

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and after reading the list of candidates, invited them in turn to the platform. Nearly all those asked were absent quantities however, and it fell to the lot of Mr. Geo. T. Hamilton to start the ball rolling. Mr. Hamilton confined his remarks principally to the financial statement, showing, therefrom, that the Council for the past year had kept the expenditure well below the estimates. The most difficult problem, he said, was the collection of taxes, \$30,000 of which was still outstanding. While the war had taught municipalities to economize, still there were many citizens who would not pay their taxes and were therefore a hindrance to the town.

Other speakers were Messrs L. Gagnon, E. J. Morris, J. A. Donnell, E. C. Wright and H. A. Day, all of whom made their remarks short and sweet, and in consequence the meeting was over in an hour's time.

### J. E. McCUAIG, MAYOR

When the clock struck nine on Tuesday evening it was found that three nominees for the mayoralty chair had withdrawn leaving a clear field for Mr. J. E. McCuaig, who is thus elected by acclamation.

A reduction of approximately 50 per cent for Cooking and Heating Purposes.

### Crawford and McLean Properties Give Good Promise

Mr. H. W. Crawford, of Haileybury, who owns two of the best properties in Skead township, has staked four claims in Catharine township, south half of 5 I-3. Here he has struck a vein of gold which, he says, is four feet wide and which he has traced half way across his claim. It is showing free gold in place and assay as well.

Mr. Crawford along with his partner, Mr. J. A. McLean, has built a new camp on the property, and up to date it is the best camp in the district.

The rock formation is greenstone and schist, which is essentially, a gold bearing formation. Tellurides are showing freely.

Mr. Crawford displayed some excellent samples to his friends in Haileybury, and stated that work was proceeding on his claims, which he believed would open the eyes of the people in the north country.

Candle power of Street Lamps to be increased from 60 c.p. to 100 c.p. without additional charge.

Pumping charges readjusted from fixed charge at present in effect to terms which will operate to advantage of Town. Any economy practised will tend to reduce charge.

The Power Company have given assurance that fair and just consideration will be extended to any application for current for purposes which may not be provided for in the Franchise.

These terms appear to compare favorably with those in effect in communities where conditions are of a similar nature.

As these rates if approved go into effect not later than January 1, 1916, I trust the electors will show their approval of the labors of the retiring Council, and also secure the benefits outlined above by voting in favor of the franchise on Monday next.

Thanking you for the confidence placed in me during the five years I spent in the Council and wishing you all a very Happy and Prosperous New Year.
