Celebrate Jubilee of Diocese of Algoma

The Rev. Canon Hincks returned on Saturday from Sault Ste Marie, where he attended the meeting of the Synod of Algoma and the jubilee of the founding of the diocese. The latter event was marked by special services of thanksgiving in St. Luke's Cathedral at which the Bishop of Toronto and Montreal were the preachers, his Grace the Archbishop celebrating at the solemn Eucharist. A pilgrimage was made to the grave of Bishop Faquir, the first Bishop of the diocese which is in the graveyard of the Shingwank Home, and also to that of Chief Shingwank at Garden River. Mrs. Sullivan, the wife of the second Bishop, was present for the celebration and read an interesting sketch of the Bishop's life. The Womans Auxiliary held their annual meeting during the Synod week. St. Pauls Branch being represented by Mrs. S. Norfolk and Mrs. H. E. Blackwall.

Judging from comments heard on Monday night while the returns of the election were coming in and for the past two days, the great majority of the people in Haileybury are well pleased with the result.

Temiskaming's New Representative



A. J. Kennedy, New Liskeard, Elected to the Legislature on Monday by a Large Majority

A. J. Kennedy is the new member of the Legislature for Temiskaming. In a somewhat heated campaign, during which the leaders of the three parties visited this district, Mr. Kennedy has succeeded in securing a majority of nearly one thousand nearest opponent, third, being the Professor. The latest figures available show the standing of the candidates as follows, with a few outlying polls to hear from:

Kennedy 2792
Sharp 1869
O'Grady 1572

The Town of Haileybury gave a substantial majority for Kennedy, with O'Grady running second. In three of the four polls the Conservative vote was greater by far than that of the other

two parties combined, while in the fourth there was a Liberal majority. In only one place did the U.F.O. candidate reach second place.

Reports from the north indicate that Mac Lang is elected in the riding of Cochrane. Nipissing returned the Conservative candidate, H. Morel, of Mattawa, by between two and three hundred. Z. Mageau, Liberal, was re-elected in Sturgeon Falls, with a majority of 1500, while Chas. McCrea, Conservative, had a majority of 1400 in Sudbury.

The latest reports give the standing of the parties as follows:

Conservatives, 76; Liberals, 16; U.F.O., 14; Labor, 3; Independent, 1.

New R. C. Bishop is Member of Oblate Order

So far there has been no news as to when the newly elected Bishop of Haileybury, Right Rev. Louis Rheame, will take charge of the diocese. It is thought probable that he will be consecrated at Ottawa in August.

It is a remarkable coincidence that the successor to Bishop Lattulipe should be a member of the Oblate Order, which furnished the first missionaries to this district and to the adjacent portions of Quebec. The Old Mission was established in 1843 and the Order has been at work ever since, the centre of operations having been changed to Ville Marie in 1884. Until an official residence can be provided it is possible that the new bishop will make his home with his brother members of the Order at Ville Marie.

The new bishop-elect is fifty years of age, having been born at Levis, P.Q., in 1873. He studied engineering at Laval University, and later joined the Oblate Order in Ottawa. In 1898 he went to Rome to make theological and philosophical studies, and he received the degree of D.D. in 1904. He was ordained a priest on April 2 of the same year. Subsequently he was professor of higher mathematics at Ottawa University and he was rector of that institution from 1915 to 1921.

Contents of St. Paul's Corner Stone Recovered

In the levelling of the walls of St. Paul's Church, the workmen have discovered the foundation stone and its contents are for the present in the care of the Rector. They consist of a coin of the realm and a copy of the Algoma Missionary News, dated Sept. 15, 1894, the Canadian Churchman, dated Sept. 13, 1894, and the North Bay Times of April 5, 1894. The stone was "well and truly" in the latter part of September of that year and the event was marked by great rejoicing which visitors from all over the district took part.

The following letters are taken from the copy of the North Bay Times taken from the stone:

If there is one thing that is dear to the Englishman abroad it is his Church. Apart from its spiritual significance, it is a connecting link with the home he has left. Its service carries him back to the days of his childhood, and he can with small stretch of his imagination, fancy himself again a boy sitting in the family pew, and listening to the familiar prayers, chants and hymns. What a thrill then that, when launched upon the stormy waters of manhood in foreign lands, where all men and things are strange, his heart should cling to the associations of the past, and that, with his mind more fully awakened to the spiritual needs of his nature, he should find comfort in that grand, old service, intelligible to him even as a child, but rich to him as a man in gems of deepest thought!

On the beautiful shores of Lake Temiscamingue—a country which is fertile of soil and abundance of natural resources—is to be seen that blessing Northwest—a few live at home and on their times fully to appreciate, natural—a church. At present the nearest one to the settlement of Haileybury is one hundred miles away and amongst the settlers on the lake there are more than one hundred who are church people.

A place of worship of some kind must, and will, be shortly built upon the shores of the lake. Let the Church of England take the lead, and be the first to plant her standard here. It is not a large and handsome building that is needed, but something plain and substantial, worthy of its aim, and capable of holding all that wish to come. Such a building the settlers cannot erect without assistance. It is true, they are not deprived altogether of the consolations of religion, for occasionally—about six times during the year—a Student of Divinity from Toronto holds a service at the different shanties. But the want of a church damps the enthusiasm and robs the service of more than half its charm. How gratified would any parochial incumbent in England be, if he could see his congregation as attentive, and as earnest in the responses as these backwoods-men are, when pouring out their souls to God in these rough huts. How far they come to listen to the good words! In England a two-mile walk to church is looked upon as quite an undertaking, whereas ten miles here are as nothing, and even twenty miles do not appal the stoutest hearts.

The amount required to cover the whole cost is £400, the site being free. Already contributions have been made in Canada, and ere this reaches England, logs for the foundation will have been cut and taken out of the bush. The size proposed is 50 feet by 30 feet, with chancel in proportion. The material to be used is wood which will be cased with brickwork should the prosperity of the congregation in future years warrant it. The inside will be plastered, and the fittings added according to the funds at disposal.

Suicide and Attempted Murder In Domestic Tragedy at Moneta

A domestic tragedy is reported from South Porcupine, where an Italian named Rogario Marson, attempted to kill his wife and ten-year-old step-daughter by blowing up the house with dynamite, and, failing in the attempt, committed suicide by shooting himself in the left side.

The tragedy occurred in Moneta Townsite, adjoining the town of Timmins. Domestic troubles are given as the cause, Marson and his wife having been separated.

The report states that Marson came to the house about 1.30 a.m. on Sunday and threw several sticks of dynamite through a window, then shot himself. Mrs. Marson and her daughter, although in the house at the time, escaped injury. Marson's body was found near the window through which he had thrown the dynamite, with a revolver lying close by.

Cobalt Ore Shipments.

Shipments of ore from the Cobalt mines during the week ending June 22nd, reached a total of 224,080 pounds. Two cars were shipped by the O'Brien Mine, containing 127,960 pounds, and one by the Coniagas, with 96,120 pounds.

Committee Thinks New Fire Engine Needed

A great deal of time and thought is being expended by the Fire and Light Committee of the Town Council this summer over the question of a fire engine. The old engine, after being badly damaged in the big fire last Fall, was to have been repaired, and in fact, was shipped early in the winter to the Watrous Engine Works at Brantford for that purpose. It was found that the necessary repairs and rebuilding would cost about \$500, so later it was decided to have the work done in Haileybury and the engine was shipped back and is now stored away in the same condition as it was in last Fall.

This Spring the Committee had doubts as to the advisability of spending the required amount on the old engine, as it was felt that very little use could be got out of it on account of its weight and the time required to get up steam and get it in operation. The only part of town where it could be used to any great advantage is west of the railway where there is little or no water pressure, and by the time it could be taken there it would in most cases be too late.

The Committee has had under consideration for some time the purchase of a motor truck fitted to do pumping and carry chemicals, hose, ladders, etc. These machines are in use in a great many towns and cities in Canada and are said to prove entirely satisfactory. During the past week, representatives of two different firms manufacturing these fire trucks have been in Haileybury in an effort to sell a machine. The latest to visit town was a Mr. Bickle, of the Bickle Fire Engine Co., of Woodstock, Ontario. Members of the Committee in the Council Chambers on Friday were several fire engines supplied to the Ontario Forestry Department, one of which is coming to this district and will be used at Cochrane and vicinity.

After going thoroughly over the different machines, in conjunction with Fire Chief Merkley who is in accord with the proposal, the Committee narrowed the choice down to two, one of which is priced at \$5,000 the other at \$8,500. The former has a pumping capacity of 300 to 350 gallons per minute, the latter 500 to 550. Both are of the latest type.
