

Notes of The North

The annual road race around Cobalt Lake, for junior members of the Y.M.C.A., will be held on Monday, July 2nd, according to a decision reached. The start will be from the front of the building at 9.30 a.m.

Children under seven years of age brought to the public schools here after the summer vacation will not be admitted until there is accommodation available for them, according to a decision reached by the Board at a meeting on Monday evening. The action was taken in view of the continued congestion which prevails. —Cobalt News.

Hearing the wild yarns current about the town of Timmins being burned up, or likely to be burned up, or something, a number of travellers on their way in here on Monday evening stopped off at Porquis Junction or other points along the line and sent word in here to have their baggage returned. When the panic passes they will find Timmins here as usual. —Porcupine Advance.

The firm of R. A. and I. M. Sinclair, 505 Excelsior Life Building, Toronto, formerly the firm of Angus Sinclair, was the successful tenderer for the branch line through Kirkland Lake to the Crown Reserve Mine. Construction is to start at once, with steel to be completely laid by the end of the year. There were five or six tenders. The amount of the successful bid has not been published. It is expected that 1,000 men will be employed.

The Ford Motor Company has contracted with Fielding Bros. of the Canadian Soo, for 50,000,000 feet of logs, mostly hardwood, to be shipped to the Ford sawmill at L'Anse. Work on the contract will start at once. It will take five years to complete it. The logs will be cut near Goulais Bay, Ont., and the first shipment will be dispatched in November.

An order-in-Council has been made by the Minister of Lands and Forests, in order to permit the first obtaining of a fire ranger or subject to a penalty of a fine of \$100.

Quite an exciting time around Hanbury on Monday afternoon. When the children were coming home from school, a bear came out from behind the school and stood up in the road. The kiddies came running to the post office in great excitement. Messrs. Newman and E. Routliffe took after the bear with disastrous results to the bear. They found him in the Irvin slash and Mr. Percy Newman shot him. —New Liskeard Speaker.

Swastika—A referendum taken this week on the question of providing an electric lighting system for Swastika resulted in a vote of 162, the ballot being evenly divided with 81 for and 81 against. As a result of this "draw" it is understood that another vote will be taken.

A feature of the voting was that while Swastika itself gave a large majority in favor of providing the lighting system, yet the ballot at Kirkland Lake was strongly against it, the count showing 85 votes at Kirkland Lake, of which 69 were against and 16 in favor.

It is not generally known that the C.P.R. is building an extension up the east side of Lake Temiskaming under a subsidiary company which has interprovincial rights. The company is the Interprovincial and James Bay Railway. As a matter of fact, its road starts at Mattawa in Ontario, and there would be nothing surprising in its coming back into Ontario. Students of the northern railway situation look for the line being extended from the Quinze, its present railhead, where a large pulp and paper plant is projected, on into the Rouyn gold district, and then some day back into Ontario again in the Abitibi neighborhood. The C.P.R. has its eye on the pulp and paper traffic. —Northern Miner.

Two tracts of timber, totalling approximately 16 square miles in area, are involved in sales which the Lands Department of the Ontario Government has negotiated.

In both cases the successful tenderers are Messrs. Grant & Dunn of Latchford, Ont. The first parcel is one of 11 1/2 sq. miles in the Township of Barr south and west of the Montreal River. The red and white pine of this district is disposed of for a price which, including Crown dues, totals \$15.53 per thousand feet.

The second parcel is one of 4 1/2 sq. miles in the Township of Kittson, in the northeast portion of the Temagami Forest Reserve. The price paid here, including in each case the usual Crown dues, are: Red and white pine, \$15.53 per thousand feet; jackpine, \$12.75 per thousand feet; spruce, \$12.25 per thousand feet; poplar and basswood, \$8.00 per thousand feet; other timber, \$7.25 per thousand

By-Law No. 587

Being a By-Law of the Council Corporation of the Town of Haileybury, for the purpose of authorizing the issue of Debentures to the amount of Fifteen Thousand (\$15,000) for the purpose of erecting a Fire Hall and providing equipment in the Town of Haileybury.

WHEREAS in the conflagration of October 4th, 1922, the Fire Hall of the Town of Haileybury, together with all the equipment thereof, were destroyed by fire.

AND WHEREAS, in the opinion of the Council Corporation of the Town of Haileybury it is absolutely essential that a new Fire Hall be built to house the equipment of the Fire Department and to provide accommodation for the members of the Fire Brigade.

AND WHEREAS it will require the sum of FIFTEEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$15,000) to erect and equip a suitable building for the purposes aforementioned.

AND WHEREAS the Council Corporation of the Town of Haileybury deem it advisable that the payment of the amount necessary be spread over a period of twenty (20) years.

AND WHEREAS in order thereto it will be necessary to issue debentures of the said Municipality for the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000), as hereinafter provided, which is the amount of the debt intended to be created by this By-law, and the proceeds of the said debentures to be applied to the purposes aforesaid and to no other.

AND WHEREAS it is desirable to issue the said debentures at one period during the principal term of twenty (20) years, being the currency of the said debentures, said yearly sums being of such respective amounts that the aggregate amount payable in each year for principal and interest in respect of the said debt, shall be as nearly as possible equal to the amount payable in each of the other nineteen years of the said period, as shown in Schedule "A" hereto annexed.

AND WHEREAS, the total amounts required by the Municipal Act to be raised annually by special rate for paying the said debt and interest, as hereinafter provided, is ONE THOUSAND, THREE HUNDRED AND SEVEN DOLLARS AND SEVENTY-SEVEN CENTS (\$1,307.77).

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole ratable property of the Town of Haileybury, according to the last revised assessment roll thereof, is \$1,523,111.00.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the existing debenture debt of the said Municipality is \$226,397.46. Whereof no portion of the said principal or interest is in arrears.

THEREFORE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF HAILEYBURY enacts as follows:

(1) The Municipal Council of the said Corporation of the Town of Haileybury is hereby authorized to enter into a contract for the erection and providing the

equipment of a Fire Hall, or to proceed with the erection of the said Fire Hall by any other means they deem advisable, and to expend a sum not exceeding \$15,000.00 in payment for the same.

(2) For the purpose of raising the said sum, debentures of the said town to the amount of \$15,000.00 as aforesaid, in sums of not less than \$100.00 each, shall be issued on the 15th day of July, 1923, each of which debentures shall be dated on the date of the issue thereof and shall be payable with interest, namely, on the 15th day of July, 1924, and on the 15th day of July in each of the years thereafter, at the Bank of Hochelaga in the said Town of Haileybury.

(3) Each of the said debentures shall be signed by the Mayor of the said Town of Haileybury, or by some other person authorized by law to sign the same, and by the Treasurer thereof of the said Town of Haileybury, and the Clerk shall attach thereto the Corporate Seal of the Municipality.

(4) The said debentures shall bear interest at the rate of six per centum (6 per cent.) per annum, payable at the said Bank of Hochelaga, on the 15th days of July in each and every year during the currency thereof, and shall have attached to them coupons for payment of the said interest, which coupons shall be signed by the Treasurer of the said Town of Haileybury.

(5) During the currency of the said debentures there shall be raised annually by special rate on all the ratable property in the said Municipality of the Town of Haileybury the sum of One Thousand, Three Hundred and Seven Dollars and Seventy-seven Cents (\$1,307.77) for the purpose of paying the amount due in each of the said years for principal and interest in respect of the said debentures as shown in Schedule "A" hereto annexed. This By-law shall take effect on the date of the third reading thereof.

(7) The votes of the electors of the said Town of Haileybury shall be taken on this By-law at the following times and places, that is to say, on the 6th day of July next, commencing at the hour of nine o'clock in the forenoon and continuing until five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day, by the following Deputy Returning Officer, Herbert A. Day, Town Clerk, at the Municipal Building in the said Town of Haileybury.

(8) On Thursday, the 5th day of July, 1923, the Mayor of the said Town of Haileybury shall attend at the Municipal Building, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to appoint persons to attend at the Polling Place aforesaid, and the final summing up of the votes shall be made by the Clerk on behalf of the persons interested in and promoting or opposing the passing of this By-law respectively.

(9) That the Clerk of the said Town of Haileybury shall attend at his office in Haileybury, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, of Saturday, the 7th day of July to sum up the number of votes for and against the By-law.
