At the sittings of the Supreme Court here on Monday, the Honorable Mr. Justice Mowat. Mr. W. A. Gordon and Crown Attorney Smiley all paid tribute to the memory of Mr. H. L. Slaght in terms of highest praise. His Lordship spoke as follows: "Before the business of the

court proceeds I think it only proper that I should allude to the passing of a young gentleman of this town who was one of the leaders of the Junior Bar of the Province of Ontario, Mr. Hugh LeRoy Slaght, whom I have known for some years, and who held a high place in the estimation of the Judges, and I speak principally in that regard. You know, of course, and I know, that that, when the amount allotted he had a high place in the community. I do not refer to that so much as to his eminent position at the Bar. Last Housing Loan Has Been Approved

At a meeting of the local Housbecome more interested in their house, which has completely used up the amount voted by the Pro-Assuredly a bandyis the best vincial Government following the mount was \$300,000, which was provided to be lent to those who wished to rebuild their homes, and in some cases to newcomers, and has been expended with the Memory of Mr. Slaght best judgment of the local commission. The loans in individual cases have run from \$1,000 up to \$3,000 and in some cases slightly above that amount, so it will be seen that well over one hundred new houses have been built on this plan.

The loans are spread over a period of 20 years at 5 per cent. interest, thus providing money at reasonable rates for those who were not in a position to build and furnish a new home from their own funds. That the scheme has proved a great help in the rebuilding of Haileybury goes without saying, as in the great majority of cases, loans could not have been secured without paying a great deal higher rate of interest, and in some cases not at all.


