Man and Wife Dead in Porcupine Tragedy

Tragedy stalked in to a merry gathering at South Porcupine on Friday evening, when Mike Pulich visited the Ukrainian hall about ten p.m. while rehearsal of a play was in progress and asked his wife to step outside. When she refused he drew a pistol and fired eight shots. One of the bullets entered the unfortunate woman's face below the right eye, killing her instantly. Pulich then calmly reloaded the magazine of the pistol and left the building. It appears that he intended to visit the home of his wife's father and mother and commit a further crime there, but Chief MacGinnis had removed the couple downtown.

Immediately after the occurrence, Pulich disappeared and additional officers were called in to assist in the hunt for the murderer. After about three hours of searching through barns, stables, etc., he was seen making his way across vacant lots towards the Dome Road about two a.m. Before he had gone far he found a police car and some of the officers guarding that avenue of escape. Turning, he again found himself headed off and was surrounded by the nine police officers who had
