

## First Softball Game Won by Oddfellows

The first game of the local softball season was played at the public school grounds on Monday evening, with the Oddfellows coming out winners over the new entry from North Cobalt, 20-10, after a tussle which was close until the last couple of innings. It was attended by a good crowd, who appeared to have lost none of the enthusiasm evidenced last season.

Bill McKee did the hurling for the Oddfellows and Bill McCagherty caught, while Albert Cain tossed them over for North Cobalt, with Roy Thompson on the receiving end.

At the league meeting held in the fire hall afterwards, it was decided to accept the entries of North Cobalt, Knights of Columbus, Firemen, Oddfellows and the Hockey Club. There was considerable discussion over the last-named, as some of the other club managers were of the opinion that there was too much strength concentrated on the one club, and that they would outclass the other entries, but finally decided to take a chance. The executive then decided K. of C. should play Hockey Club on Wednesday evening and Firemen meet Oddfellows on Friday. All games are to start at 6.30 sharp and penalties will be inflicted on the teams responsible for late starting. The balance of the season's schedule will be drawn up by the committee this week-end.

Milt. Austin was named president, in place of the late Joseph Branchaud, and Joe Walsh was elected by acclamation to the vice-president's chair. Albert Cain, of North Cobalt, was named on the executive to take the chair vacated by H. Woodhouse, who has removed to Toronto.

## New Arrival in Town is Promising Athlete

The following clipping from Saturday's Globe is a special despatch to that paper from Brantford, and is reproduced here for the benefit of sport enthusiasts:

"Brantford loses one of its finest young athletes in Lawrence ("Baldy") Northcott, who Saturday morning leaves for Haileybury, being moved to that town by the Bank of Nova Scotia, by whom he is employed. Thus Coach Jamieson, who has recently moved to the Northern town, from South Porcupine, gets a promising hockey player, and one who helped the Brantford Red and Blacks to win the Intermediate group schedule, being beaten out in the play-offs by the Port Colborne champions. Northcott played left wing, and first gained notice in the Church League, which title he helped to win for the Krows three years in succession. He played on the O.H.A. junior team one year, and blossomed into an intermediate last season. He is tall, rangy and has weight, and with good coaching, should be a real find for the Haileybury team."

"Northcott is also a member of the Intercounty senior baseball team, doing well with the club, which he only joined last season. He is playing right field and gave promise of being a hitter and a good outfielder. He played with the local team last Saturday, and batted in three runs with three hits. He has also performed notably at softball. He pitched the Krows of this city to an O.A.S.A. intermediate title in 1925, and was a member of the O.A.S.A. senior runners-up of last year, playing for the Strobbridge Motor Sales team, which won the city title."

## Coach Jamieson Moves Here From Porcupine

Frederick Wilson, sporting editor of the Toronto Globe, in his "Scanning the Sport Feild" column last Wednesday, had the following comment:

"E. N. (Jimmy) Jamieson, the coach of the South Porcupine hockey teams since 1926, and formerly with Owen Sound, is now located in Haileybury, and will handle the N.O.H.A. Senior and Junior teams there next winter. He is one of the most successful coaches in the country and in the space of four years has sent twenty or more players to the various pro. leagues. Commencing in Owen Sound in 1924, his team won the Memorial Cup, and reached the finals in the O.H.A. Junior series the following year. In 1926 Jamieson moved to South Porcupine, where his team won the Mines League. In '27, the "Porkies" won the N.O.H.A. Senior championship, and lost to London Battery in the Allan Cup play-offs. Last season the South Porcupine sextet took down the N.O.H.A. Senior title and beat Port Colborne, the O.H.A. Intermediate champions, only to lose in the Allan Cup set to Kitchener, O.H.A. Senior title winners. Keep an eye on Haileybury next winter."

Haileybury appears to be fortunate in having Mr. Jamieson take up residence here, and we are sure that he will receive all kinds of support in his efforts to give us a winning hockey team next winter. "Jimmy's" children are attending school at South Porcupine and he feels that it would be best to have them finish the term there, and it is expected that Mrs. Jamieson and the family will be settled here in July.

Jamieson's record as a coach since 1923 stands out, and the fans confidently expect that Haileybury will have a strong combination in the N.O.H.A. Senior series next season, as well as worthy representatives in the Junior and Juvenile groups.

Among the players available for the team will be Earl Sutherland, who played goal for both the Junior and Intermediates last season, and made a good fist of the job. Another candidate for the net-minding position is Freddie Clarke, who stopped gypsum for the Bell Telephone Industrial champions in Toronto

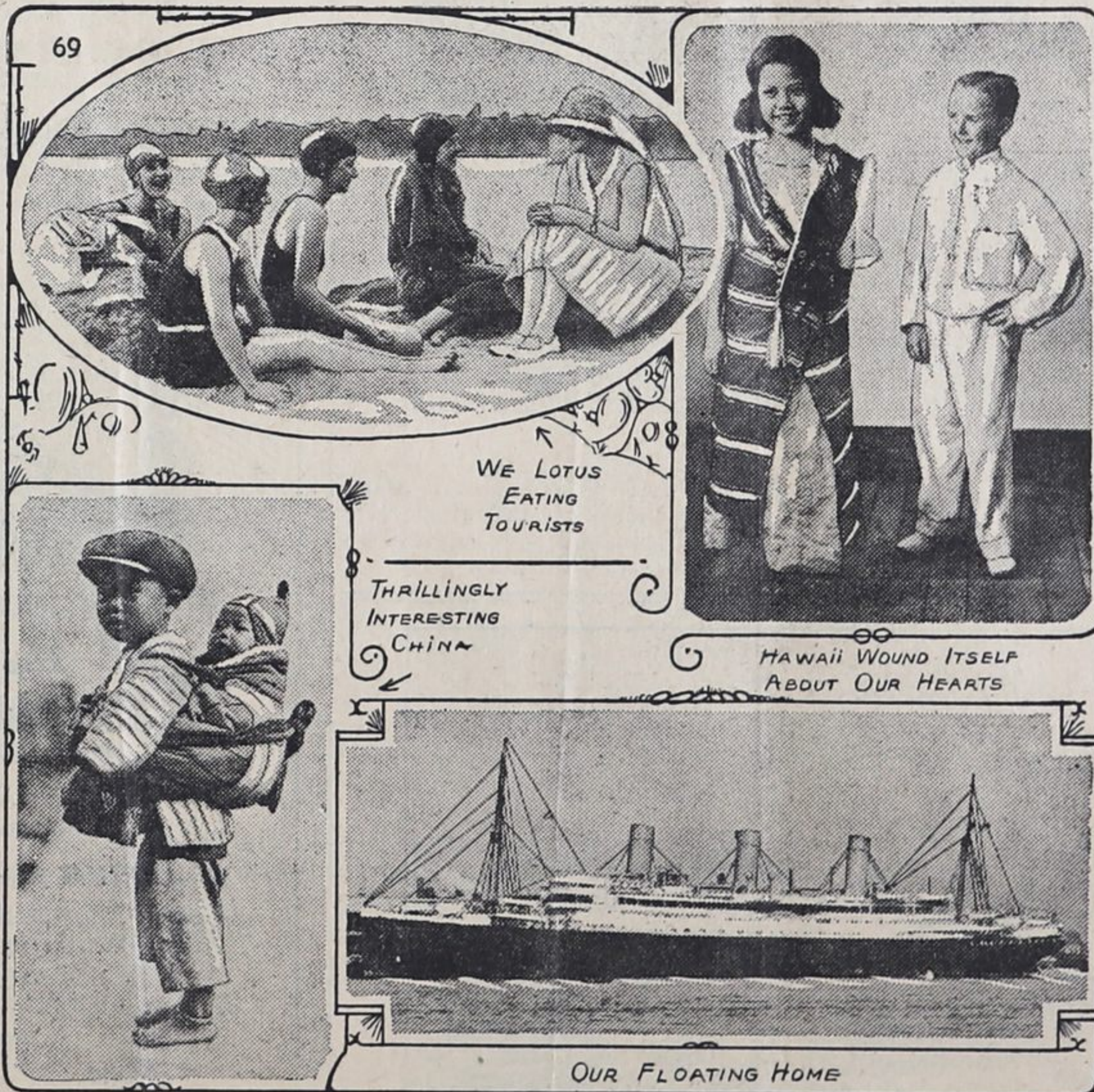
last winter. Defence candidates are Bill Bagshaw, former Upper Canada College Junior star, and a great aid to the local Intermediate group winners last season, Verne Tuppling, former Toronto Canoe Club luminary, and probably the heaviest man out for a position on the team. He carries 185 pounds of avoirdupois when in playing shape, and can hand out the body in the approved way with skill and abandon. Up front there will probably be "Pap" Hylands, who needs no introduction to local fans, nor does Jimmy Pritchard or Joe Garipey, who all performed wonderfully for the locals during the past season. Then there is Eddie Baker, whose home is in North Bay, where he was at one time a member of the noted "Trapper" band of that city, who has just graduated from Pharmacy, and has accepted a position with P.H. Wray's drug store, and Lawrence Northcott, new teller at the Bank of Nova Scotia, whose exploits as a hockey, softball and baseball player in Brantford are referred to in another column. The local boys who graduated from Junior ranks and others will be given every opportunity of catching a place on the team.
