Mr. Adshead states that the affair was purely accidental. Mr. Macdonald had no time to either stop his car or dodge the boy, as he came out suddenly from behind the wagon. The motor car was brought to a stop as soon as it possibly could be and the driver did all in his power to save the child. Mr. Macdonald had his little daughter with him in the

The little boy was taken immediately to the Red Cross Hospital and a doctor summoned. After an examination, it was considered best to bring him back to his home, where he is being taken care of since. He is getting along nicely and it is thought that there are no serious injuries.
