Lack of Snows Stops Road Graveling for Relief of Settlers

The graveling operations on the highways here, commenced as a measure of relief for the farmers who lost their crops through the excessive rains, has been temporarily held up owing to the lack of snow for sleighing on the roads. Some graveling had been done in the Englehart section and in other parts, but the continued lack of snow has forced the shutting down of the work for a time.

The amount appropriated for this riding is \$75,000, all of which was to be spent during the winter. Other operations included the completion of the survey of the route between Cobalt and Latchford, where some changes are to be made. This survey has been finished but it is stated that there is not much work that can be done to advantage before the spring. Some rock cutting is necessary in the improvement to be made and this may be carried out this winter. It is stated that there may be a change in the location of the road entering Cobalt from the south to eliminate two or three bad curves.

On his return he was appointed physician to the Hydro Electric Commission and was stationed at Niagara. He was buried at his old home in Bracebridge.
