

Trip of Seniors to North Even Break

Lost at Iroquois Falls on Saturday, but Defeat Porcupine on Monday

The northern trip of the local Senior hockey team resulted in a showing of good and poor hockey by the boys. At Iroquois Falls, on Saturday night, they scored a goal in the first couple of minutes, and looked to be away on the right foot, but before the end of the period the Falls had scored a couple of soft ones on long shots, which seemed to take the heart out of the team. This left the score 2-1 for the Papermakers, and they added three to their total in the second, while Haileybury had to be content with one. Then in the third the Eskies ran in four, while Jamieson's crew were only able to dent the twine once. The final score was 9-3.

"Baldy" Northcott had the distinction of scoring all three of the Haileybury goals, two coming on passes from Eddie Carmody.

However, the local lads were not dismayed, and sailed into the Burgoyne crowd at South Porcupine on Monday evening, uncovering much the same brand of hockey as they did here against Kirkland Lake, and gaining the decision, 4-2.

It was a hard blow to the South Enders, who had surely expected to hand out a defeat to the Haileybury hoppers. At that, there was trouble about referees, and South Porcupine almost lost the game by default through not having made the arrangements for officials on time.

The score by periods was 2-1, for Haileybury; 3-2 and 4-2, with Northcott, Hylands, Tupling and McKnight counting the goals for the County Seaters and Jemmett and Spence doing the scoring for the homesters.

At one time in the second period the game took on the aspects of a Donnybrook, and only quick action by Referee Fahey averted serious trouble. At one time the teams were down to three men each, but Fahey called the players in to the centre and told them that five and ten minute penalties would be the rule for further breaches, and the lads settled away to play the game.

The only accident to the players was suffered by Harry McKnight, who had a tooth knocked loose from its moorings, but he expects to be able to make the trip to Kirkland Lake on Friday with the rest of the team.

Jack Fitzmaurice broke into the line-up at South Porcupine on the front line and his work was good. All the rest of the crew played up to the mark set in the Kirkland game here.

The crowd at South End was much impressed with the display and accorded the Haileyburians plenty of vocal support, which was surely appreciated.

All the Juvenile hockey players who have registered with John Fitzmaurice as willing to take part in the Juvenile League, are asked to report at the rink on Saturday morning at 10.00 o'clock sharp, when teams will be drawn and schedules drafted for the remainder of the season. The local Rotary Club are sponsoring the league in town and members are taking a keen interest in the development of the younger players, who will man the Haileybury teams in future years, it is hoped.

Cobalt Junior hockeyists will be with us again on Friday evening, and in spite of the result of the games already played, a large number of enthusiastic fans are sure to be on hand to see the kids perform. Haileybury to date has had every bit as much of the play as the Silverwings, but lack cohesion in attack, and have been weak in the nets. These faults will be remedied and the locals hope yet to make a race of it.

Haileybury Seniors travel to Kirkland Lake on Friday to tackle the crew coached by Ernie Doyle, who have just succumbed to other clubs for their fourth straight loss and are almost ready to bite their keeper. If a sufficient number signify their intention of going, there will be a special train leaving Haileybury about 4 o'clock and returning after the game. The fare will be in the neighborhood of four dollars for the return trip, and the train should arrive back here soon after midnight.

Sport Notes

The tidbit of the local hockey season is expected next Tuesday evening, when the Iroquois Falls Eskimos invade Haileybury for their second trip. The Falls lost out in their first venture here, 3-2, after a rough-and-ready battle, but had sweet revenge last Saturday in laying Haileybury out, 8-3, making it even-Stephen. The game on Tuesday will either establish Haileybury definitely as a real contender for N. O. H. A. honors, or put them in a precarious position so far as the championship is concerned. The boys are confident that they can come through and beat the Papermakers.

The N.O.H.A. Secretary has sent a notice to all clubs regarding the conducting of games, and the supplying of adequate protection for the referee and players from over-zealous fans. Two incidents of spectators taking part in scraps on the ice have already been reported to the Association by the referees. The first was right in Haileybury, when the Iroquois Falls players started a fracas, which resulted in quite a tangle before the police cleared the ice, and the other was at the opening Junior game in the Southern group at Chapeau last week, when fans mixed in a feud between a couple of the youngsters. No fair-minded hockey fan looks with favor upon certain hot-tempered individuals mixing up in scraps on the ice, and those who do hop over the boards should know that they are only jeopardizing their team's chances as the referee has power to forfeit a game when spectators get on the ice. The official is out there to handle such situations, and will have the backing of the League in doing it.

Defeated at Cobalt Last Friday Night

Local Junior Team Was Weak in the Nets, and Lose Out, Score 9-2

The second meeting of the Junior teams in the Central N.O. H.A. group, resulted in a win for the Cobalters, 9-2, but the score does not indicate the play, Haileybury appearing very weak in the all-important net position.

One of the features of the tilt was the lack of penalties. The game was almost over when Jack Hennessy drew a minor for the only trip to the hoosegow. Fred Austin, who handled the game, was very strict, especially in the offside line. Cobalt players are chief offenders in this, the wings nearly always being away ahead of the puck-carrying centre man, and the checking up of this will result in the boys being taught how to properly keep inside in later games, which will be more important.

There were a couple of slight changes in the Haileybury line-up, Howard Hall appearing at right wing, and Boissonnault going to left. Cooper again turned in a great game for Haileybury, while Hennessy and Adamson, on defence rushed well. Fitzsimmons, in goal, was the weak spot, his principal failing being to flop on the ice at the first sign of a shot from the Cobalt snipers.

Cobalt players all worked well, with the alternates showing improved form over their first appearance. Coach Hylands has other material coming on which will be given a chance to show in games soon.

Max Bennett landed three tallies for Cobalt, with Maher and C. Dixon each getting a pair and Roy Bennett and Murray Watts getting the remaining two. Jack Hennessy got Haileybury's first on a lone rush, while Hall made sure of the second on a pass from Cooper.

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Cobalt Juniors Won Here on Monday 7-1

Home Crew Have Big Share of Play But Cannot Score Goals

Cobalt Juniors again gave the Haileybury boys a whaling in the first game played on the local ice, outscoring the homesters by 7-1, for what appeared like an easy victory. The score, however, does not indicate the play, as the old goal weakness was again very much in evidence, the change from Fitzsimmons to Villeneuve not being anything to cheer about in the way of improvement. "Dutch" tried hard, but simply could not keep his eye on the gypsum, and the only ones he stopped were those which hit him. He even had the misfortune to drag one in, in attempting to clear.

In territorial play, Haileybury was every bit as good as Cobalt, but the weak net-minding and lack of finish inside the opposing defence decided the margin in goals scored. Time after time, Cooper, Adamson, Hall and the other forwards were inside the Cobalt rearguard, but either shot right into Smith's pads or missed the goal entirely, and their only goal was not scored until within a couple of minutes of full time when Cooper back-handed one in after trying persistently all the way through from his own side.

There was only one tally in the first frame, Max Bennett grabbing it on a pass from brother Roy five minutes after the opening bell.

The Silver Towners got two more in the second, W. Dixon and Maher combining for the first, while Max Bennett notched the second on a pass from "Cus" Dixon. The Cobalters ran in four in a row in the third, Roy Bennett getting the first on a play started by Kostuik; then Villeneuve scored one on himself with C. Dixon at the goal-mouth, ready to help. Max Bennett stepped through alone for the third, and gave Hutt a pass for the final couple of minutes later. Then Cooper got Haileybury's lone goal to finish the scoring for the night.

Despite a bitterly cold evening there was a fair number of fans to watch the game, including several from Cobalt and New Liskeard, the latter coming down to watch the Liskeard boys who are on the local team this winter, Cooper, Adamson, Hall and Fitzsimmons.

Cooper was about the best on the ice, checking the whole Cobalt forward line himself and doing a tremendous lot of puck-carrying, giving passes when they should have done the most good, and making himself a real menace to Cobalt. Adamson, Hall, O'Grady and Boissonnault also worked well, and Godin did some useful checking while on. The defence pair of Jacks, Gordon and Hennessy, rushed well, but showed a disinclination to pass the rubber, which the Cobalt defence soon wised up to.

The Bennett kids, slippery as a pair of eels, were the pick of the Cobalt clan, with the two Dixons and Carl Hutt also showing up well. Foyle, who started on the defence with Hutt, was hurt in the final frame and had to be carried off, after striking the boards with his head.

The game was not rough, but eleven penalties were inflicted by Referee "Speck" Baillie, of Cobalt, who handled a good game.

Hennessy and Hall, of the local team, had two minors each, with Cooper and Boissonnault drawing singles, while Cuthbert Dixon spent two sessions on the fence for Cobalt, and M. Bennett, R. Bennett and Maher were the others to decorate the mourners' bench.

The teams play in Haileybury again on Friday evening, and it is expected that further changes will be made in an effort to help the scoring ability of the locals, as well as strengthening up the goal position.

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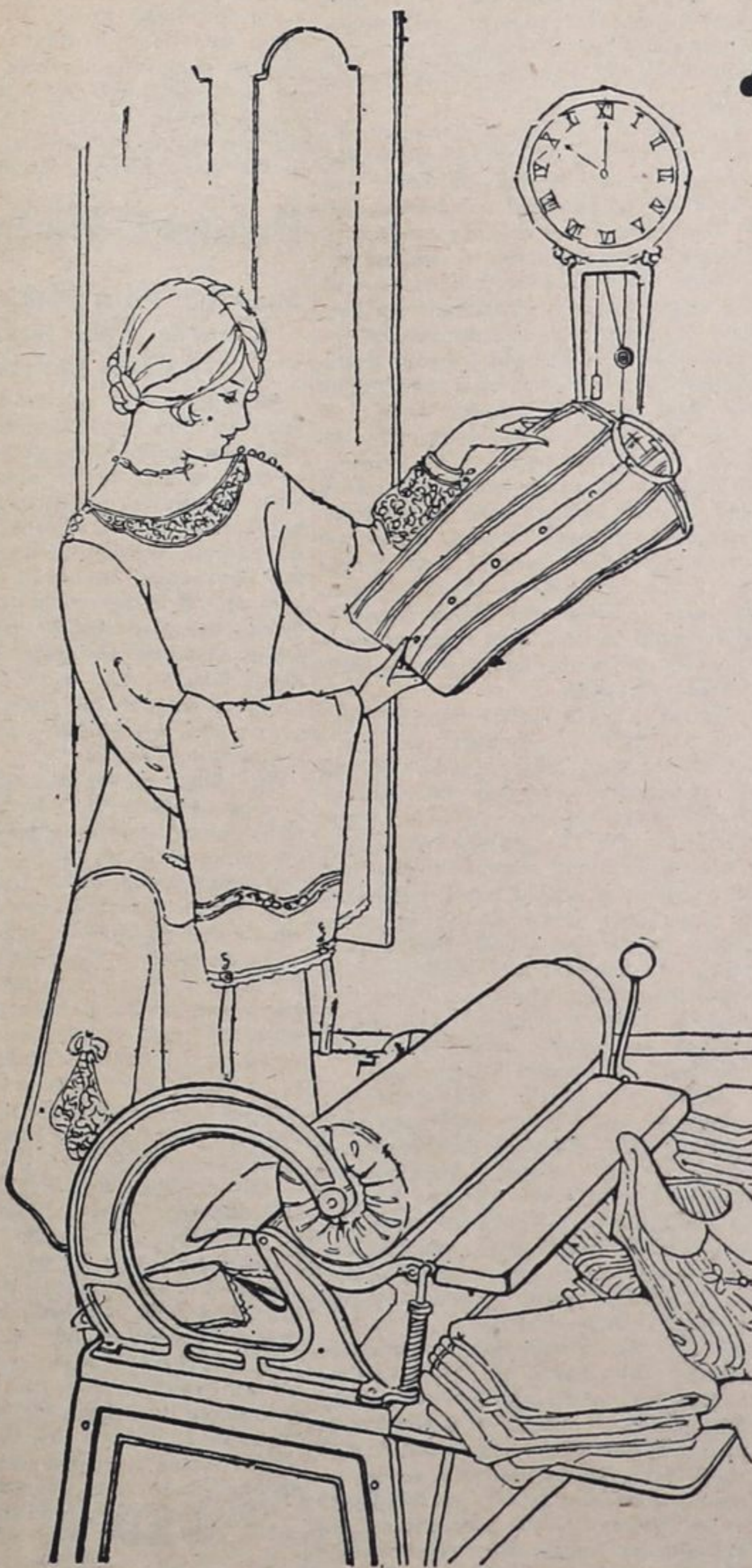
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
