New York Is Paying High to be on Time

Telephone Company Takes in 35 Cents a Minute for Telling the Hour

New York—This city is paying the New York Telephone Company 35 cents a minute in order to find out what time it is.

Several years ago the telephone company discontinued the practice of telling its subscribers the time of day whenever they wanted to set their clocks or watches. But housewives became tired of calling across the air shaft to learn the time from Neighbor Jones and business men found the numerous clocks that line New York's streets did not always agree.

The result was that the telephone company established a special "time telling department." It sells time just like a store sells eggs, shoes or overcoats. The charge is 5 cents. If a subscriber calls up Meridian 1212, and a honey-voiced operator replies, "The time is now 3.51," his telephone is charged with a local call. If someone drops a nickel in a toll-box telephone, it doesn't come back to him as it did in the old days when the operator would tell him the hour.

During the first seven days that Meridian 1212 was in operation, there were 77,160 requests for the time, which means that New York residents spent \$3,858 for the knowledge thus retailed. The calls, according to the telephone company's records, reach the peak between the hours of 5 and 6 p.m.

Bill in India to Curb Bolshevism

Government to Publish Text of Public Safety Measure

Simla, India.—The Government of India will soon publish the text of the public safety bill dealing with Bolshevik agents other than Indian or British subjects of Indian states. The bill provides for the removal of agents not coming under these classes and is expected to provoke a lively discussion in the Legislative Assembly in September.

Agents will be asked to execute a bond giving security for good behaviour until their removal from India, failing which they will be detained in custody. The breaking of such a bond will render the agent liable to arrest without warrant and to maximum imprisonment of a year in addition to a fine, but the prosecuting authority can only be the Governor-General in Council.

No order for removal can be questioned in any court while the officers acting under the law will be protected against legal proceedings for actions performed in good faith. The Government of India declares evidence recently has accumulated of subversive activities and intentions of the Communist international directed against India.

Fur of New Rabbit Is Like Sable

Two of a new variety of rabbits, called sable rabbits, stated to have great commercial possibilities, have been on view at Minehead, Somerset. Mr. G. A. Drake, secretary of the British Sable Rabbit Club, who was one of the judges, said it was impossible to distinguish their fur from real sable, and the white hairs in their coats defied the dyer's art. "It takes about thirty rabbits to make one sable coat, and I am getting six guineas each for two-month-old sable rabbits. The Prince of Wales is very much interested in these rabbits, and many well-known people are breeding them," states the secretary.

\$500 Reward in Hassell Radio Fake

Radio League Committee Acts at Hartford to Learn Who Sent False Signals

Hartford, Conn.—The Executive Committee of the American Radio Relay League, Inc., at a special meeting voted to authorize a reward of \$500 for information leading to the apprehension of the person or persons who broadcast the messages signed "Rockford Filers," which are now believed to have been false.

Officers of the organization are thoroughly aroused over the suggestion that the messages, purported to have been sent by the missing fliers, Bert Hassell and Parker Cramer, may have been broadcast by some licensed amateur operator as a practical joke. "We have committed ourselves to the task of running down the persons who sent the messages," the league's secretary, Kenneth E. Warner, said, "and will go to any lengths to apprehend and punish those responsible. We are broadcasting the announcement of the reward from every amateur station in the league chain, and we hope, in that way to get something definite and concrete to work on."

Mr. Warner also declared that, should the person or persons who sent the fake messages be apprehended, the Radio League will take an active part in the criminal prosecution and will ask that the extreme penalty for the crime be imposed. The maximum penalty for transmitting a false message of distress is five years imprisonment and a fine of \$5,000.

Canada Calls Off Its Search
Ottawa—Search in Northern Canadian waters for the missing airplane, Greater Rockford, was called off by the Canadian Government here, after receipt from the Rockford-Stockholm Flight Committee of a telegram stating there was positive proof that the plane had been seen over Greenland last Sunday morning.

"Associated Press reports from Greenland, through Copenhagen," the message read, "absolutely identifies Greater Rockford as plane seen over Fiskerhnaes, Greenland, Sunday morning at 10.30 Greenland Time. Danish Government vouches for veracity of sheriff who sent the report to Copenhagen."

The Canadian Government notified George P. Mackenzie, head of the Arctic expedition aboard the Canadian Government patrol ship Beothic, which is now rounding the southeastern point of Baffin Land on her way to Lake Harbor, that search for the Greater Rockford in those waters could be abandoned.

Thus goes on the fascinating and endless quest for "black gold," one mighty industrial chorus which ceases neither day nor night.
