Sick and Out of Work Cobalt Man Takes Life By Hanging

Mike Dredhart, a married man with seven children, committed suicide in a stable at the rear of his home on North Avenue, Cobalt, on Thursday afternoon last. He used a piece of wire fastened to a beam in the stable to hang himself, after going out at o'clock and cleaning out the stable. His dead body was discovered by a boarder in the house at about 1.30 and, although it was still warm, efforts at resuscitation were unavailing.
