Sick and Out of Work Cobalt Man Takes Life By Hanging

Mike Dredhart, a married man with seven children, committed suicide in a stable at the rear of his home on North Avenue, Cobalt, on Thursday afternoon last. He used a piece of wire fastened to a beam in the stable to hang himself, after going out at 1 o'clock and cleaning out the stable. His dead body was discovered by a boarder in the house at about 1.30 and, although it was still warm, efforts at resuscitation were unavailing. He had apparently stood on a small keg, while he attached the wire to his throat and then kicked the keg from underneath. His feet were barely clear of the floor when the body was discovered. Dr. G. E. Case was summoned immediately but found that the unfortunate man was dead.

Investigation by Provincial Constable Roth and Coroner Dr. Kane convinced the officers that it was a clear case of suicide and no inquest was ordered. Mrs. Dredhart stated that her husband had threatened to take his own life on different occasions recently on account of ill health and lack of employment, and the police say that he had acted peculiarly at times. He was 39 years of age, was Polish by birth and had been in Cobalt for a number of years. The oldest of the seven children is only 13.

Toronto Train Was Nine Hours Late on Account of Wreck

The derailment of a freight train just south of Sundridge at about midnight on Thursday last was the cause of the Toronto train running some nine hours late. It did not reach Haileybury until 8.45 on Friday night, with the result that no Toronto mail was received here that day. There were fifteen cars of the freight train that left the tracks, but none of the crew suffered injury.

No. 47 was routed via Scotia Junction and Capreol to North Bay and should have reached here about five o'clock, but further delay was caused by a breakdown of the engine before the train reached the city. This was the first serious delay that has occurred in the train service this winter and the Toronto train was the only one affected.

the net, and many fans believe it went through the mesh and into the cage, not from in front. There was no doubt about the final tally. Securing at his own goal, he tore down right wing, sidestepped the defence, pulled the goalie out, and with all the coolness in the world flipped the disc into the empty net. It was a stylish effort and drew rounds of applause. The Doctor also took time to give Spence a pass which resulted in a tally. Chuck Jemmett got the other goal on a smart solo sally, just at the end of the second spasm.

The ill-luck which has been dogging Haileybury all season, culminated on Saturday night, when Craigie McFee had the ligaments torn badly in his shoulder and will likely be out of the game for the remainder of the season. And it came just when the big right winger was hitting the stride which had been expected of him all season. Carmody and Tupling suffered similar injuries earlier in the season, and both were out on the ice on their grit alone on Saturday evening. Billy Bagshaw was unable to play, owing to a severe cold, and Freddy Austin took Bill's place on the defence. "Tuffy" stepped into all and sundry who attacked the Haileybury citadel, but his offensive work did not threaten the Porcys lead at any time. Tupling was not so effective as usual, favoring his injured shoulder in bumping.

"Baldy" Northcott, Harry McKnight and "Pap" Hylands were best of the home crew and stuck

right to their jobs all evening. Aubrey Jones, Liskeard, subbed at left wing, and for his first appearance, did well. He showed lack of practice and had not been drilled on the local team's play.

Outside of the first goal, "Tub" Sutherland was good in the nets, thwarting several snipers after they had got inside the defence.

Hudson, Jemmett, Mills and Baxter were best for the winners, the Doctor being the "big noise." The alternates, Gagnon, McHutcheon and Cook, were sparingly used. Gilmour showed a nice turn of speed, but didn't get anywhere. Spence continues to loaf as of yore, and reverted to his old circling ways on Saturday, throwing the other forwards off-side on numerous occasions.

McFee's accident came when he tried to hurdle Johnnie Cook's stick at the Porcupine defence. He was tripped, and before he hit the ice he was bodied, causing him to land on his shoulder. He had to be carried out.

Gilmour received a nasty bump when he got in front of one of Lou Hudson's backhand shots which had been lifted from behind his own goal line. The puck hit Gilmour's head and laid him out. It raised a real "goose-egg" on the defence man's cranium.

Ken Buchan handled the game, and was away below his usual standard of refereeing. He fell behind the play too much and let numerous things get away from him. In fairness to him, however, it should be stated that he had a sprained ankle, which interfered somewhat with his skating.
