

## Local Player Named For All-Star Team

**Romley Hughes, Buffalo Defence Player, Chosen on Can. Pro... Hockey Line-up**

In commenting on the all-star team of the Canadian Pro. Hockey League, chosen by sports writers in the various cities, the Buffalo Times has the following to say about one of our Haileybury boys who made the team:

"Rusty" Hughes is regarded around the league circuit as one of the stiffest checkers and most dangerous rushers playing on the defense. He has proved a tower of strength to the Bisons and his aggressiveness has practically kept Buffalo in the fight for a place in the first division right down to the final game. His injured ankle was probably the cause of Buffalo not making sure of a place in the first division.

He was with the Windsor Hornets for one year in 1927 and last winter was loaned to Niagara Falls. He came to Buffalo in a trade."

The team chosen as an all-star aggregation from the Can. Pro. loop is made up of Herb. Stuart, Detroit, goal; Arbour, Windsor, and Hughes, Buffalo, defense; E. Goodfellow, Detroit, centre; F. Carson, London, and Wes. King, London, wings.

"Rusty" had his start as a juvenile in Haileybury, and after the rink was destroyed by fire in 1922 he played a couple of seasons with the Cobalt Juniors in the N.O.H.A. 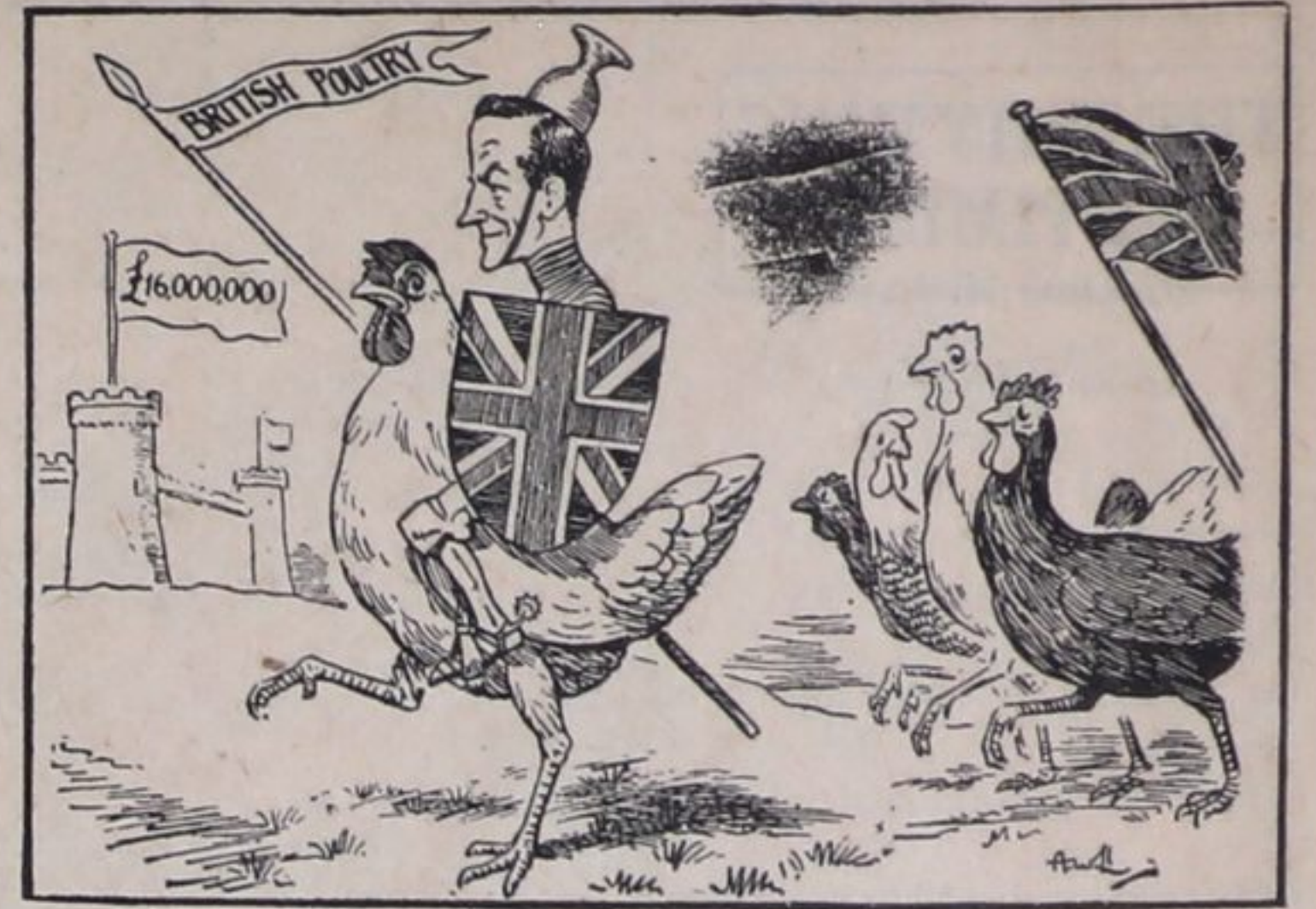

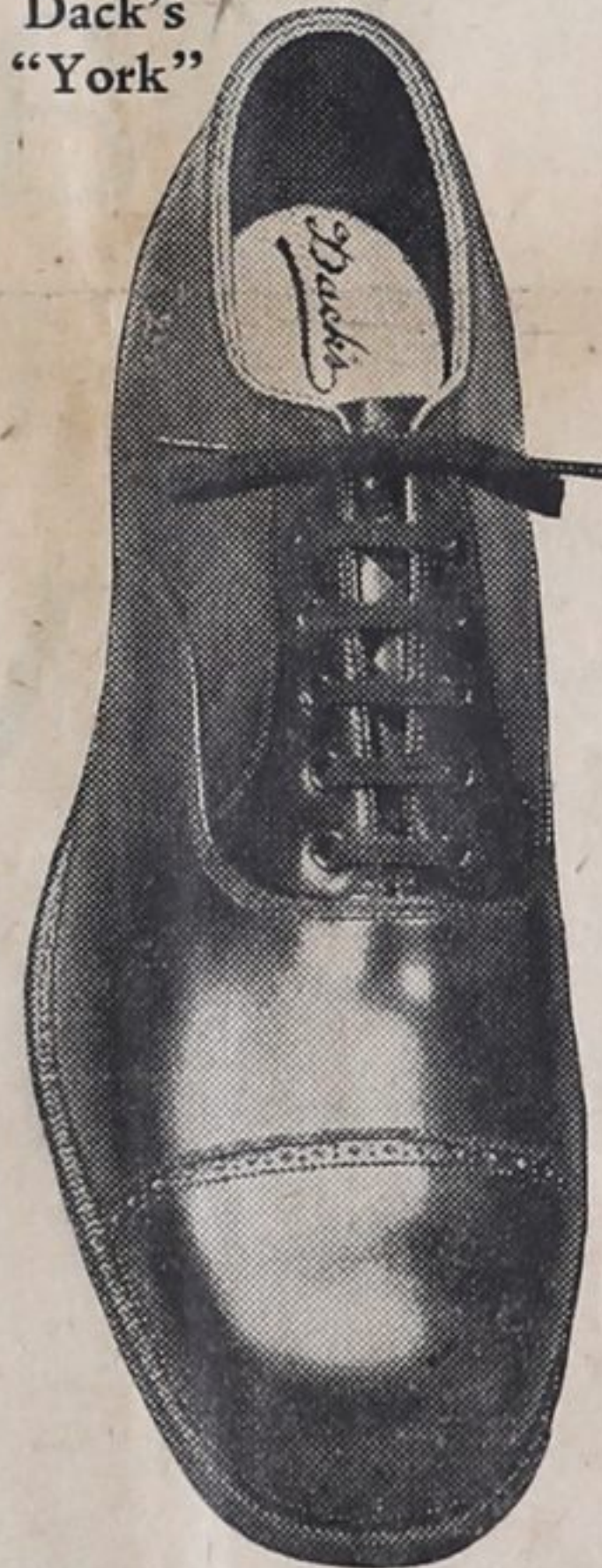
