

Golf Championship to be Decided This Week

Expect About Sixty Players to Line up for Contest at Iroquois Falls

The Northern Ontario Golf championship will be decided this week-end at Iroquois Falls, with most of the clubs in the North Country being represented by some of their best players.

The qualifying round is being played today, with sixteen places to fill for the match play which follows on Friday. The semi-finals should be over on Friday afternoon, and the final will be on Saturday morning.

There will also be a Consolation round for those who do not make the qualifying grade, and this will likely be on Friday, as well.

It is expected that about sixty will tee off this morning in an attempt to bring the title home to their own clubs.

Howard Teskey, of North Bay is the present holder of the title, and he will be at the Falls to defend his laurels against all-comers. Bobby Lee, 1927 winner, and Jock Stokes, of Timmins, finalist last year, also will be on hand to match drives, brassies, mashies and putts with the other aspirants.

The annual meeting of the Association will be held on Friday evening, with the election of officers and the selecting of the place for the next championship tournament. It is said that the Sudbury Club will make a bid for the 1930 title event.

The representation from the Haileybury Club this year will be small. Most of the tournament class players are unable to take in the event owing to pressure of business and various other reasons, and this is to be regretted.

Some of the North Bay players were in town on Sunday on their way north, and had a couple of rounds on the local course, just to tune up for the big event.

MOTOR CYCLE OFFICER CROWDED INTO DITCH AND HAS LEG INJURED

Provincial Constable Roth, in charge of traffic on this section of the Ferguson Highway, is in the Mines Hospital, Cobalt, suffering from injuries sustained when he was crowded off the road by a passing motorist on Tuesday night north of New Liskeard and his motorcycle turned over. It is reported that a small bone in his ankle is broken, but otherwise he is not seriously injured.

(Continued from Page 1) vice to his house on Amwell St., where the service had been installed jointly with another house and was not satisfactory. This was left to the waterworks committee to deal with as early

as possible. It was decided to have a new floor laid in the kitchen of the Red Cross Hospital, where a burst boiler had caused the old floor to warp until it was not fit for service. There had been an inquiry from a Cobalt man as to what price the town would accept for the fire team, but the council decided that it was out of the question to purchase a new team this year.

There was some discussion over proposed improvements to the site of the soldier's memorial on Main Street, where it was stated that if the town would provide drainage labor would be forthcoming from another source to level off the slope from the plot to the roadway, seed it down and keep the grass cut.

Several schemes were discussed, such as a wooden culvert, flat stones and cinders, but no definite action was taken at the meeting. There was also a discussion over the matter of making approaches to the sidewalk

for individual property owners, a practice that it was said had been in force at one time but had been discontinued in recent years, until steps had lately been taken to

have one put in. Councillor McKinnon, chairman of the streets committee, held the view that this was something that had been continued, but in this he was op-

Approach a railway crossing carefully and at moderate speed. If you have not a clear view up and down the tracks, be particularly careful.

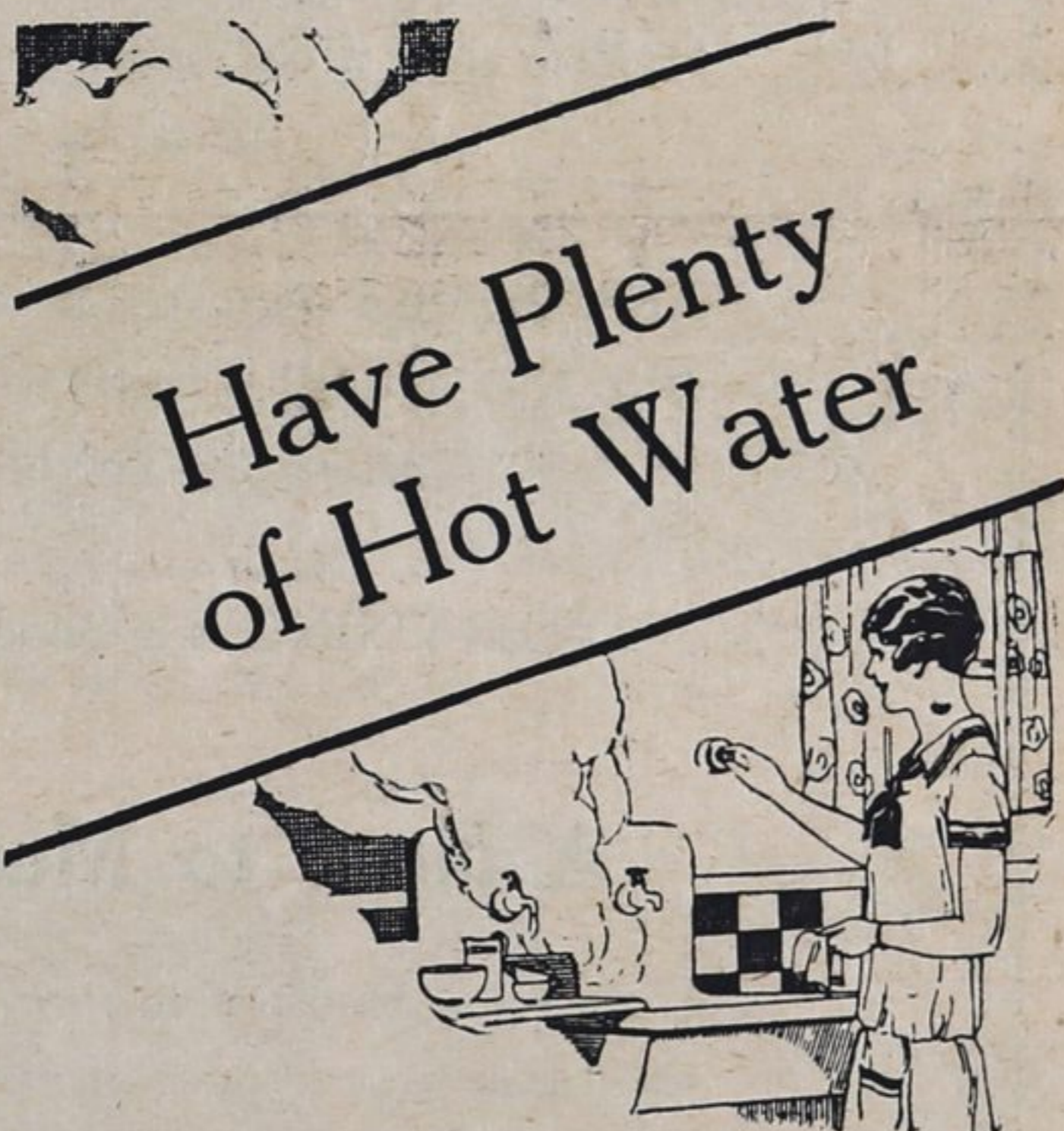
At double tracked crossings after a train has passed, make sure no train is coming from the other direction.

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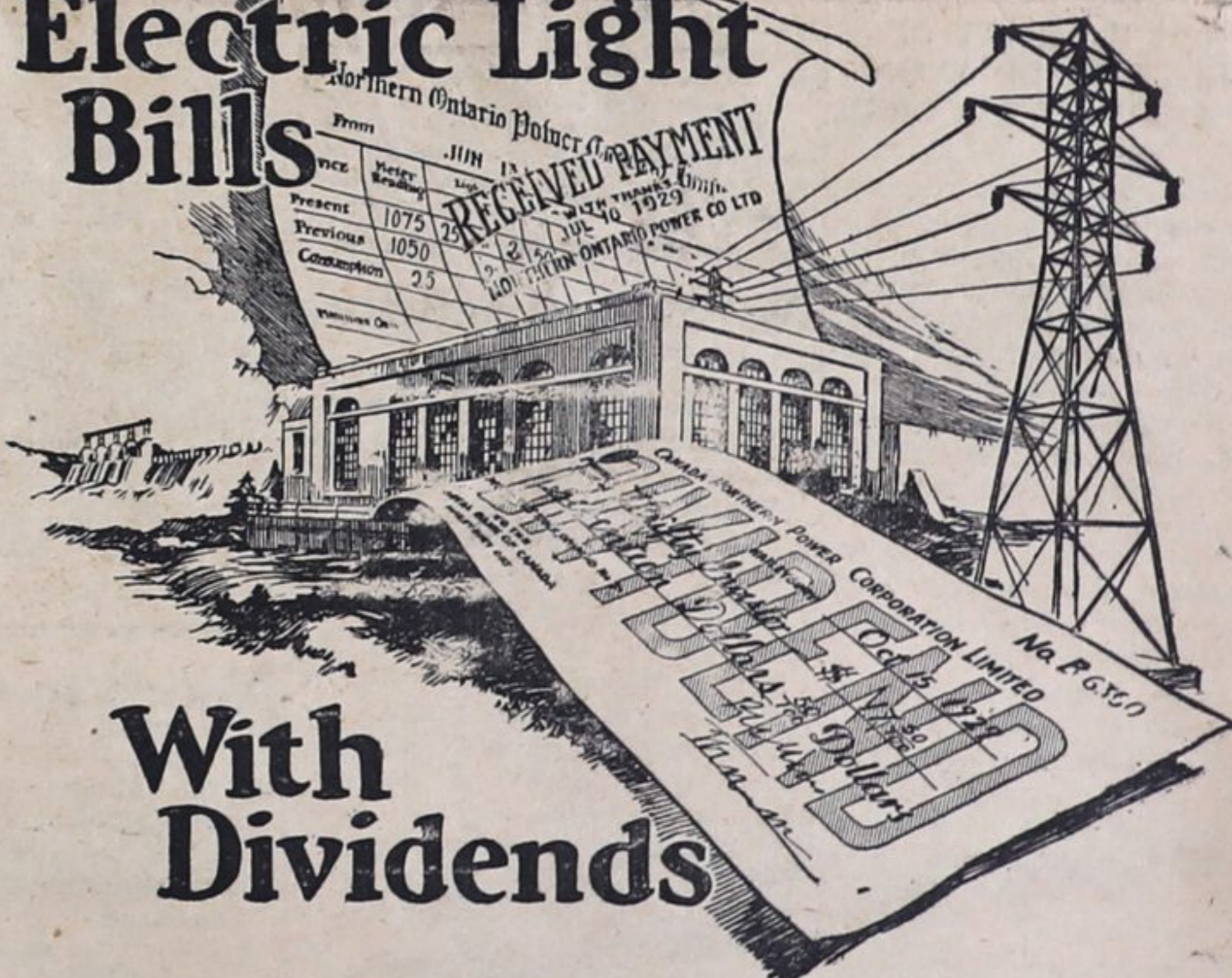
