Interests connected with the Brownlee Mines say that official reports state that, from their recent trenching operations, hand assays showed gold \$45.91; copper 2.6% or \$9.90; and silver 3.1 oz. or \$1.80, making a total of \$57.61 per ton in copper, gold and silver.—Northern Miner.

Mr. and Mrs. E. Savage when leaving their house on the Badger property, Giroux Lake, the other morning, were surprised to find a small bear in their back yard. While Mr. Savage went back to get his gun, Mrs. Savage picked up a nearby bucket of water and threw it at Bruin, who apparently considered the welcome too cold a one to seek further acquaintance, walked quietly past Mrs. Savage, crossed the road to the Davis property and disappeared in the bush.—Northern News.

Births registered at the Township of Teck offices during the month of July exceeded the number of deaths by eleven. During the month there were recorded 18 births, ten boys and eight girls. The deaths in the same period numbered seven, five males and two females. Of this number three were babes, two were born dead and one lived only 30 minutes. The others ranged from 17 years to 48. One death was by drowning. During July seven marriages were celebrated, three according to the rites of Church of England; two United Church and two Roman Catholic.—Kirkland Lake Northern News.

were a number of important questions dealt with. Among other things was the question of the drug stores selling all sorts of goods carried by stores that come under the early closing by-law. There was special reference made to articles carried by the jewelry and hardware stores. It was pointed out that it was against the provisions of the town's early closing by-law, and it was not at all fair to the stores that observed the early closing to allow the drug stores to handle these lines in early-closing hours. Council passed a resolution to notify the drug stores that they must observe the provisions of the early-closing by-law in regard to such sales.—Porcupine Advance.

Quite a number of claims have been staked in the past few weeks in the vicinity of Goward, about six miles north of Temagami. A few were located in formation favorable to the finding of

silver, but most have taken into account the chances for gold.

Most of this country had been previously staked and allowed to lapse, the first discoveries dating back to the early Cobalt days, and now several well known mining interests are taking part in the interest in this area, which in addition to the gold and silver possibilities is believed to hold promise of copper veins as well. Test shipments of copper ore at one time were made from this district.

A review of statistics supplied by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics for the week ended July 27th, indicates that while Canada population is estimated to have increased in the past year by 138,800 persons or 1.42 per cent. to 9,797,800, industrial employment has increased by nearly 6%, thus reflecting the growth of industrial Canada.

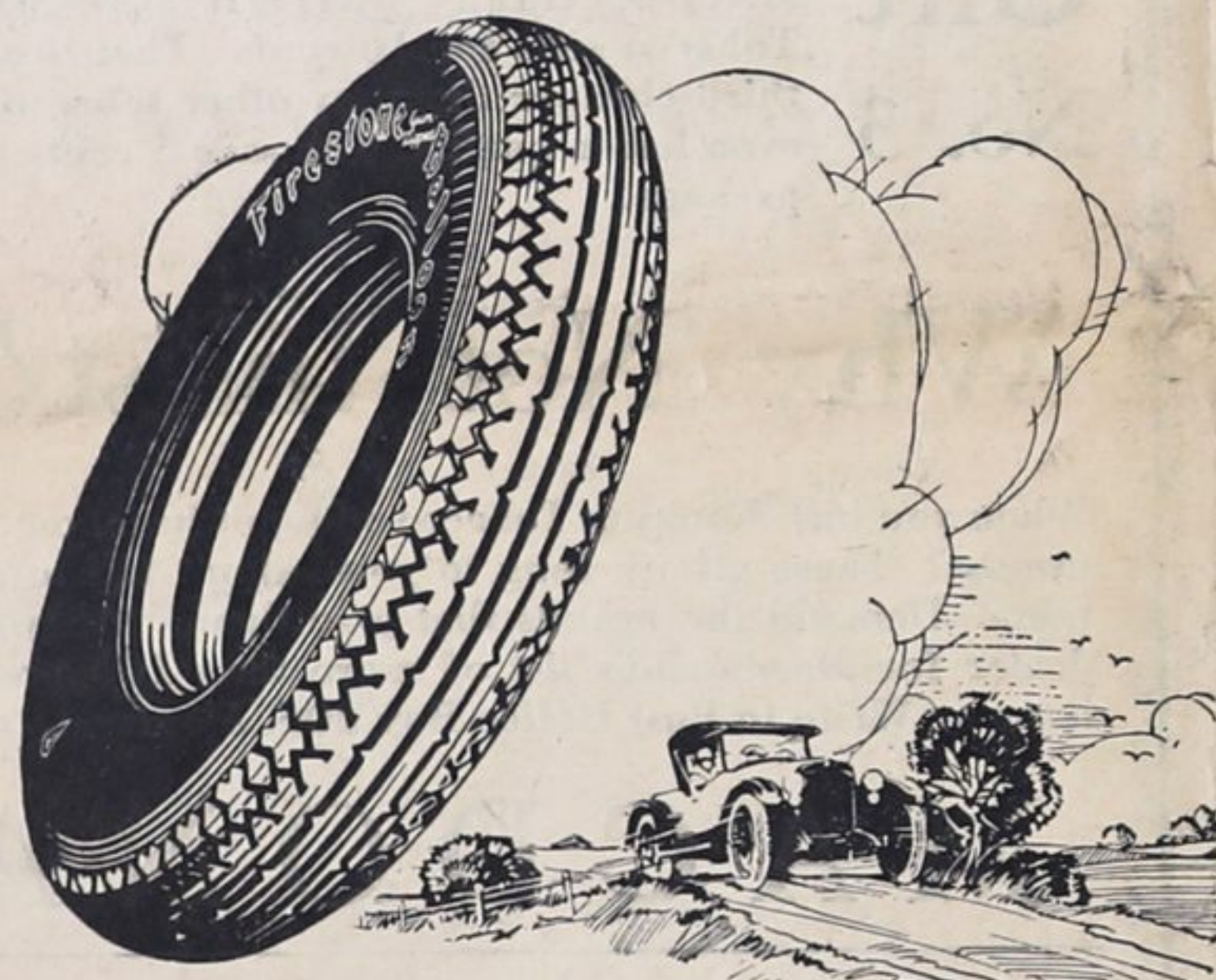
