

Curlers Foregather In Annual Session

Fifty Present at Dinner Last Week; Prizes Presented and Officers Named

About fifty members of the Haileybury Curling Club gathered at the Matabanck Hotel on Thursday night last for the annual meeting and dinner of the organization, when the activities of the past season were reviewed, the prizes won were officially presented and the officers elected for the coming season. There was great enthusiasm over the club's prospects for the coming winter and, with a prospective larger membership than last year, the activities of the curlers promise to be thoroughly enjoyed during the approaching winter.

A. L. Herbert, last year's president, presided over the meeting. In opening he welcomed to the dinner Fred Thompson, of Swastika and Haileybury, one of the oldest members of the club, and S. S. LOCAL PEOPLE HURT IN BROADSIDE CRASH ON LAKE SHORE ROAD

Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Liddicott and their little daughter all received cuts and bruises when their motor car, in which they were returning from New Liskeard about midnight on Saturday night, was struck broadside by one driven by A. Tessier, Cobalt, on the Lake Shore Road between the pulp mill and McIntosh's crossing. None of their injuries are likely to be serious, although some stitches were required to close a wound in one of Mr. Liddicott's hands.

The crash occurred when Tessier, whose car had taken the ditch, attempted to pull back on the road and swung almost straight across as the other car came along. The traffic was heavy at the time and before the roadway was cleared there were fifty cars waiting to pass. It took Chief MacGirr, who was summoned immediately after the crash, and Chief Miller, of New Liskeard, about a half hour before the traffic jam was straightened out. Mr. Liddicott's car was badly smashed and the other one was also damaged.

Assessment Figures Increases over 1928

Little Change in Population, but More Pupils Recorded in the Schools

An increase of \$58,460 in the total assessment of land and property in the town of Haileybury is shown by the figures completed this week by the Assessor, Mr. J. A. MacArthur.

The total values of land, property and business assessments are shown as \$2,265,190 and are divided as follows: Land, \$595,190 Buildings, \$1,626,375; business, \$43,625. From this is deducted the exemptions of town property, \$69,620, and other exemptions as churches, hospitals, public buildings, etc., of \$723,725, leaving a total of \$1,471,845 as taxable property, which is an increase of \$6,300 over the figures of last year.

Of this total the sum of \$278,985 is assessed for separate school purposes, while \$1,192,860 is for the public school. These figures show a decrease of \$8,260 from the figures of last year in regard to the separate school and increase of \$14,560 in those of the public school assessment.

As far as the assessor's count of the population goes there are 2,892 persons listed as permanent residents. This is a slight decrease from last year, when the population was shown as 2,919. It is accounted for, according to
