

Local Hockey Meeting Draws Large Crowd of Enthusiasts

Will Enter Junior Team in N.O.H.A.; Liskeard Likely to Have Team; May be Town League Operated

Election of a new slate of officers and the decision to enter a Junior team in the N.O.H.A. this winter, featured the annual meeting of the Haileybury Hockey Club, held in the Hotel Haileybury last Friday evening.

There was a large attendance of fans. Haileybury is assured of Junior hockey fare this forthcoming season and it is probable that a Town League may be formed to provide further games, while encouragement of Juvenile hockey by the formation of a four-team league was also endorsed by the club.

Leslie Fleming was elected as president of the club by acclamation, other officers being as follows: vice-president, Ed. Wells; secretary, Leslie McFarlane; treasurer, Allan Murray; executive committee, W. Bagshaw, Russell Murphy, Lee Bryan and Mel Bennett. Messrs. W. A. Gordon, W. Charbonneau, D. H. Angus, G. A. Bagshaw, J. W. N. Bell and Wm. Shillington were elected honorary presidents.

Following the election of officers there was a general discussion of hockey prospects for the season of 1929-30 and the opinion was unanimous that there was more than sufficient material for a live Junior entry to give Cobalt and New Liskeard battle for the group title. Vice-president Dunc. Sutherland, of the N.O.H.A., who was in attendance, stated that efforts were being made to come to an arrangement whereby lack of a rink would not necessarily hinder the entry of a New Liskeard Junior team.

Fire Chief Jos. Marcella, representing the rink committee of the Haileybury Fire Department, announced that the committee would split 50-50 with the club on the gross receipts of the usual games but that in the case of the big drawing cards the percentage would be raised to 60% in favor of the club. This offer was deemed highly satisfactory and accepted.

Formation of a Town League was left to the executive for consideration and a report on the possibilities of arranging such a local league will be submitted to the club at an early date. It was felt that the Junior series would not provide sufficient games during the season and that a Town League would not only provide good hockey for the fans, but would also assist in the development of players. A similar view was taken to the proposal to lend every possible assistance to Juvenile hockey this year, by way of building up a strong list of players for future seasons.

At an executive meeting following the general session it was decided to appeal to the citizens of the town for support in the form of moderate donations in order to raise the sum of \$250, which will be necessary to get the club away to a good start.

Bill Bagshaw and Russell Murphy were chosen to coach the Junior team and Milt Austin will be asked to handle the Juveniles. Practise nights for the Juniors were arranged for Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings from 6.30 to 7.30 subject to acceptance by the rink committee of the Fire Department, and subject to change according to the schedule.

Some two dozen players turned out to the first practice in the rink on Tuesday evening of this week and some likely looking material was in evidence as the coach put them through their paces. The team is well equipped, last season's equipment having been turned over to the club by the former executive.

For the past few days aspirants for the team have been busy signing applications for playing certificates and amateur cards.

Sectionman Killed In Enqlehart Yards

An Enqlehart despatch on Tuesday says: "John C. Merry, 55, a section man in the employ of the T. & N. O. for five years, was almost instantly killed on Saturday morning in the railway yards when run over by an en-

gine in charge of Hostler Preston. According to a report of the accident received by W. A. Griffin, superintendent, Mr. Merry stepped in the path of the engine, which was proceeding tender first. No one saw the accident.

At a coroner's inquest held on Saturday afternoon, Dr. Armstrong, of Kirkland Lake, returned a verdict of accidental death, attaching no blame to anyone.

Town Reservoir Gets Semi-Annual Cleaning

The town reservoir got its fall cleaning on Monday, when the big cement tank on the hillside west of the T. & N. O. Railway was drained out and the accumulation of dirt removed from the walls and bottom in preparation for the winter months. The work is done twice yearly, in the spring and fall, and requires the services of several men for some hours.

During the time the operation is being performed the pumping is done directly into the mains in order that there may be no interruption of the supply. The cleaning is only one of the measures taken to insure that the water supply of the town is clean and pure and there has been very little trouble in this regard for many years now.

E. W. Neelands Will Go to Newfoundland

E. W. Neelands, of New Liskeard, a resident of the North for many years and formerly engineer for the Northern Development Branch, has accepted a position as head of the Highways Department in Newfoundland and will assume his duties in the Eastern Dominion early next spring. His departure from this district is generally regretted, but the fact that the position which he will take is one of great responsibility has been the occasion of congratulations from his many friends in the North.

While Lake Temiskaming is still open, there is some ice formed at the upper end and along the shores and a freeze-up appears to be imminent if the present cold weather continues for a few days.

David Fasken, K.C., Passes at Toronto

David Fasken, K.C., prominent in affairs of the North Country for many years, died at his Toronto home early on Monday of this week after a long illness. He was 69 years of age.

The late Mr. Fasken was perhaps best known in the North through his being one of the founders of the Nipissing Mining Company and the founder and president of the Northern Ontario Light & Power Company and the Northern Canada Power Company. He took a great interest in the development of the North Country in its early stages. Besides many other activities in the business world he was, at the time of his death, president of the Excelsior Life Insurance Co., but more than ten years ago had to give up much of his work owing to ill health. He was a native of Ontario, born at Elora, where the funeral was held yesterday afternoon. Surviving are his widow, one son, four sisters, and four brothers.
