

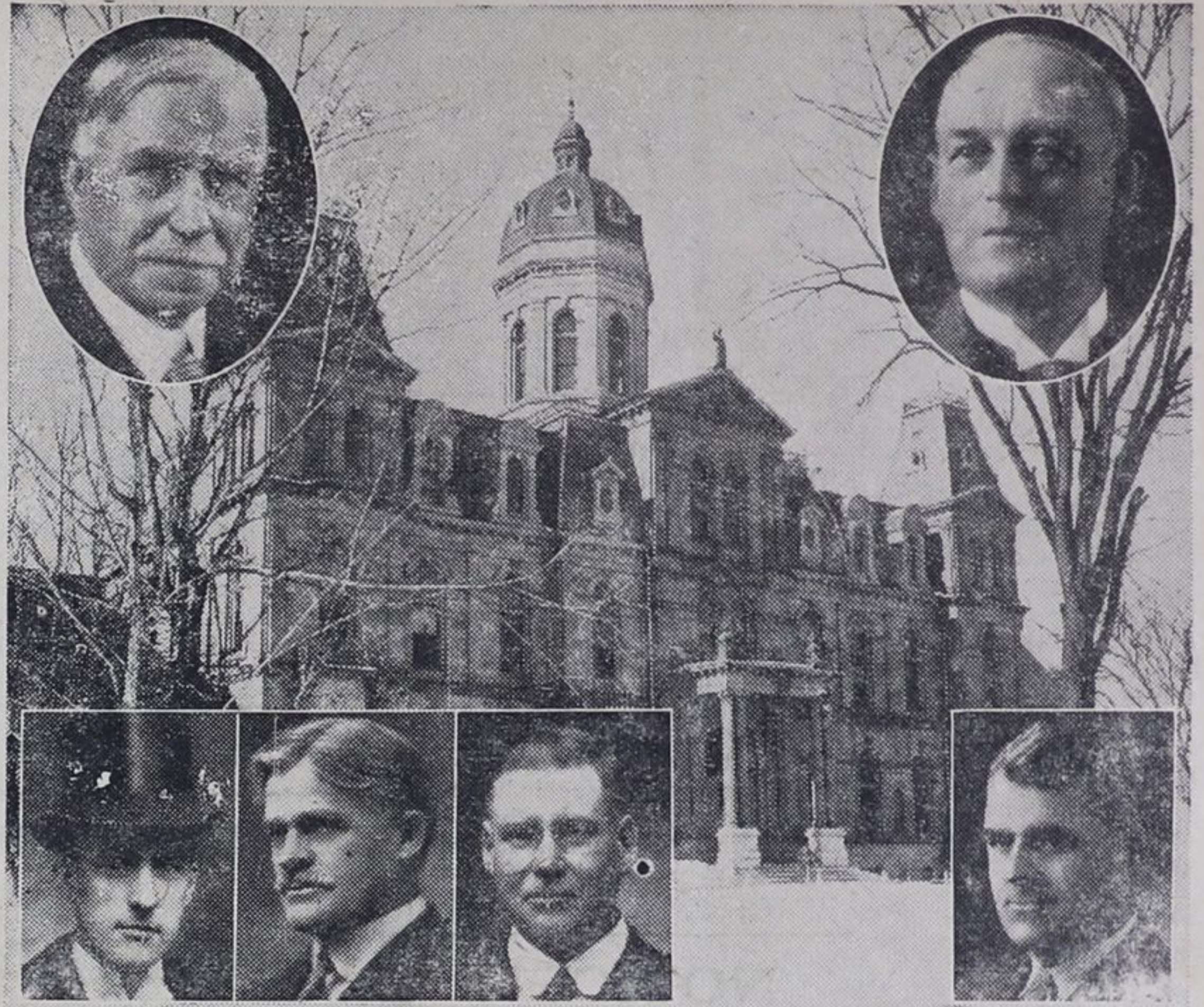

Members of Britain's Economic Council



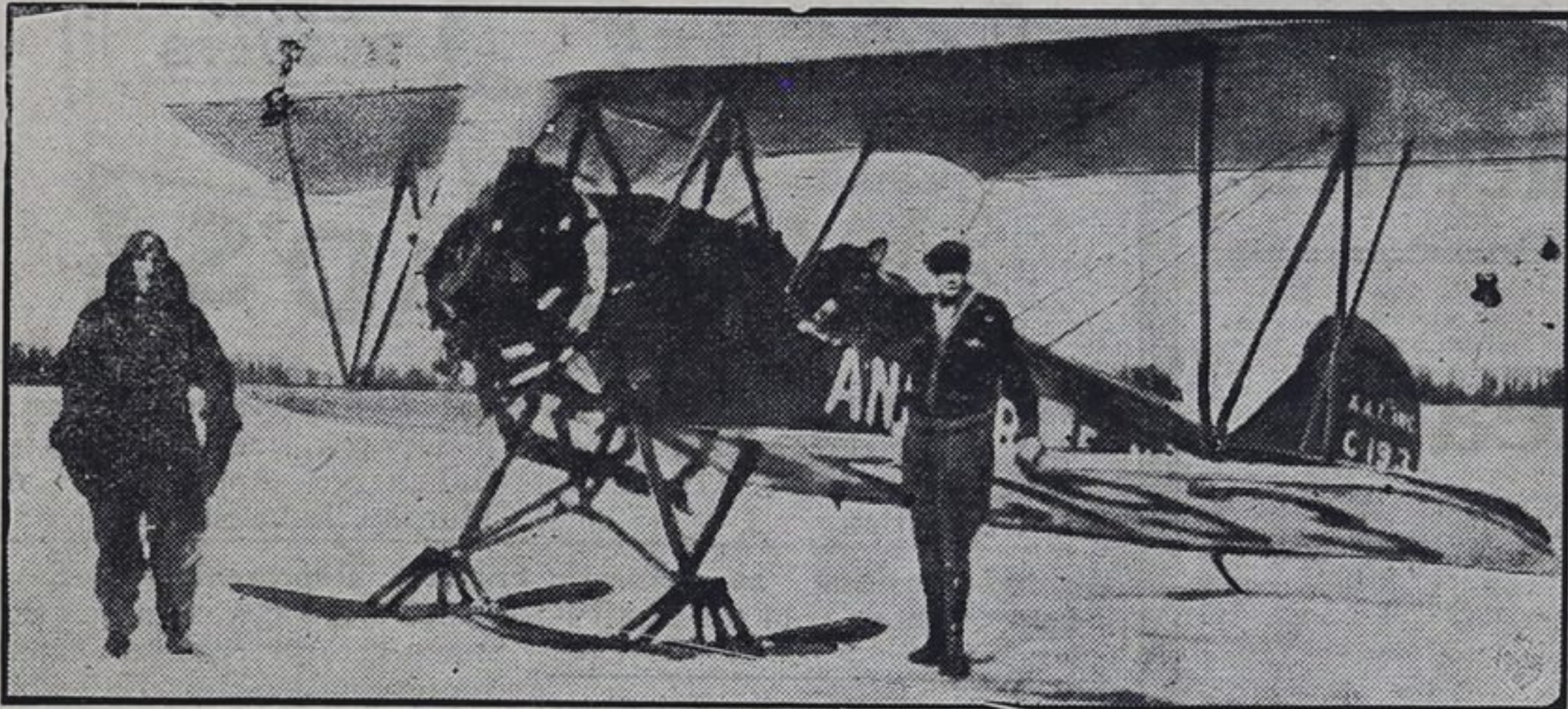
