E. C. Kingswell Dies Sunday in Toronto

Was Once Prominent Citizens of Haileybury; Funeral Held in Ottawa

Edwin C. Kingswell, M.E., for many years a well known resident of Toronto, died at his home on Walmer Road in that city early on Sunday morning, February 23rd. Friends here state that he had been in poor health for some months and that his death was not unexpected. Those who knew him well during his many years' residence in the North say that he was about 78 years of age.

Mr. Kingswell came to Haileybury in the early boom days of the Cobalt silver camp as a mining engineer. During his residence here he took an active part in public affairs of the community. He was at one time president of the Haileybury Board of Trade and for years was a member of the High School Board.

He married Mrs. Lawlor, widow of the late P. T. Lawlor, who had settled on the farm next to that of the late C. C. Farr, the founder of Haileybury. Mrs. Kingswell survives him.

After leaving Haileybury for the city, Mr. Kingswell retained an interest in the town and was at the time of his death the owner of considerable property here, although during recent years he had disposed of a large part of his holdings.

An obituary notice in the Toronto papers states that the funeral services were held in the city on Tuesday evening and interment was in Beechwood Cemetery, Ottawa, yesterday morning.

Believe Public Library Can be Established Here

Committee of Rotary Club Has Been Investigating and Reports that Project can be put over; Will Meet with Old Library Board for Further Arrangements

That everything was favorable to the establishment of a public library in Haileybury and that the institution could be opened within two or three months, was the statement of Mr. R. H. Unwin to the local Rotary Club on Monday of this week. Mr. Unwin was one of a committee appointed by the Club some weeks ago to enquire into the feasibility of the project and to collect all available data in regard to it. In his report he was quite enthusiastic over the prospects and covered all phases of the question.

The committee had secured a promise of co-operation from the library branch of the Department of Education, had ascertained that there were two or three members of the old library board still in town and had been convinced that a suitable location for a library would be available in the new building now being completed in connection with the arena, where in addition to a community hall, there are four large rooms on the ground floor. The committee had been assured by the former library board that, if the Rotary Club got behind the project, they believed the project could be carried through successfully. Judge Hayward is the former chairman, with Mr. N. J. McAulay as treasurer.

Dealing with the financial side of the question, Mr. Unwin said that there was a balance of \$416 in the funds of the old library. He estimated that \$250 would be received through membership fees and that the government grant, through the Department, would be \$150 to \$200. With \$800 or \$900 available, he said, they would have sufficient for a start. Some books would be purchased, the local Chapter of the I.O.D.E. had some on hand that would be available and several citizens had already agreed to donate others. In addition to this, the Department sends out a number of boxes of books in the form of a travelling library and it was proposed to secure one of these.

Mr. Unwin thought that about one thousand books could be secured for the opening. The committee will meet the directors of the Rotary Club this week for a further conference and it appears likely that the project will meet with success.

Old Cobalt Resident Dies in City Hospital

James Legris Was the Father of Three Haileybury Ladies and Well Known

James Legris, an old resident of Cobalt, and father of three well known Haileybury ladies, died in the Toronto General Hospital on Monday morning, February 24th, at 5.30. He had been ill for some months and had spent the three weeks previous to his death in the hospital, where it was hoped at first he would recover, but his illness proved fatal. The bereaved ones in Haileybury are Mrs. A. G. Kirkpatrick, Mrs. Dr. Arnold and Mrs. A. P. Knechtel, who have the sincere sympathy of a large circle of friends and acquaintances.

The late Mr. Legris was born in Calabogie, Ont., 74 years ago. He came to Cobalt in the early days of the camp, where he became well known and respected by the community. He is survived by his widow, seven daughters and two sons, John and Joseph, both of Cobalt.

The funeral is being held today from the family home on Silver Street, Cobalt, with services in St. Patrick's Roman Catholic Church and interment in the Cobalt Roman Catholic Cemetery.
