A government grant is made to all public libraries by the Department and is based on the amount spent by the local organization. Berdux denied that he had ever had any improper relations with Mrs. Zuk, declaring he had often gone to the house to get a drink, along with other men in Gowganda.

The jury which heard the case took some hours to come to a decision. They returned once to the court room for enlightenment from His Lordship, after which they spent another three-quarters of an hour before the final verdict, which was in favor of the defendant. A poll of the jurors, taken at the request of A. K. Roberts, counsel for Zuk, showed that ten were in favor of the defendant, while the other two held out for damages for the plaintiff. The action was dismissed without costs. W. A. Gordon, K.C., was counsel for Berdux.
