

Horticulture To Be Subject of Lecture

President Ontario Horticultural Association Speaks Here Monday Night

Haileybury residents whose thoughts are now turning to their gardens are promised a treat and some valuable hints on how to make their homes more attractive, when Mr. F. C. Nunnick, president of the Ontario Horticultural Association, will visit this district next week and will give an illustrated lecture on Monday evening in St. Paul's Parish Hall.

Mr. Nunnick is head of the Dominion Experimental Farm at Ottawa, has had wide experience in horticulture and his talks to people of the North will prove of great interest, coming as they do just at this time when thoughts of all the amateur gardeners are turning to their gardens. He is making the visit here in the interests of the Horticultural Societies of Haileybury and New Liskeard, his trip having been arranged by Mr. C. A. Byam, who is a director of the provincial association.

Mr. Nunnick has an entirely new set of pictures showing beautiful homes from coast to coast, which will be used to illustrate his lecture. While he will deal chiefly with the growing of flowers, there will be a fund of information on gardening to be had from his talk and all who are interested in the effort to make their homes, and consequently the whole town, more beautiful, should make a special effort to be present. There will be no charge for the entertainment, which will open at 8 p.m.

A meeting of the directors of the local society was held on Monday evening, when arrangements for Mr. Nunnick's lecture were completed and some preliminary work done to get the season's activities under way.

The question of the premiums to be given with membership tickets this year was discussed at some length and the directors present were of the opinion that something new should be given this year. It was generally believed that the members were now well supplied with gladioli, which has been the principal item for several years, and that some good perennials would be the most suitable for this year. It was decided that a supply of delphiniums and phlox roots would be secured and, while the quantities to be given with each membership would be a little less than was the case with the glads, the results would be quite satisfactory.

The Society will commence its membership campaign immediately and the annual show will be held as usual late in August. The date was not definitely fixed.

Earlier in the day the Women's Branch of the Society held its annual meeting and that organization is already planning for a busy season. All signs point to a good year for the Society, which is one of the oldest organizations of a public nature in Haileybury.

Lower Paper Cost by Use of Pyrite Burner

A. A. Cole Explains New Process in Interesting Address to Rotary Club

An interesting address by Mr. A. A. Cole, of the T. & N. O. Railway, was a feature of the Rotary Club luncheon on Monday of this week. Mr. Cole's subject was the "Freeman Pyrite Burner," a newly perfected system of extracting gas from pyrites. He stated that it had been necessary for the paper manufacturers of Canada to import some three million dollars worth of sulphur in the form of brimstone and that the new process will permit of this being secured in the Dominion.

Mr. Cole gave the Rotarians an account of a recent visit he made to the plant at Three Rivers, Que. where Mr. Freeman's system is being used in extracting the necessary gas from pyrites. He stated that it required two tons of pyrites to produce the same quantity of gas as one ton of brimstone, but he estimated that the saving effected would result in a reduction of at least 50 cents per ton in the cost of production of paper. In addition to this saving, the general use of the new system would result in the opening of a market for the millions of tons of pyrites throughout the North Country, which at the present time has no value whatever.

Mr. Cole also showed that the iron content taken during the operation of separating the gas from the pyrites was a very high grade of pig iron, which would be of much greater value than the ordinary pig iron now being produced. His description of the system was very interesting and his address was listened to with particular attention by those present.

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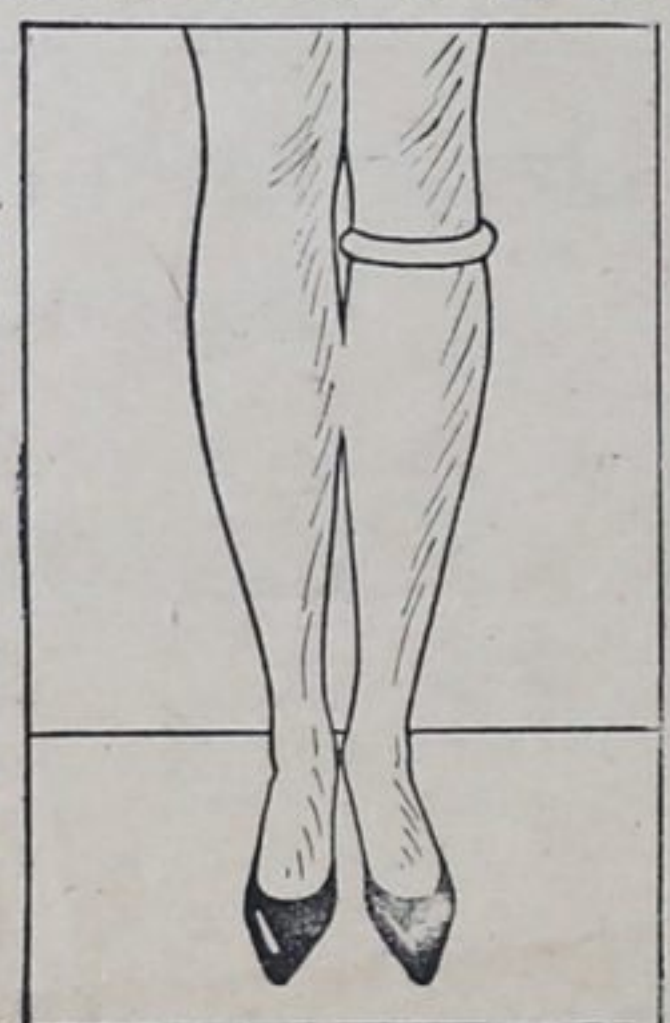
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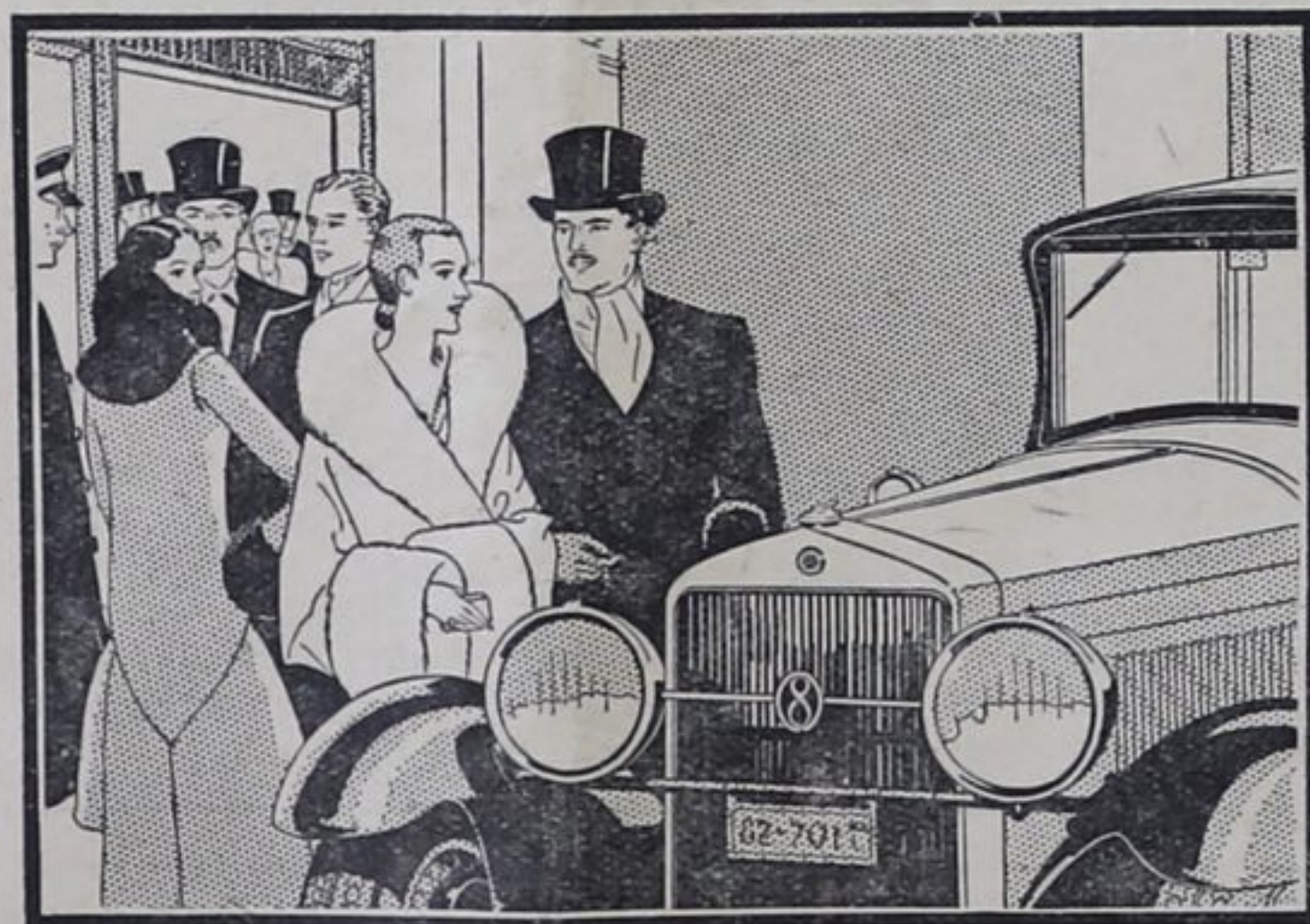
