

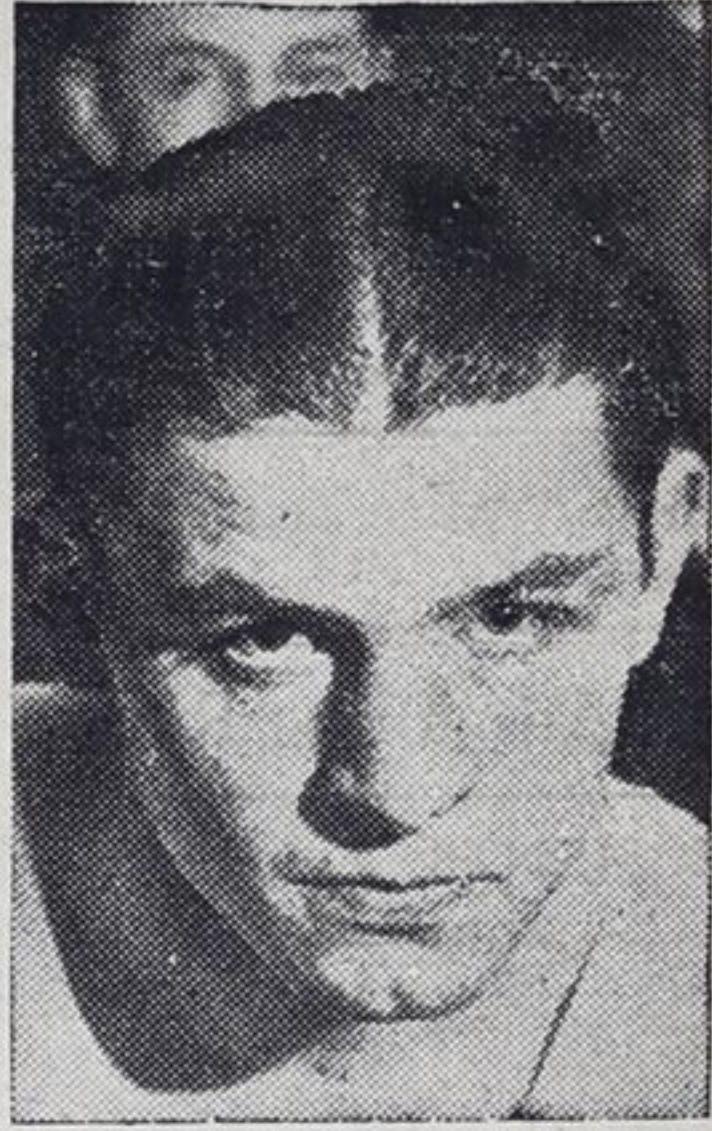

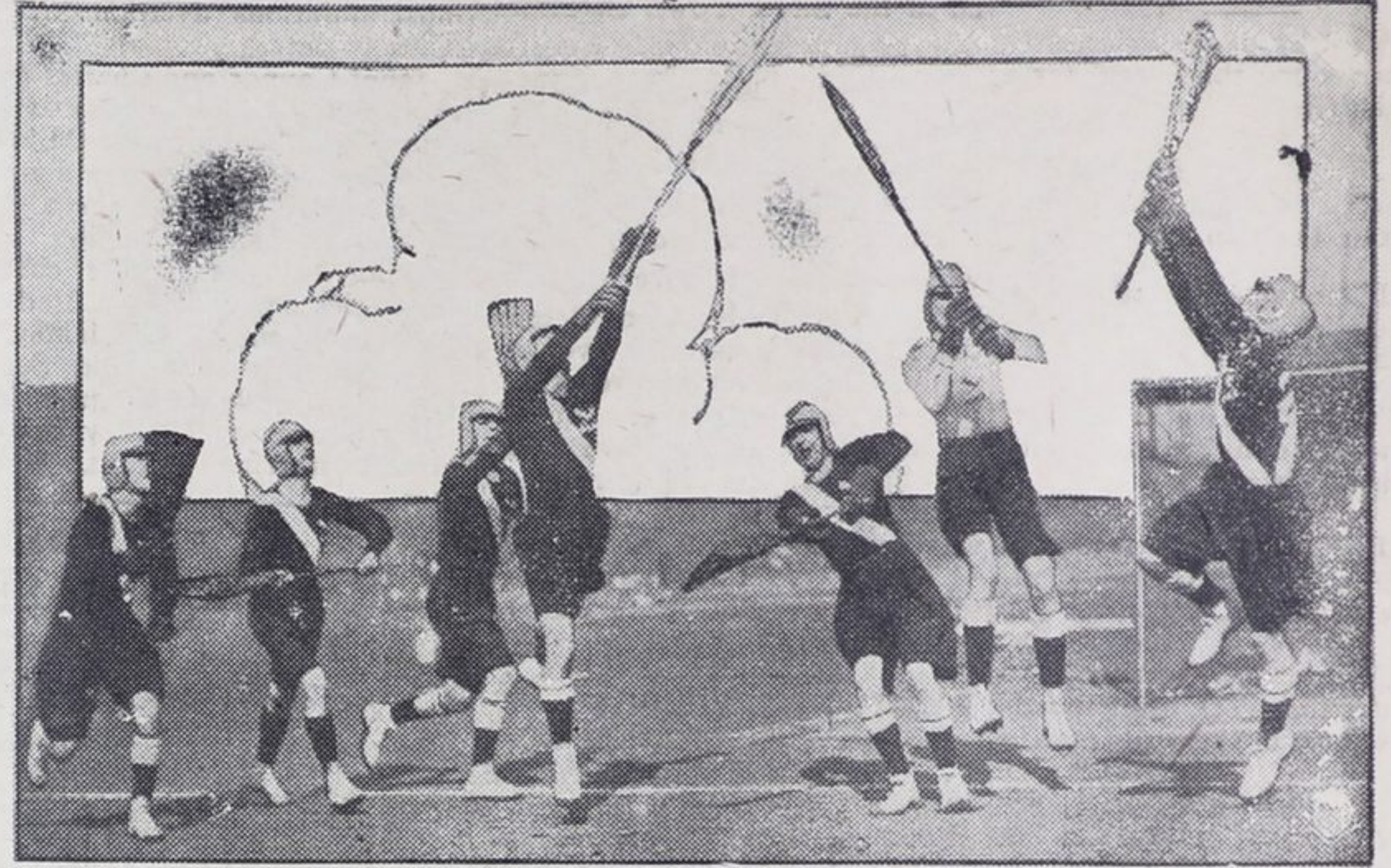

British Fighter Here



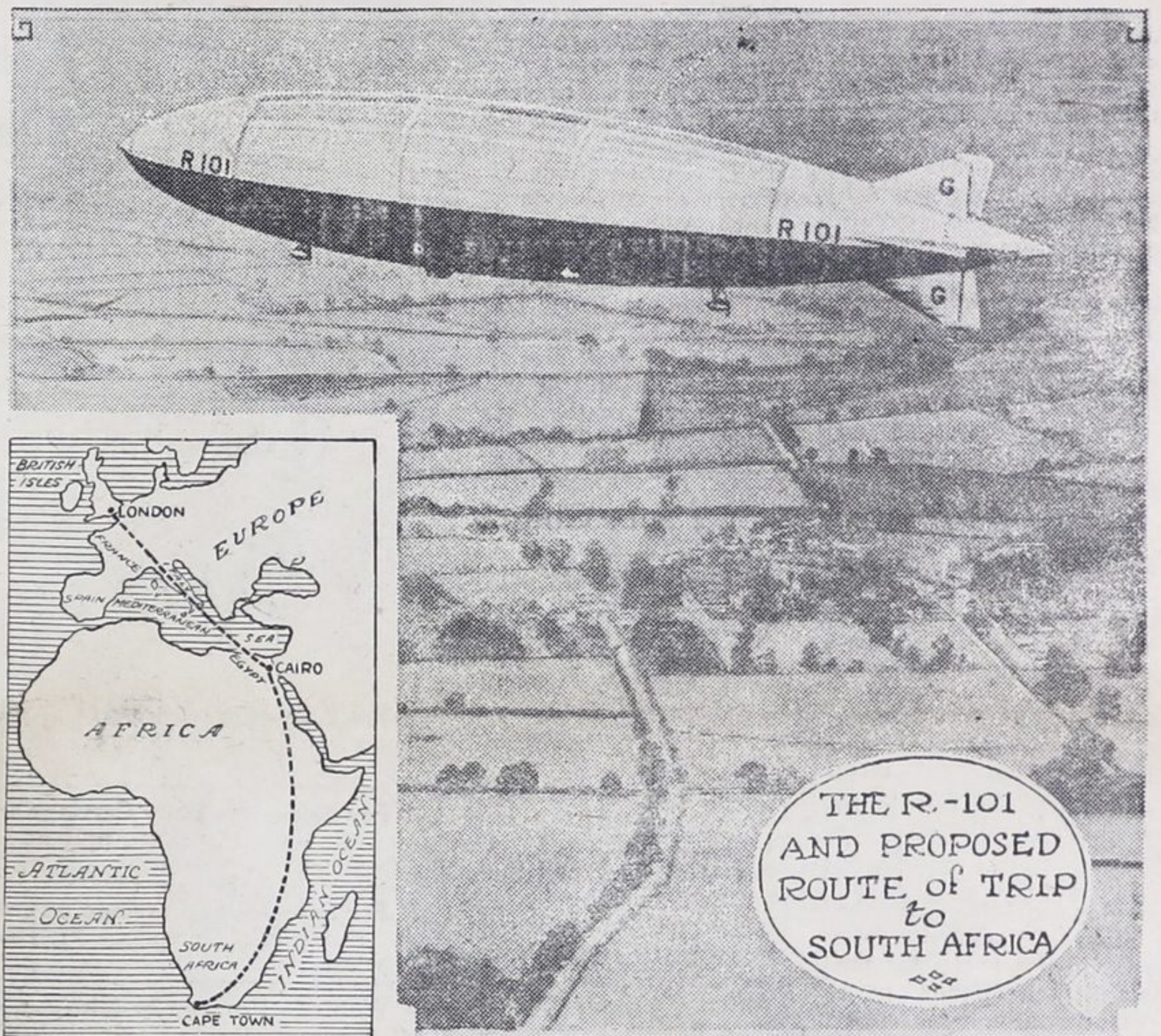

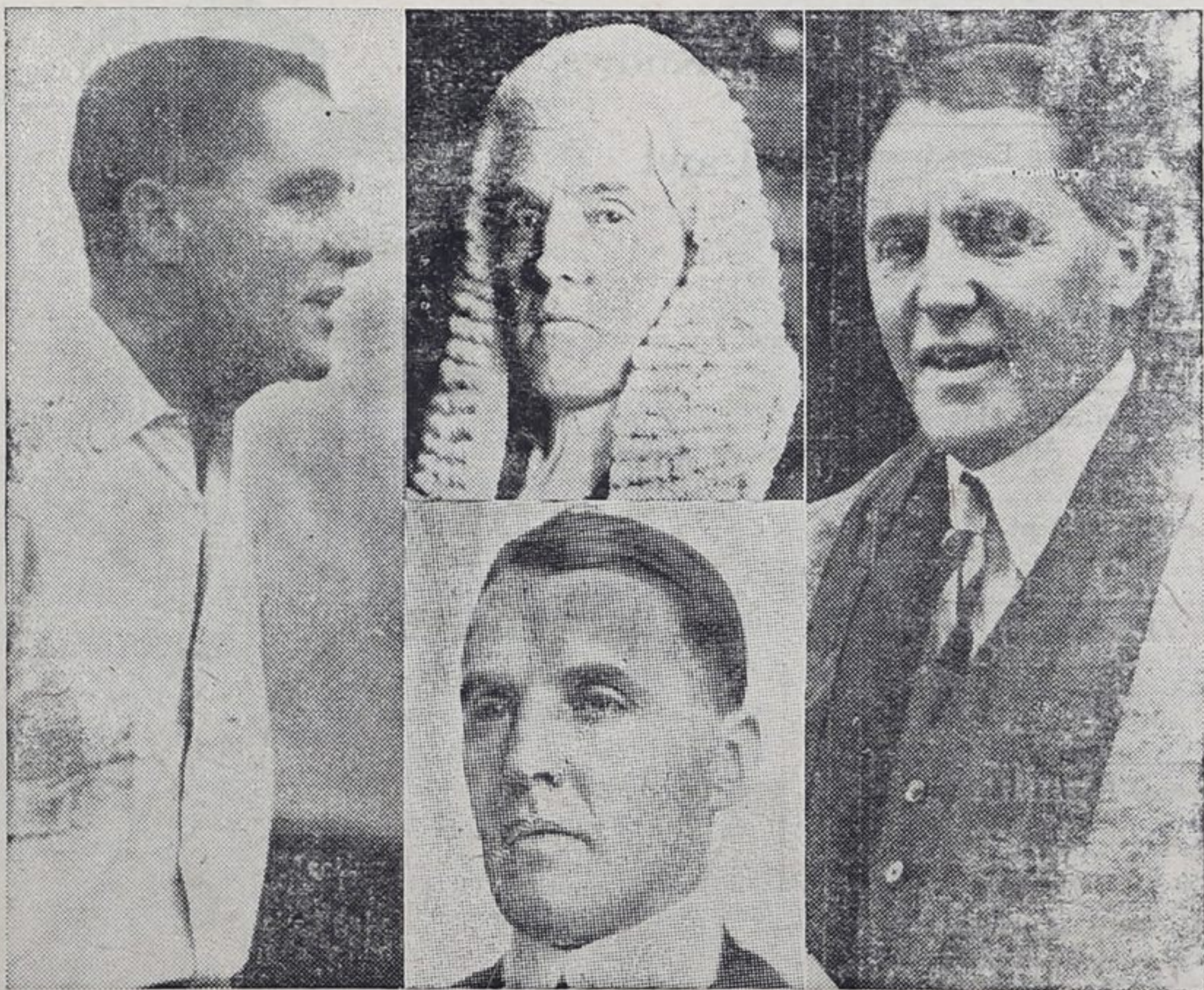

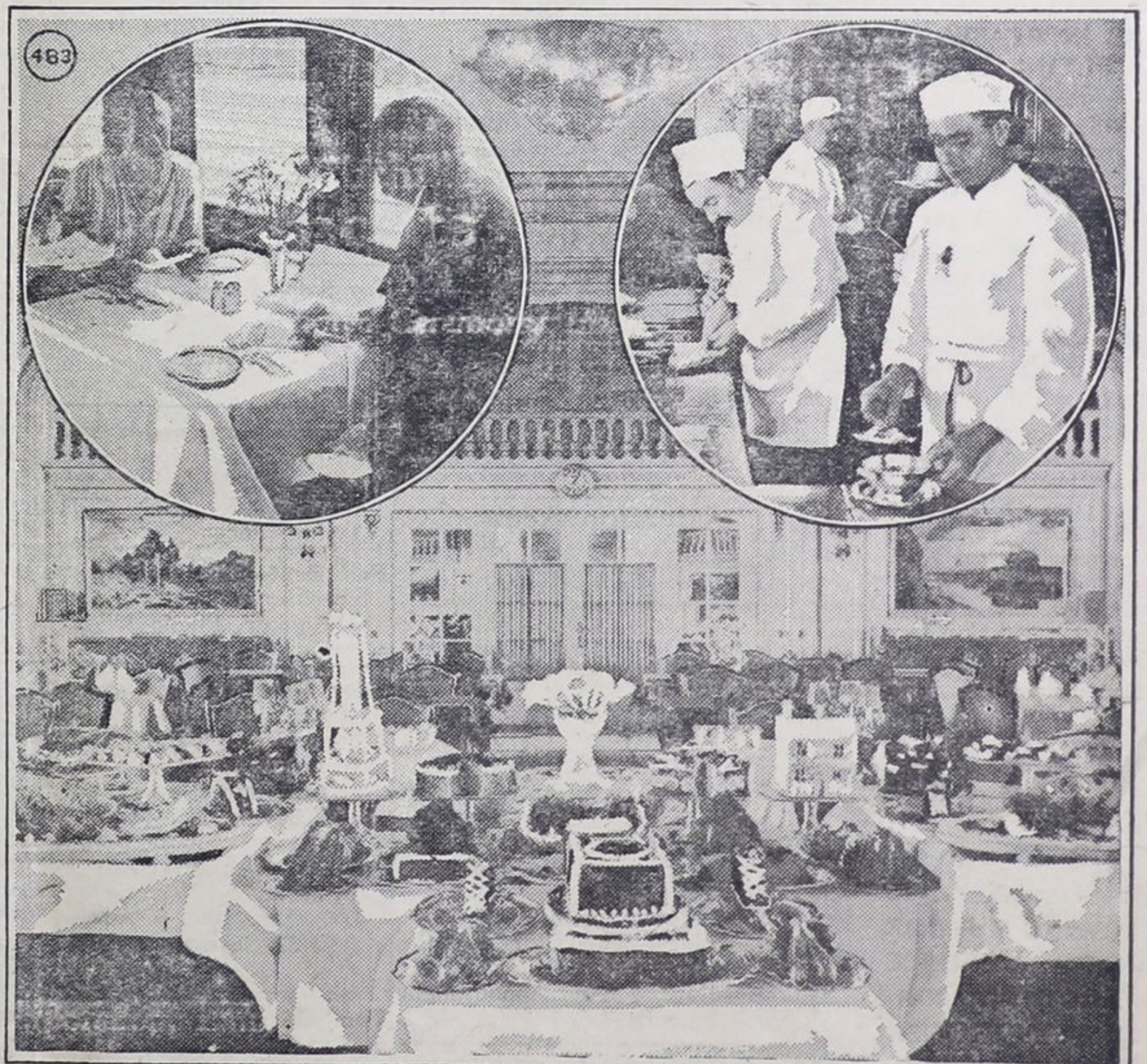

Another of Britain's Prominent Statesmen Seriously Ill



Lord Birkenhead, one of the most prominent Conservative leaders in England at the present time, is very ill in the South of France. Provides Millions of Meals Yearly



About 13,500,000 meals a year are served to travelers by the Canadian Pacific, which is the equivalent of saying that it provides 37,000 every day and 259,000 every week of the year.
