

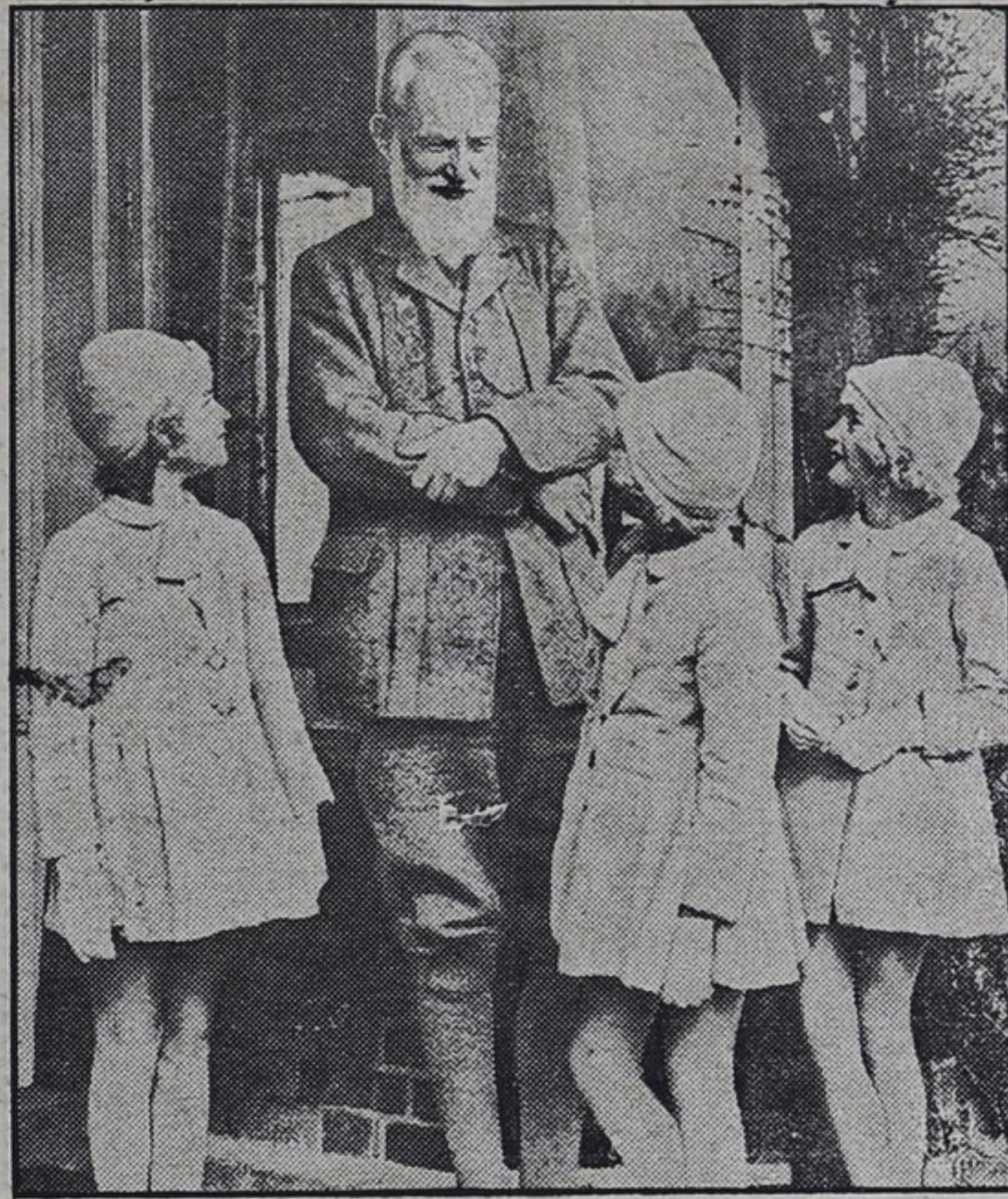

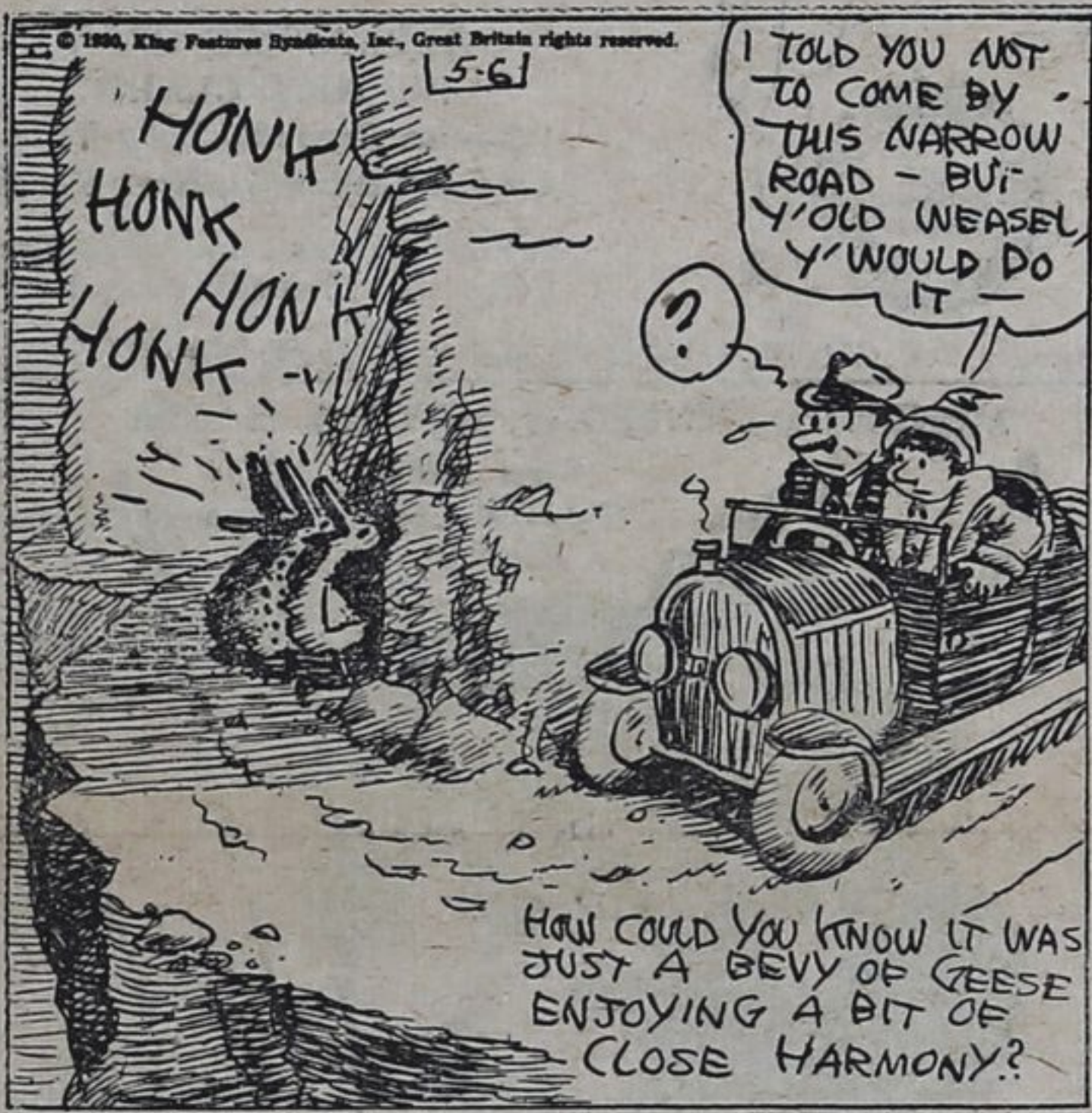

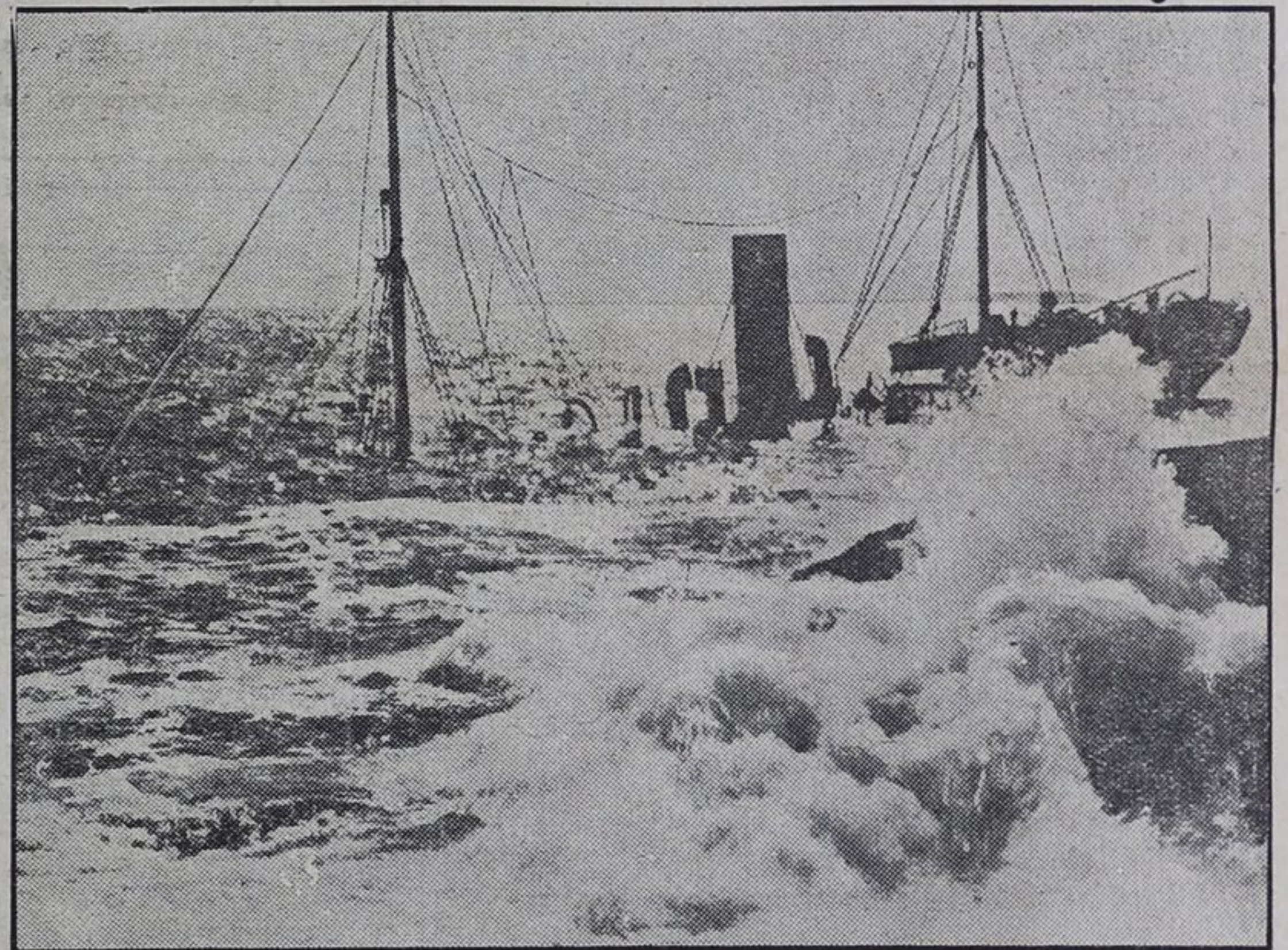
Has Choice of \$125,000 Inheritance or Love.

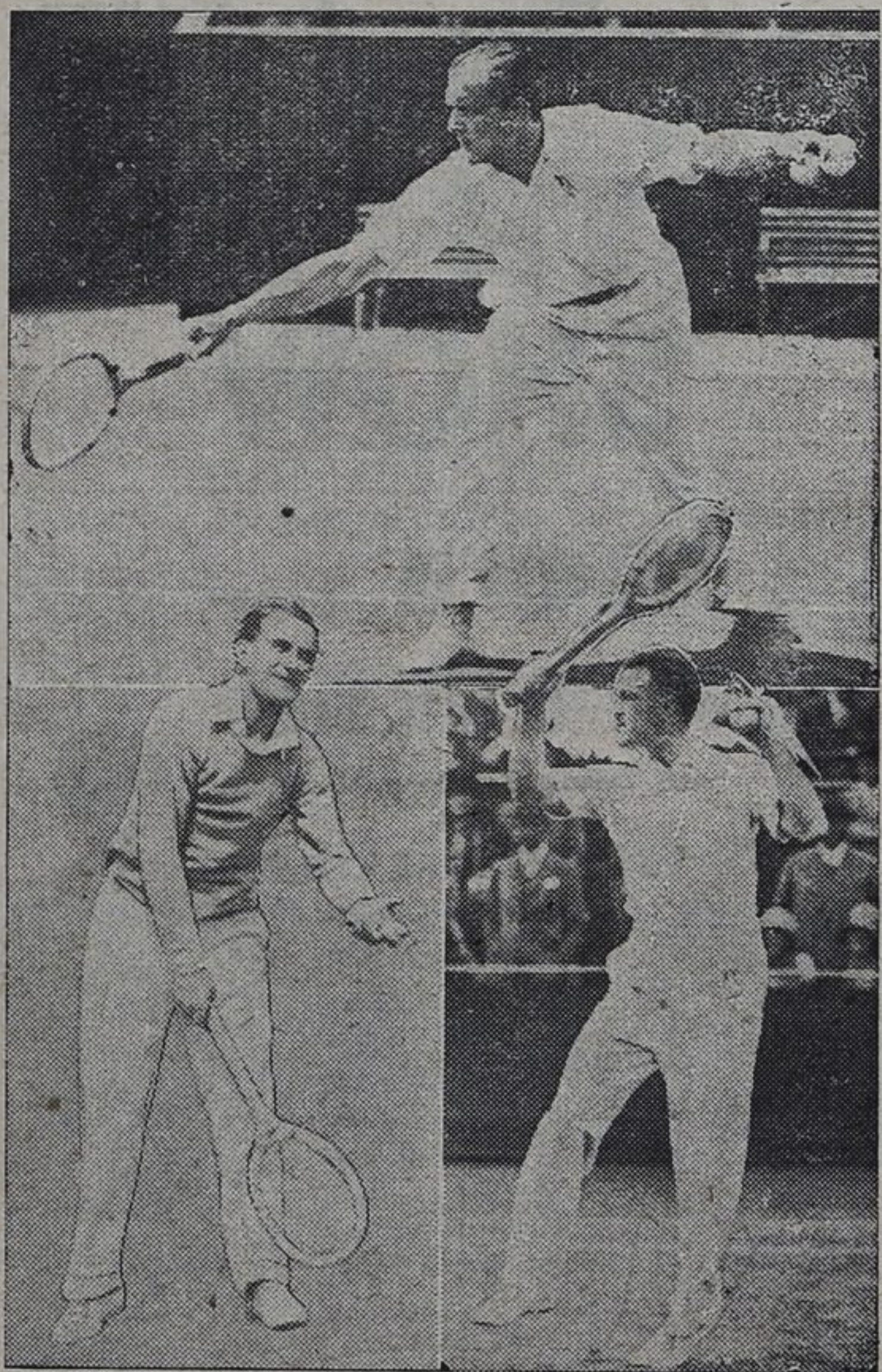


Neptune Claims British Steamer "Sunniva"

King's Uncle and Former Governor-General of Canada Celebrates



The Duke of Connaught, son of the late Queen Victoria, and Uncle of King George, celebrated his eightieth birthday this week while on his vacation in the South of France. The Duke, who was Governor-General of the Dominion from 1911 to 1916, is shown above in three distinct phases of his life. In the centre picture is the Duke when an infant. He is receiving a present from the famous Duke of Wellington as he stands on Queen Victoria's knee and his father, Prince Albert, can be seen in the background. At the left is a picture of the Duke as he appeared when Governor-General of Canada, whilst at the right he is wearing the robes of a Knight of the Garter.
