There are no restrictions on the contest, anyone can enter, but the fishing must be done in a specified area, between Mill Creek and Dixon's Creek, and boats or rafts must not be used. Fishing from the wharves or docks will be permitted.

An entry fee of 25 cents for adults and 10 cents for school pupils will be charged, and the prizes will be articles of fishing tackle, etc., that will prove an inducement. All that is required for a good day's sport will be an inclination on the part of the fish to bite.

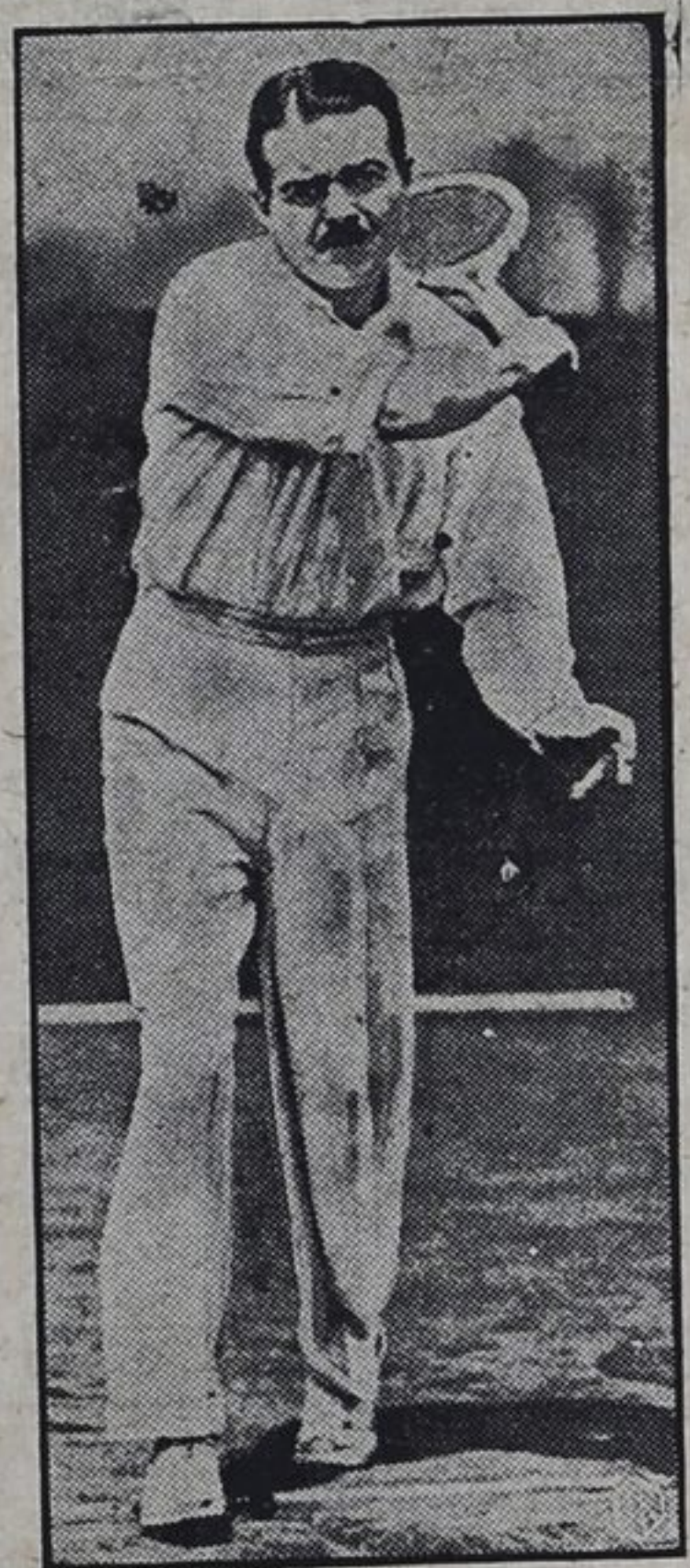
PLANS BEING MADE FOR MONSTER BAZAAR IN AID OF NEW HOSPITAL
