

Four Teams Entered in The Haileyburian Relay

Kirkland Lake, Englehart, New Liskeard and Haileybury Boys to Battle

Four boys' relay teams are entered in The Haileyburian race to be held on Saturday afternoon at 2.30. Kirkland Lake, Englehart, New Liskeard and Haileybury boys will do their best for the right to possess the handsome shield, now held by the local lads, and the silver and bronze medals supplied to the winners and team finishing second.

The time made for the race last year was considered good, under very unfavorable weather conditions, but it is expected that the boys will have better footing and higher temperature this year to aid them, besides having the finish line moved to the corner of Ferguson and Browning, lessening the grade at the relay change post. Haileybury's time last year was 33 minutes, 7 seconds, with Kirkland Lake 5 seconds back and Englehart 3 behind the Miners. Lora Carlson made the fastest time for the mile, 5.18.
