NOTICE TO HOLDERS OF COMMISSION HOUSES

Your Housing Commission has been obliged to eject one family from a commission house, after every effort had been made to induce them to pay arrears, and similar action will be necessary in several instances, as this is the only recourse the Commission has. The ones furthest in arrears will be dealt with first. The Commission has power to take this action in all cases where payments are three months or more in arrears.

There are several cases which will be dealt with in the same manner as the one first referred to around September 1st, unless the occupants of these properties make settlement before that date.
