Items from the Files of The Haileyburian of Seven Years Ago

Two burglaries in downtown stores and an attempted entrance into another store have occurred during the past week. Norfolk & Rochester and the Noice Drug Company were the victims.

Two new men were elected to the town council on Monday, A. E. Holditch and T. Adshear running third and fourth in a field of eight.

The residence of Mr. and Mrs. H. Hollands-Hurst at Dickson's Creek was damaged to the extent of about \$200 by a fire which broke out on Tuesday night.

The new Haileybury United Church was dedicated on Friday evening last, Rev. Mr. Anderson, of Kirkland Lake, Moderator of the Presbytery, conducting the services.

Curling on the new rink here got well under way on Monday night, when the first eight games in a down-and-out competition were played.

Advertising is easy—it is simply saying in writing what you say to the customers in your shop. Turn over stocks quickly, if you would make more money.
