WORK ON MOFFAT-HALL WAS ARRANGED FOR BY MEETING OF DIRECTORS

Mr. F. C. Bidgood, a director of Moffat-Hall Gold Mines, has asked us to state that it was at a meeting of directors of the company that the arrangement for 200 feet of shaft sinking and other work on the property was made, and not by a meeting of the shareholders, as stated in an article in last week's issue of The Haileyburian. The work of sinking will be let by tender, it is stated by Mr. Bidgood, and there will be considerable lateral work done when this is finished.

Miss Marguerite St. Louis

The death of Miss Marguerite St. Louis at the early age of 19 years and six months, which took place at her home on Monday morning, removed a popular young lady who had spent her whole life in Haileybury and caused deep grief among a large circle of friends and acquaintances. Just a month ago she suffered an attack of influenza, from which she only partially recovered, a relapse setting in later. For the past week it had been generally known that there was little hope for her recovery, but her death came as a great shock to her family and friends.

Miss St. Louis was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. St. Louis, who have been residents of Haileybury for over 20 years. She was born and grew up here and was well known and well loved by a great circle of friends among the younger people.

Besides her parents, there are four sisters and six brothers surviving. The sisters are: Mrs. Valmore Mondoux, whose husband died in Timmins less than two months ago, and Misses Rita Evelyn and Yvonne, all at home. Emile, Emery, Leo, Ernest, Raoul and Lucien are the brothers, all of whom live in Haileybury, with the exception of Leo, whose home is in Detroit. The sympathy of the whole community is extended to the bereaved ones.

The funeral of the late Miss St. Louis was held on Wednesday, with service in Holy Cross Cathedral at 9 a.m., and interment in the Roman Catholic Cemetery. There was a large gathering at the Cathedral for the service and many beautiful floral tributes testified to the esteem in which Miss St. Louis was held by all. Among out of town relatives who were present were an aunt and cousin of the deceased, Mrs. H. Milroy and Miss Floreda Lamarche, both of Eganville, Ont., the former home of the St. Louis family.

TOWN OF HAILEYBURY Notice of Application to the Legislature of the Province of Ontario

Notice is hereby given that the Corporation of the Town of Haileybury, will apply to the Legislature at its present session, for an Act authorizing the said Corporation to raise upon debentures without obtaining the assent of the electors thereto, a sum of money not exceeding Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$70,000) to consolidate the floating debt of Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$70,000) now outstanding against the said Corporation of the Town of Haileybury.

Also to authorize said Town to borrow sums of money not exceeding in the aggregate One Hundred and Eighteen Thousand Five Hundred and One Dollars and Thirty-four Cents (\$118,501.34) by the issue of debentures, payable in not more than thirty years from the respective dates of issue thereof, for the purpose of retiring or redeeming certain debentures of the said Town.
