

Horses Drowned In Making Last Trip Over Lake

Guigues District Farmer Has A Heavy Loss When Ice Becomes Thin

W. Brisson, a farmer in the Guigues district on the Quebec side of Lake Temiskaming, suffered a heavy loss late last week, when four horses perished as he attempted to make a final trip across to this side with loads of wood for sale in Haileybury. With two teams and another driver, he had made a trip safely across in the morning, following a frost the previous night, and he believed that he could make one more journey that day, although the weather had become warm and the ice was softening.

Without waiting for his usual dinner hour, Mr. Brisson again loaded up his sleighs and started out for this side. When about mile out from the wharf at Guigues, one of the teams broke through the treacherous ice. Even then, he believed he could save the animals at least, and attempted to hitch the other team on in order to pull them to safety. This was found impossible, however, as the ice commenced to break up and eventually the whole four horses, with the loaded sleighs, went through.

The loss to Mr. Brisson is a heavy one, coming as it did just at the time when his horses were needed most for the spring work on the farm. Neighbors are coming to his assistance to some extent and some people in Haileybury also contributed to a fund being raised to help to replace the animals.

Up to that time the ice had apparently been quite safe. The last few days, however, have softened it up considerably and, while there has been no considerable movement of the mass, it is breaking quickly along the shores and the lake should be clear within a week at least.

Township Ratepayers to Vote On Power Company Franchise

Ratepayers of the Township of Bucke, which includes the townsite of North Cobalt, will vote next month on a proposal to renew the franchise existing between the municipality and the Northern Ontario Power Company Limited for a period of ten years. The vote will be taken on May 15th and the terms of the franchise are set out in an advertisement published in this issue of The Haileyburian.

The terms and conditions under which it is proposed to grant the franchise are the same as exists in the municipalities of Cobalt, Haileybury and New Liskeard, the policy of the company being to standardize their rates and agreements throughout the district. There is unlikely to be any serious opposition to the proposed measure, which has already received two readings by the council.

NOTICE

To Holders of Mining Claims in Ontario Not Yet Patented or Leased

Notice is hereby given to holders of mining claims, wheresoever situate, upon which the work specified in the Mining Act has been prohibited or restricted to a stated period by the Minister of Lands and Forests under the authority of the Mining Act, or where permission to do the work has been given under conditions and limitations designed to protect the timber. THAT under the Forest Fires Prevention Act, 1930, they are required to apply to the District Forester in the District in which the land is situate for a permit to perform such work, and that failure to apply for such permit or upon issue of the same, failure to perform and record the work prescribed by the Mining Act, will subject their claim to cancellation. The time for performing and recording the said work is extended by Order-in-Council to and including the 15th day of November, 1931. If the work is so done and recorded, the time for computing the date before which further work upon the claim is required, will be computed as from the said 15th day of November, 1931.

The name and address of the District Forester to whom application for such permit should be made, may be obtained from the Recorder of the Mining Division in which the claim is situate. A miner's license in the name of the applicant, or due renewal of the same, must accompany the application and the number or numbers of the mining claim or claims must be clearly stated.
