One of these projects, which occupied considerable time at the meeting was the matter of a ferry at the Old Mission to connect the roads of Ontario and Quebec at that point, where only a narrow stretch of water separates the two provinces and to which point both have now good road systems. The Ontario road was completed late last summer by the Northern Development Branch and the inauguration of a ferry service would provide an ideal motor trip through sections of the two provinces. 

France's New President is Leader of Senate

Paul Doumer, 74-year-old President of the Senate has been elected Thirteenth President of the French Republic in one of the most exciting contests in French history. Aristide Briand, veteran Foreign Minister, was defeated and withdrew after the first ballot amid riotous scenes in the palace of the Bourbon Kings at Versailles.
