

## Two Actions In Division Court Involve Funds

Suit for Taxes, Mining Stock Case Aired Here Before Judge Hayward

Two actions were heard in the Division Court here on Friday by His Honor Judge Hayward, one of which involved a claim for taxes while the other was a dispute over the collection of a promissory note in lieu of some shares of mining stock. The disputants were all from out of town the tax case coming from the township of Coleman and the other involving parties from Ansonville and Cobalt.

In the tax case, E. R. Proulx, of Cobalt was the defendant and he claimed that the township clerk had told him he need not pay taxes on the property involved unless he felt so disposed. Proulx had operated a fox farm on 25 acres of land in the township, which he had leased from the Crown on a five year lease from October 1st, 1925. The township claimed \$84.15 as taxes and arrears for 1929 and 1930, but the defendant claimed he had left the property in the fall of 1928 and had notified both the township clerk and the assessor. He had only been operating the farm as an experiment.

George Mitchel, K.C., appearing for Proulx, told the court that negotiations were going on between the defendant and the township council and suggested that the matter be left until the next meeting of that body. His Honor said that judgment would be entered for the plaintiff council, unless Proulx could show anything in his lease of the property which would indicate that the taxes were not to be paid.

In the other case, Albine Tremblay, of Ansonville, sued David Sabourin of Cobalt, for \$150 on a promissory note. It developed, on Tremblay's own admission, that he had given S. J. Poynton, of Montreal, \$25 for the note. Poynton had used the money to return to the city from Ansonville, where he had lived seven weeks with Tremblay without paying board, and to whom he was said to have promised 10,000 shares of stock in the Albion Copper and Gold Mines as one of "different ways of paying back" money said to be owing the plaintiff. The defence, conducted by F. L. Smiley, K.C., was inclined to question the note, as it was shown that it had been drawn in Montreal, while the defendant lives in Cobalt, and claimed that it was essential to have the records produced. The case was adjourned for this purpose when the plaintiff had completed his case and will be completed later. W. J. Grummett, of Ansonville, is the counsel for Tremblay. Poynton, from whom Tremblay had secured the note, was stated to be selling stock in the mining company and the plaintiff claimed that he owed him a bill of between \$350 and \$400.

## MAKES HALF DAY TRIP THAT TOOK HIM WEEK TWENTY-ONE YEARS AGO

Charles Shields, one of the veterans of the prospecting game who returned home on Friday from Tyrell township, had an interesting comparison to make on the changes that have taken place in transportation in and out of the various sections of the North during the past two decades. Coming out last week he made the trip to Elk Lake by air, caught a train there and was home in Haileybury at 6.30, after leaving the camp in Tyrell about 1 p.m.

Mr. Shields was in with a party examining and sampling a property for mining men who are interested in that section, and he recalled the fact that within one mile of this property he, with Gilbert Labine, staked several claims more than 21 years ago. At that time it took them six and a half days to get in to the district and about the same length of time to come out again. Three of the claims staked in those early days have been patented and Mr. Shields still retains an interest in them. In view of the discoveries made this year in the locality, he thinks they may prove valuable in time.

A heavy wind storm accompanied by hail did some damage to crops and other property in the neighborhood of Uno Park on Tuesday of last week.

The Cochrane Post says that some of the cows which were found to be reactors in a T.B. test of herds in the Timmins district have been sold in the neighborhood of Cochrane, despite the fact that there is a heavy penalty for disposing of animals in this way.

## FRUIT SYRUPS

In the home canning of fruits the syrup used is an important factor in success. The kind of syrup to use varies with different fruits. In putting up raspberries, peaches and pears use 1 cup of sugar to 2 cups of water; for rhubarb and cherries, 1 cup of sugar to 1 cup of water; and for strawberries and plums use 2 cups of sugar to 1 cup of water. A syrup should be boiled five minutes before being added to jars. Fill jars with fruit, packing as firmly as possible without crushing, then cover with syrup.

T. Jackson, of Cobalt, is among a number of boys who have been chosen to attend the training camp established by the Ontario Athletic Commission to be held on Lake Couchiching, near Orillia. The camp is to be open from August 3rd until the boys go to Toronto for the Ontario schoolboy track and field championships on August 28.
