TEN POUND PICKEREL FROM PORK RAPIDS IS PRIZE FISH OF SEASON

C. McVittie, Main Street, holds the record so far this year for big fish in this neighborhood. On Thursday evening last he came home with a ten-pound pickerel, which he caught with a rod and line at Pork Rapids, in the Montreal River, the scene of many a famous battle with the big fellows. The prize fish measured 29 1/2 inches long and 17 inches around the widest part and from all accounts, it caused considerable excitement before it was finally landed in the boat. In the party with Mr. McVittie were Judge Hayward and W. S. Blackwall and when Mac hooked the big fellow there was a lively time for about 15 minutes. Mr. Blackwall attempted to scoop up the prize in a small landing net, but this was inadequate for a fish of such dimensions, so he leaned over from the boat and managed to get a firm hold on the pickerel's gills and with a mighty heave, hoist him into the boat. 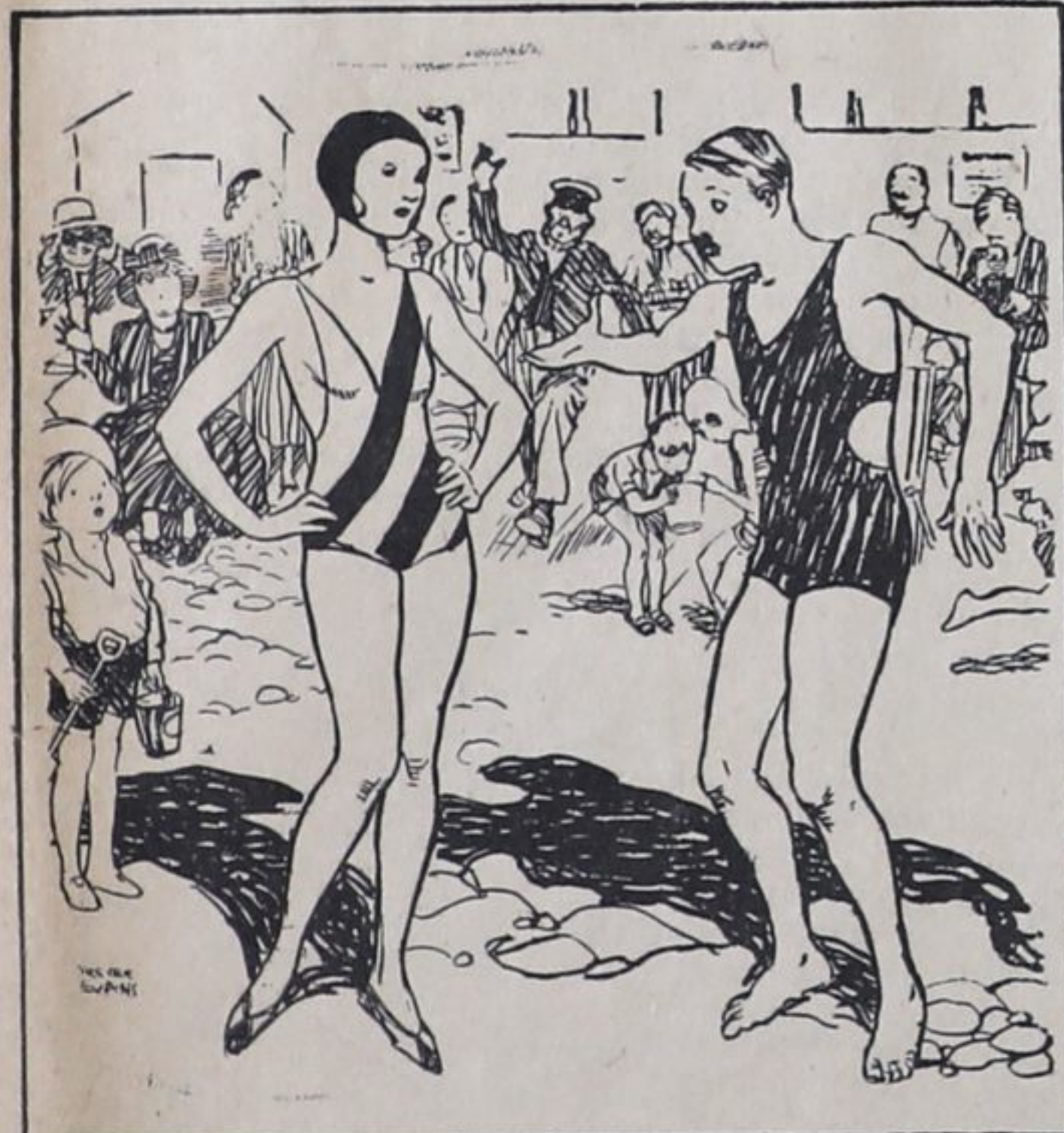
