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The Proposed New Water System

While no definite action has so far been taken in regard to the proposed new water supply to be obtained from Constance Lake sufficient work has been done to prove to the satisfaction of the town council that the project is entirely feasible. A more or less permanent outlet from the lake has been made through the digging of a trench and the building of a concrete dam on the solid rock where the natural outlet comes down through a rocky gorge between two bluffs. In this dam a pipe has been fixed and, after the level of the lake had been reduced some three feet, a continuous flow is secured. The pipe is about three inches in diameter and is running full all the time without any further effect on the lake level. It is estimated that this quantity of water is sufficient to supply a much larger town than Haileybury is at present.

It is claimed that the elevation of Constance Lake is so much above that of the town reservoir that the water would flow in without any interruption. This certainly appears to be the fact, so far as the layman can judge. The whole scheme seems to be easily possible of being carried out and there appears to be no doubt of the great saving that can be effected. It is held that the water is pure, as the lake is fed by springs and there is no necessity for either filtration or chlorination. This, with the necessity of pumping eliminated, would give the town a practically free water supply.

The present time should be opportune for the installation of the new system. It would provide work for all idle men in town during some months at any rate, and the portion to be paid by the governments under the unemployment relief plan would greatly re-

duce the cost to the municipality. If the council is satisfied that the scheme is a sound one as it appears to be, there should be no hesitation in putting it into effect at the present and there should be no opposition develop.

Public Ownership Mining

There should be food for thought on the part of the governments in the plan for mining as a public industry, suggested by Douglas A. Mutch and briefly sketched in these columns last week. Such a plan could be made of untold benefit to the country generally, and to the mining industry in particular, and in addition might easily become an important factor in overcoming the present depression throughout the world. It is generally conceded that a greater production of gold is one of the prime necessities of the nations today. There is as Mr. Mutch says, ample evidence that Canada has that gold. It is also too evident, particularly to those engaged in the mining industry, that the lack of capital for development is and has been for the past year or two at any rate a great drawback to the expansion and increased production that are required.

If the plan could be put into practice, if some of the great mineral bearing areas could be more thoroughly prospected and given a more thorough test, there is no doubt that there would be a great increase in the number of producing mines within a very few years. The outlay would not need to be very great, in comparison with some of the proposed expenditures in connection with the relief of unemployment, and the return in increased prosperity not only in the mining but in allied industries, would be far greater than it may be from some of the public works now being undertaken. If a new mine could be started every five years, the plan would carry itself. If what is needed is more gold production, Canada is in an outstanding position and has the opportunity now to take a leading part in the re-establishment of prosperity throughout the Empire and the world.
