

Ninety Minutes Necessary to Win in Tuesday's Tilt

Local Juniors Hand Surprise to New Liskeard, Winning Three to two

The Haileybury Juniors created the big upset for the Central Group this season when they handed New Liskeard's highly touted youngsters a 3-2 setback in a ninety-minute game at the local arena on Tuesday night before a small crowd.

The ice was in good shape at the start, but with the mild temperature and the skating, the frozen surface was soon rather juicy, and the Liskeard boys blame this for upsetting their team play and throwing them off stride. However, credit cannot be taken from the young Prospectors, who stuck with their task and finally subdued the heavier boys from the farming town.

Play in the opening frame was of a cautious variety, each team waiting for a break, and no scoring resulted. Liskeard probably had the edge in opportunities, but Lemay in the Haileybury nets was always in the way, and turn-of-side several well meant efforts. Hansman too had several hot ones to handle. Lacarte and Durrell drew the only penalties of the frame.

Liskeard had a slight edge in territorial play in the second spasm, and several pile-ups resulted in front of the Haileybury cage, but Lemay always emerged with the puck safely outside the goal line. The gong rang to end the period as Bill Morris dented the twine with a close-in shot for Liskeard's first counter, and it was credited, as the referee's bell had not sounded before the puck hit the mesh.

On the first relief after the opening of the third frame Allen got through alone for what looked like a sure goal for Liskeard, but Lemay outguessed him and while there were dangerous sallies made by both teams throughout the period, not until nineteen minutes of play had elapsed did the red light flash on and this time it was back of the Liskeard goalie after a shot from George Page, who raced in and grabbed his rebound off the boards to beat Hansman cleanly. Morris and Sutherland drew penalties in this period.

In the second minute of the first overtime session Hartman broke through and had Lemay at his mercy, but flipped the disc over the net from about six feet out. After another couple of minutes Raoul Lacarte threaded his way through to the blue line and let drive from between the defence pair, to score the goal which put Haileybury up again. Three minutes after the teams had changed ends, young Frost slapped one in for Liskeard from a scramble just in front of the Haileybury net, and the second overtime period was made necessary.

The second ten minutes proved scoreless, although both teams had some favorable chances to dent the twine. Liskeard attempted some combination, but the soft ice was all against it and they soon resorted to the individual style again.

In the first five minutes of the final overtime session each goalie was called on to save some close-in drives, and just before the bell to change ends Milt Elliott accepted a pass-out from Billy Burton and slipped it passed Hansman for what proved to be the winning marker. In desperation the Liskeard boys went up, everyone but the goalie and twice Haileybury players broke away with only the goalie to beat. Once Morris pulled the feet from under Elliott and drew a penalty and later "Cy" Dav was dragged down by Durrell with a sure counter in the offing, which left Liskeard shorthanded for most of the last five minutes. Haileybury successfully hurled the puck the length of the pond for the final couple of minutes, and a weary band of athletes skated off the ice at the final gong.

For the winners, every man gave everything he had to win and their stick-to-it-iveness was what finally gave them the victory. The work of George Lemay in the local net was brilliant, especially on the close-in shots. He saved many that looked ticketed for the twine and was cool as a cucumber. The defence was not strong, but were steady and kept plugging all the way.

Local Juniors Lose Decision to Kirkland Miners

Give Big Crowd Real Thrill on Saturday Night, But Lose Out 5-4

The Junior hockey game on Saturday evening last had plenty of thrills for the fans, with the score being tied four times, and Kirkland Lake finally defeating the local Prospectors 5-4 in the final minute of play.

The Miners have a smart Junior aggregation which will have plenty to say about the winning of the Central Group before the schedule ends. From goal out they are well fortified in every position, and only a bit of instruction on their work inside the opposing defence is necessary to mark them as a team to reckon with in the N.O.H.A. playdowns.

Haileybury had the assistance of four of last year's group champions, drawn to Senior ranks this year, but still eligible for Junior, having only played in the one Senior tilt at the time, but even with this reinforcement were not able to take the Gold Miners into camp.

The only counter of the opening frame came from the stick of Milt Elliott about middle of the period and Haileybury playing a man short. Derraugh fed the pass near the mouth of the Kirkland goal and the youngster made no mistake.

In the first minute of play in the second canto Bob Poppleton counted one for the visitors to tie it up. Four minutes later Grabowski put the Miners in front with a neat effort from left wing, but Derraugh and Burton combined to knot up proceedings three minutes later, Burton getting the tally. About midway in the period Porcheron and Kenty combined to give Kirkland the lead again, Kenty taking a pass just in front of the net to beat Lemay. Score 3-2.

Midway in the final twenty O'Grady and Derraugh got away together, the former taking the pass to tie it up. Then Porcheron scored for the visitors on a pass from Bobby Ash, but this was soon replied to by John Renaud, who let loose a terrific shot from the blue line, which Gosselin never saw. With only a minute left to go Kenty and Poppleton broke away; Pop was skated into the corner, but George was left uncovered and when the pass came out he made no mistake, scoring the counter which meant the game to the Gold Diggers.

Eight penalties were handed out by Referee Bert Ough, Haileybury getting five, O'Grady drawing three of these and Renaud the other pair. Dickenson had two for Kirkland and Briden the other one. All were minors.

The work of George Lemay in the Haileybury nets was outstanding, the counters secured being of the unsavable variety. All the other local lads turned in efforts of real merit. For the visitors Porcheron, Dickenson and Kenty stood out, the latter, of last year's Haileybury group winners, getting a pair of tallies. There was no weakness on the team, except possibly in the nets, Gosselin being a bit off color at times.

Blank Cobalt in Hectic Struggle Monday Evening

Local Seniors Win Second Game to Take Lead in Central Group Standing

Haileybury's Senior team took the lead in the Central group standing on Monday evening at Cobalt, when they gathered in a 2-0 decision over the Miners.

The Cobalters failed to take advantage of the many penalties handed out to the Haileybury players. The winners were, on numerous occasions short a man, and sometimes two, and three, but lack of cohesion on the part of the Cobalters kept the attack under control.

Hassett and Bagshaw counted the goals for the winners, Harry making the initial score in the second period when he flipped in a shot from the wing. Bagshaw got his late in the final stanza, when he eluded the Cobalt defence pair to beat Southall.

Fifteen penalties were handed out by Referee Harry McKnight of New Liskeard, and Haileybury drew 11 of these, Bagshaw leading the parade with 4. Renaud, his mate on the defence, was close behind with three, while Grozelle and O'Grady each had a pair. Nolan decorated the cooler on two occasions for Cobalt, while Allan and Rowe each drew one trip.

On the night's play there was no doubt about the winners' superiority. Defensively Cobalt played well, but their attack did not have the old punch.

For Haileybury, St. Louis was a host in himself in the nets. He saved them from all distances and directions. Bagshaw and Renaud, while they were on, formed a sturdy defence, and up front Dempster, O'Grady and McGinley gave a better display than the Cobalt first string trio. And the second line of Grozelle, Derraugh and Hassett had a distinct edge on the Cobalters.

The colors worn by the opposing teams conflicted to some extent and many well-intended passes went astray on this account.

Play in the first period was even, with no scoring, and with Moore missing the net for the best scoring chance of the frame. At the start of the second, Hassett counted the first goal, and Cobalt had a glorious chance to tie the score with Bagshaw and Renaud off together, but did not click. Bagshaw scored late in the third and Haileybury were again with four men to six, but lack of system by Cobalt and a shooting of the puck down the ice
