New Terminal of T.&N.O. Will Be Called Moosenee

Indian Name to be Given Town on James Bay; Plan Hotel and Wharves

Moosenee is the name to be given Ontario's seaport on James Bay, according to an announcement in the press on Saturday, which states that the name has been decided on by the Prime Minister of Ontario and the T. & N. O. Railway Commission, following a conference at Toronto late in December. The name is not new, as it has been in use by the Indians as a designation for the site for many years and the Anglican Church has adopted it for the northern diocese. Moose Harbor had been chosen as the name for the new town, but this has now been discarded.

Last week the members of the Commission spent two days in an inspection of the lines, going north to the terminal. On their return the announcement of the change in the name was made, together with information on plans for the proposed hotel and townsite and the question of wharves to take care of traffic on the Bay. It is stated that a hotel of the bungalow type will be erected, with from 10 to 20 bedrooms, lounge, dining hall, kitchens, etc., and that separate sleeping bungalows will be built as required. The hotel will be located at Hunter's Point, which extends out into the Moose River.

Chief Engineer S. B. Clement will consult a prominent town planning engineer in regard to the townsite and plans will be submitted to the Commission later. It is intended to make the town a modern one with parks, schools, administrative buildings, etc. It is stated that a spring creek at the border of the townsite will provide a supply of water for the town, probably by gravity, and the water is claimed to be almost 100 per cent pure.

The chief engineer was authorized to take up the question of wharves with the Federal Department of Public Works, as it was felt that facilities of this nature would be required when the new town is established, which it is expected will be next June.

Pleading Guilty Two Sentenced to Reformatory

Four Charges of Theft Bring Terms to Local Men in Last Week's Court

When they pleaded guilty to four charges of theft in police court here on Friday last, M. Millross, 26, and Everett Davis, 19, were sentenced by Magistrate Atkinson to not less than one year and not more than two years less one day, in the Ontario Reformatory. When the plea of guilty was entered, Crown Attorney F. L. Smiley, K.C., said that six more charges against each would not be pressed.

Magistrate Atkinson characterized the offences as "deliberate theft" and pointed out that the duration of their stay in the Reformatory would depend entirely upon themselves. Should they come up again after their release they need expect no mercy from the courts. Davis was out on suspended sentence on a charge of using another man's car without permission and had been fined for swearing in a public place, it was stated, while it was the first appearance for Millross.

There was a long list of articles stated to have been stolen by the two, including automobile tools, a woman's purse, a turkey and other articles. Wm. C. Inch, who appeared for Davis, asked for a reformatory term, rather than a penitentiary sentence, stating that he felt more sorry for the youth's parents than for the defendant himself. The Crown Attorney pointed out that the thefts had occurred over a period of time and asked for a sentence commensurate with the offences.

Another case of theft was dealt with at the same sitting of the court, when Fred Lafreniere, 24, and Victor Bush, 33, of Cane Township, pleaded guilty to the theft of four ducks and a shirt from Clarence Ball. In their cases Crown Attorney Smiley asked for a sentence that would deter others from similar offences and protect the residents of the district, as there had been other crimes in that section. Sentences of two months at hard labor were imposed by the Magistrate on each of the accused.

St. Paul's Church Holds Annual Vestry Meeting

The annual vestry meeting of St. Paul's Church was held on Monday evening in the parish hall, with a good attendance of members of the congregation present. Rev. Canon Hinks presided and the business transacted dealt with the affairs of the church during the past year and the election of officers.

Mr. Geo. Bailey was again chosen as Rector's Warden, and Mr. W. S. Gainsford re-elected as People's Warden. Mr. H. Jemmett is again vestry clerk and Mr. A. H. Hull treasurer, while Messrs H. E. Cawley and M. C. H. Little were elected to the Finance Committee.

The various Church organizations presented their reports for the year, all showing a satisfactory condition.

DEFIES GOVERNMENT



Hurling open defiance at the new government edict limiting the number of clergymen who may function in the Federal District to one for every fifty thousand inhabitants, Archbishop Pascal Diaz, Primate of the Roman Catholic Church in Mexico, has issued orders to his flock to ignore the new law. In practice the edict would close 219 of Mexico's 244 Catholic Churches.

Patrick F. Ratchford

Patrick F. Ratchford, a resident of Cobalt for about 15 years past, died at his home in the silver town on Wednesday last. He was 73 years old and had been in failing health for some time prior to his death.

The late Mr. Ratchford was born in Ross Township, Renfrew County, and came to Cobalt from Portage du Fort. He was a stone mason by trade and had worked in Cobalt and the district for many years, although failing health had prevented him from doing active work for the past year. His wife died four months ago.

Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Horace Barrett and Miss Annie Ratchford, both in Cobalt, and two sons, William, of Sudbury, and Jack, of Fraserdale. A third son was killed in the great war. The funeral of Mr. Ratchford was held on Friday morning when after service in St. Patrick's Roman Catholic Church conducted by Rev. Father Martindale, he was buried in the cemetery at Mileage 104, beside the body of the late Mrs. Ratchford.

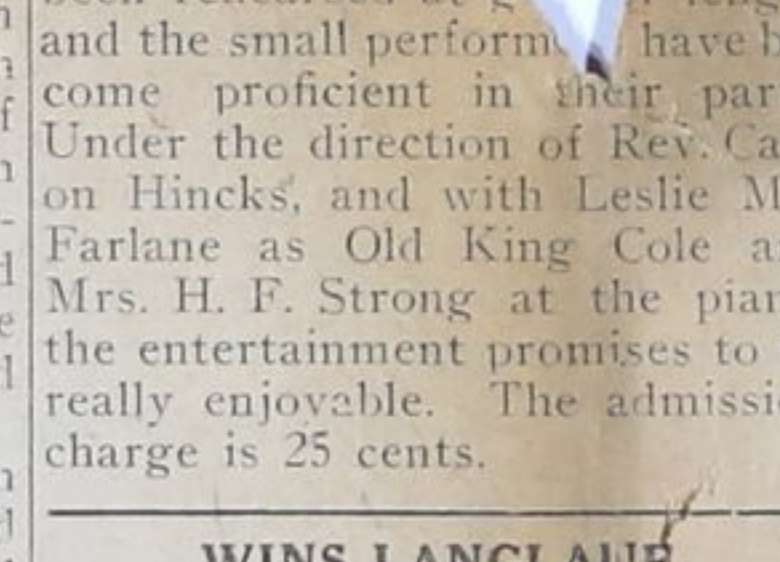
L. Duchene

Star-Nosed Mole Found on Street Following Rain

Mild Weather Has Brought Some Changes in Habits of the Wild Animals

The exceptionally mild weather this winter has apparently brought about a change in the habits of the wild animals and things are happening in the North Country which a few years ago were unheard of. On Thursday afternoon last, Ed. Provost picked up a small animal on the Lake Shore Road as he was walking into Haileybury from his home at Moore's Cove, which turned out to be a star nosed mole. Both Mr. Provost and the Haileyburian staff were at a loss to identify the animal, although all were more or less familiar with the common variety of mole, but had never seen one running at large in the winter time. Later the animal was recognized as being of the star nosed variety, considerably larger than the ordinary mole and with a very peculiar formation on its snout, from which it gets its name.

It is believed that the rain which fell early last week and which held up sport at the skating and curling rinks for a few days, drove the animal out of its home in the ground. It was placed in a box in the office of The Haileyburian, but was gone the next morning, apparently having made its way out of the box and gone to ground in the basement through an open stairway. Last week the New Liskeard Speaker reported the finding of a similar mole in that town, and its size also puzzled the residents who saw it. The species is apparently not very common in this part of the country and would
