

### Pays With Life on Scaffold for Killing Woman

Mike Skakoon Hanged on Friday Second Execution in the District Jail Here

For the second time since the district jail was built here, a convicted murderer has paid the extreme penalty of the law, when Mike Skakoon, sentenced at the sprinz assizes in Cochrane last April, was hanged early on Friday morning last. Hangman Edwards, who has succeeded Arthur Ellis in that capacity, was the executioner, and Sheriff John D. Mackay of Cochrane, under whose jurisdiction the condemned man was tried and sentenced, was in town for the couple of days necessary to see that arrangements were carried out.

It was at a few minutes after midnight that the hanging took place. The condemned man maintained his composure to the last, it is said, and did not falter when he was taken from the death cell to the scaffold, which had been erected inside the jail. He had been a model prisoner since his incarceration here, it is stated. Several of his relatives, including his wife, had visited him and members of the Roman Catholic clergy, to which denomination he belonged, had been with him during his last hours.

A jury had been summoned by Chief of Police W. MacGirr to attend under Coroner Dr. J. S. McCullough of New Liskeard, and the required formal inquest was held. A certificate to the effect that the execution had taken place, signed by Sheriff Mackay and Jail Governor John L. Maltby, was posted on the door of the jail, and the body of Skakoon was buried in the jail yard.

The previous execution was that of John Ivanchuk in July, 1930, who was convicted of the murder of License Inspector Harry Constable, at Cochrane, that time it was reported that at least a part of the proceedings had been visible from outside the jail, and precautions were taken on Friday to prevent this. The windows were well covered and provincial police officers, under Inspector F. B. Creasy, patrolled the street and prevented any loitering in the neighborhood of the jail.

### Fishing Over the Week-End Good Throughout District

Reports from various places are to the effect that the fishing over the week-end was good. Pickerel were biting freely in the lakes and rivers, a few bass were hooked and thrown back pending the opening of the legal season on July 1st, and the trout were rising for some of the anglers. The only big fish so far reported was a 10-pound pickerel caught by J. H. McKinlay in Gowganda Lake, but at various other points the catch of ordinary sized fish was good and several anglers got their full limit.

Through year after dragging year.

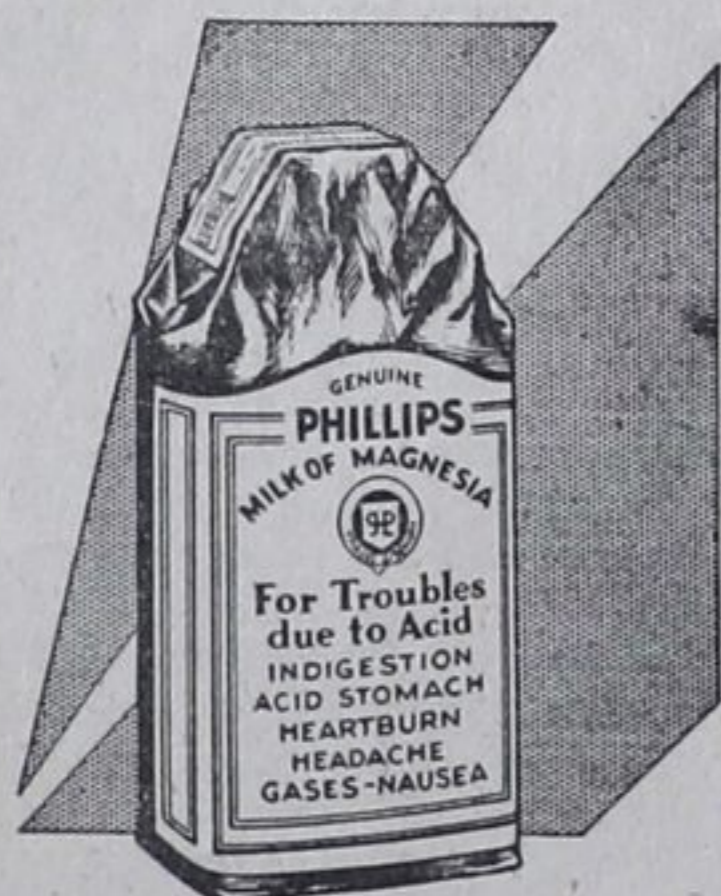
Slowly the infinite net was spread,

### FIREMEN PREPARING FOR BIG TOURNAMENT AT KIRKLAND, JULY 1
