BLASTING CAP ACCIDENTS SHOW DECREASE

Figures available for the year 1931 show a decrease of twenty-four per cent in the blasting cap accidents to children, as compared with the preceding year—accidents in 1931 being the lowest on record with the exception of the year 1927. It is hoped that an even greater reduction can be made this year.

Canadian Industries Limited is now making another appeal to all those who use blasting caps to see that they do not fall into the hands of children.

A blasting cap is a copper shell about a quarter of an inch in diameter and an inch or two long, half full of fulminate of mercury. This fulminate is the most sensitive and about the most impulsive explosive in common use. Blasting caps contain anywhere from 15 to 30 grains of it; primers for firearm cartridges usually contain not more than 1-5 grain. That is what the hammer or firing pin of a gun hits to ignite the powder in the shell. A blasting cap is meant to work the other way. The powder from the fuse ignites the fulminate in the blasting cap, and it explodes with terrific force and detonates the dynamite. The explosion of the fulminate is so exceedingly quick that the flying particles of copper will imbed themselves in iron a foot away. A box of caps will blow a hole right through a two-inch oak plank. One cap will blow a child's hand off.

Caps are often left around the barn, in the tool shed, or in other places, after ditching, stumping, boulder blasting and other operations necessitating the use of explosives. At this time of year these accidents tend to show an increase due to the fact that children play more out of doors. The campaign to warn children of the danger of playing with blasting caps, and adults of the danger of leaving the caps where children might find them, was started many years ago. It has been participated in by farm and trade papers, newspapers, press associations, Boy Scouts, Girl Guides, School Authorities and many other organizations.

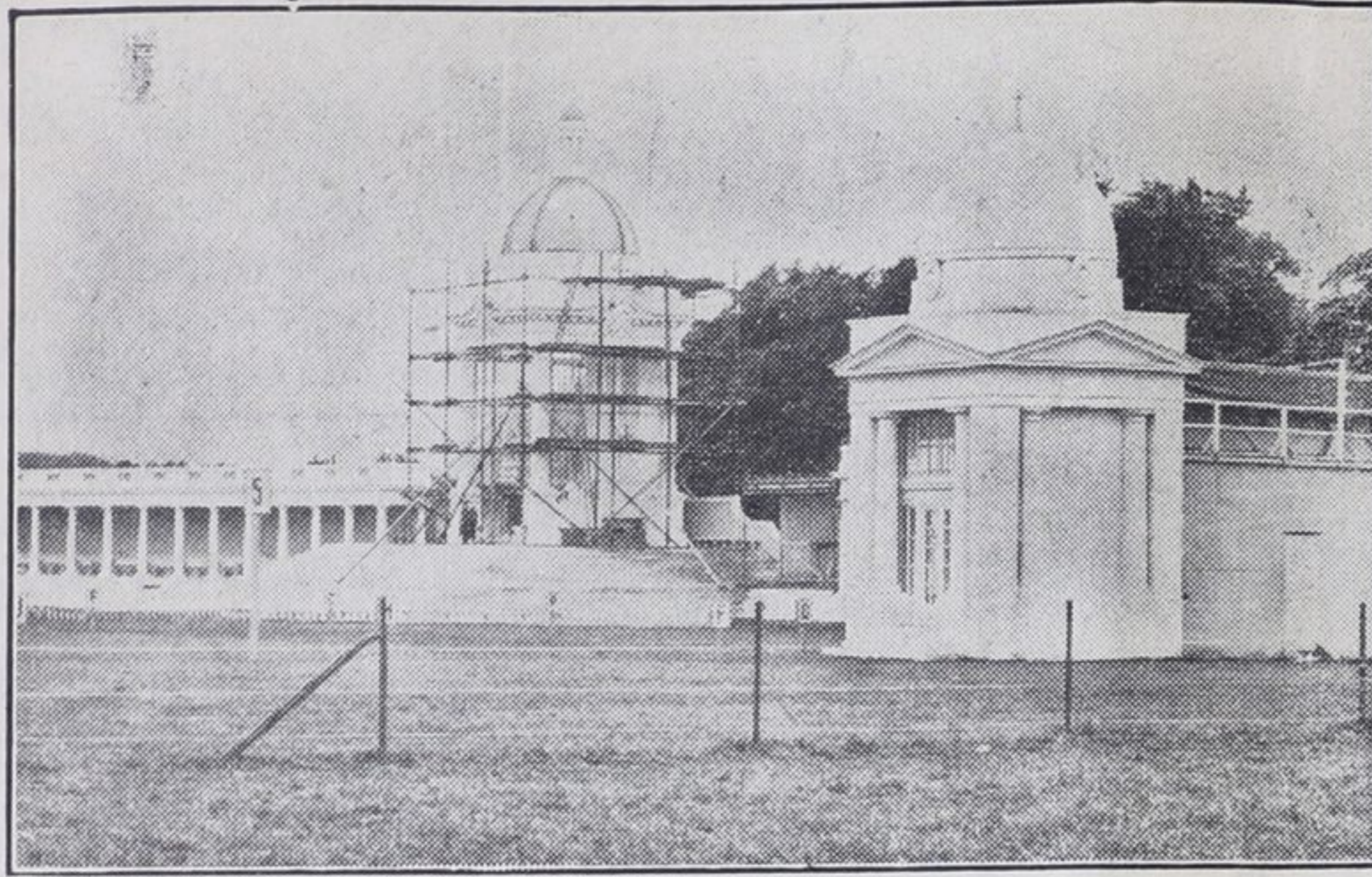

(Continued from Page 1) though there were 85 stall holders on the Kirkland Lake market, only one man, and he the defendant, had a slaughter house, so far as witness knew. DAUGHTERS OF EMPIRE RECEIVE APOLOGY FROM THE NATIONAL CHAPTER

The Haileybury Chapter, I.O. D.E., has received a written apology, from the National Chapter, expressing regret for what are termed inaccurate statements published as a report of an address by Miss Church at a recent meeting of the National Chapter in Toronto. These statements referred to the difficulty which has arisen between the National Chapter and the town of Haileybury over the assessment of the building formerly used as a Red Cross Hospital here, which was opened a few months after the town had suffered from the disastrous fire of October 4th, 1922. Miss Church is the convener of the National Chapter. The latter body wrote to the Regent of Haileybury Chapter tendering the apology.

and one or two other jobs. He had been advised to write the Department, setting out these suggestions—and this will be done. It was stated that an insane prisoner had been discharged a few weeks ago with no means of transportation to his home, and that a similar case had arisen this week, and the council hoped that some arrangement might be made.

M. B. Glazier interviewed the council in regard to a drainage problem on Latchford Street, where water from the High School grounds had given trouble. This will be looked into by the Streets Committee.

A plan submitted by W. J. Meaney for a garage to be built on Browning Street, in the restricted area, was referred back for fuller details and specifications, and it was decided to mark out a section near the corner of Main and Ferguson where parking of cars is forbidden.

The local Chapter of the I.O.D.E. requested permission to hold their annual street fair on Wednesday, July 6, closing a portion of Ferguson Avenue for the afternoon. This was granted, together with a request from the Orange Lodge for permission to hold their July 12th celebration on the Public School grounds and to operate refreshment booths and stalls at or near the grounds. Several other matters remained to be dealt with when the

council adjourned at 11.15 p.m., and a special meeting will likely be held later in the month.
