## Stolen Motor is Recovered After 100 Mile Drive

Found by Owner at Swastika With Some Damage Done; No Clue to Guilty Party

To have his motor car stolen from in front of his residence on Browning Street, where he had left it standing while he spent an hour in the house, was the experience of Gordon Ferguson on Friday last. He recovered it the following day, after it had been driven a little over 100 miles and had been abandoned at the Swastika station. Some damage was done to the car while it was away, approximately to the amount of \$50, Mr. Ferguson says.

The car, a Chevrolet coupe, was missed by Mr. Ferguson within an hour of its being taken. He had left it standing in front of the house at 1 p.m. and when he came out at about 2 it was gone. No one had seen it being driven away. On Saturday afternoon the owner, with W. McFarlane, started north on a search for the missing vehicle. They drove to Kirkland Lake, where they consulted the police, with no result, and on their return stopped at Swastika, where Mr. Ferguson spotted the car at the station. No one could be found who could definitely state when the car had been left there and up to the present there is no clue to the guilty party or parties.

The fenders had been damaged apparently through being driven against something, and a new muffler will be required. Otherwise the car is not badly damaged.

## Lumber Yard at Goward Burned Buildings Saved

Loss is Quarter Million in Big Blaze Saturday Night; All Stock is Destroyed

Fire of undetermined origin reduced 11,000,000 feet of white and red pine lumber, the entire stock of the Temagami Timber Company at Goward, to heaps of ashes on Saturday night. The fire was reported at 9:50 and raged fiercely till 4 a.m. before the huge mill and other company buildings were declared out of danger. A. B. Gordon, managing director, estimated the loss at \$250,000, covered by insurance, and stated that sawing operations will be resumed as quickly as the insurance claim is adjusted and the mill yard cleared of debris.

The entire mill force, reinforced by forestry fire fighters from Latchford and Temagami with equipment put up a valiant fight throughout the night to restrict the flames to the doomed lumber piles. The mill and company offices, storehouses and employee's dwellings were seriously menaced until 4 a.m. The blaze originated in one corner of the yard and quickly enveloped pile after pile till the entire yard was in flames. The fire fighters were unable to do much more than confine the fire to the mill-yard and protect the mill and bordering buildings.

The yard was nothing more than heaps of live embers after the fire had swept through the area and gangs have since been employed at stirring them up dousing them with water to prevent a second conflagration.

Seven families from Hamilton have squatted on privately owned land in Widdifield Township, and are having grave difficulties.

## Mining Plant and Supplies Shipped to Great Bear Lake

Equipment for Eldorado Mines Left Here on Tuesday Night and Will Reach Property in About 30 Days; Complete Plant Includes Hoist Fabricated at P. M. Fleming's

Two cars of equipment for the Eldorado Mines at Great Bear Lake left here on Tuesday night and it was expected that in about 30 days the whole will be landed at the property and, when the plant is set up, actual mining operations will commence on the silver and pitchblende deposits discovered by Gilbert Labine in what has been hailed as the most important new mining field in Canada. Mr. Labine personally superintended the loading of the equipment which was secured in Haileybury, having it placed in the cars which contained the other parts of the plant shipped from Southern Ontario. The whole includes a complete mining plant, with compressor which will run two drills, blacksmith shop equipment, hoisting engine, etc.

The cars go from here direct to Edmonton, where Mr. Labine was assured they would arrive on Monday next. With the addition of a considerable quantity of supplies, the entire shipment will be then sent to the end of steel at Waterways, 300 miles further north, where it will be turned over to the Hudson Bay Transport, which company will take it the remainder of the way, about 1,400 miles, to the property. The whole shipment, Mr. Labine said, would be between 65 and 70 tons.

Diesel power will be used for the mining operations, Mr. Labine says, engines of the Junkers type being supplied to run the compressor. These burn the crude oil from the Fort Norman wells, which is the nearest source of supply to the property.

The hoisting engine which will be used in the operations has been fabricated right in Haileybury at the machine shops of P. M. Fleming. It is a self contained unit, with a Junkers engine and the drum and gears from an ordinary hoist built to run by steam or electricity. It is the only one of its kind in Canada, Mr. Labine says, and has been thoroughly

tested out. In fact the Haileyburian was invited to be present at a test of its lifting power on Tuesday afternoon and, speaking as a layman, we would say that it is just about the most complete machine of its kind that could be thought up. It is compact, being all in one piece, should give no one great difficulty in transportation and will be all that is required for the initial operations at the mine.

Mr. Labine, who is the managing director of Eldorado, states that the mining of silver and the radium-bearing pitchblende ores will commence as soon as the plant is set up. Considerable of the ore has already been broken and will be shipped out in due course. While the price of silver is low, the ore available is sufficiently rich to be mined and shipped profitably, it is stated by Mr. Labine and, as the silver and pitchblende come together, operations will include the production of both minerals.

In addition to the plant to be installed at the mine, an extraction plant for the treatment of the radium-bearing ore will be started within two weeks, Mr. Labine says. This will be erected near Toronto and will be the first of its kind in Canada and the only one in the British Empire. The Chief chemist of the company, a man of wide experience in the handling of radium-bearing ores, has recently returned from England and will superintend the construction of the new plant.

Asked as to the probable time when Eldorado will become an actual producer of radium, Mr. Labine said it would be within less than a year. The general public does not yet grasp the significance of this and the importance of the new mining fields is yet to be brought home to Canadians, although mining men throughout the country can readily appreciate something of what is being done in the Great Bear Lake district.

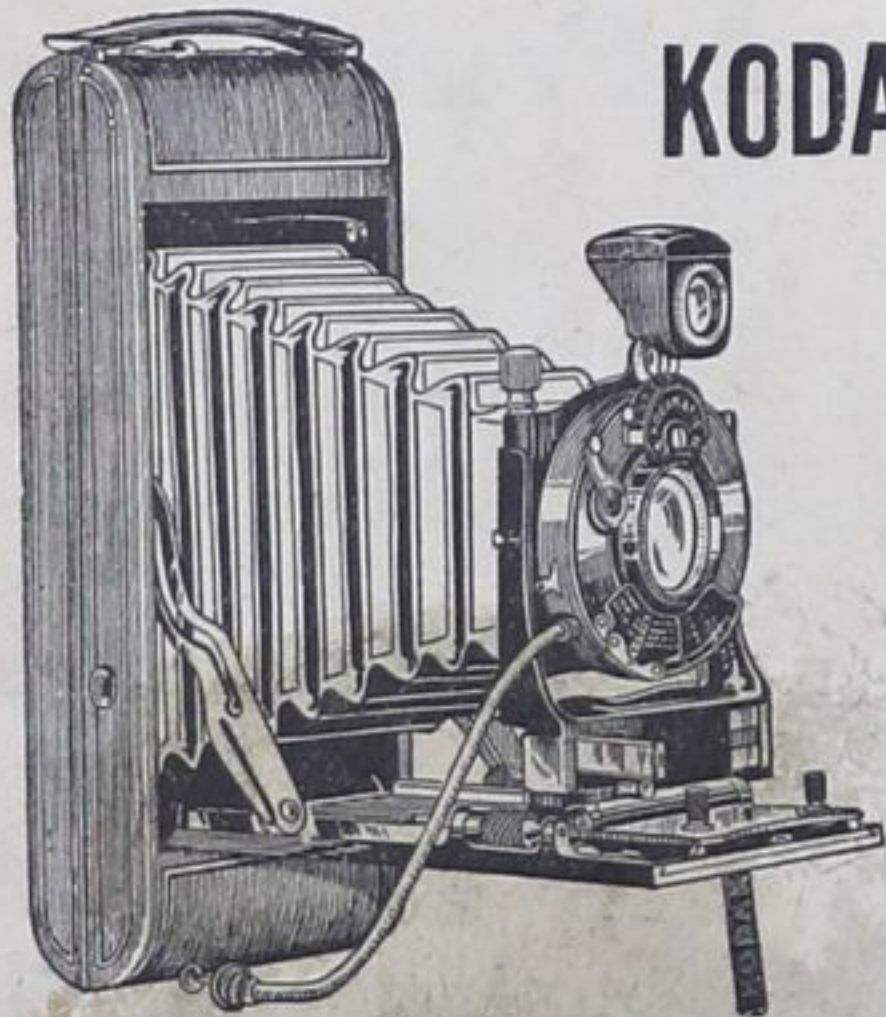
