

Railway Matters are Discussed by Board of Trade

Some Would Have Nipissing Central Cease Operations, Holding the Service Unnecessary

The T. & N.O. Commission and the street railway service and its future bulked large in the discussion at the annual meeting of Cobalt Board of Trade held on Tuesday evening. During the various arguments which developed, A. A. Amos suggested the members go on record as opposing continuance of the Nipissing Central Railway between Cobalt and New Liskeard on the ground the government should not be asked to make good deficits incurred, and the mayor of the town and one of his predecessors in office sponsored a resolution calling for the resignations of L. T. Martin and J. I. McLaren from the Commission and their replacement by Northern Ontario men. This was defeated on a standing vote and by a narrow margin.

The meeting re-elected Dr. E. F. Armstrong as president and C. P. Cross as secretary-treasurer, Mayor Wainwright and Mr. Amos were elected vice-presidents, and the executive committee will consist of Reeve Rowdon, F. A. Sullivan, A. P. Landry, Geo. Martin, P. F. McEwen, Ambrose Murphy, A. D. Binny and Frank Lendrum. The secretary's report showed a balance on hand of \$29.62, with a bill of \$4.75 outstanding.

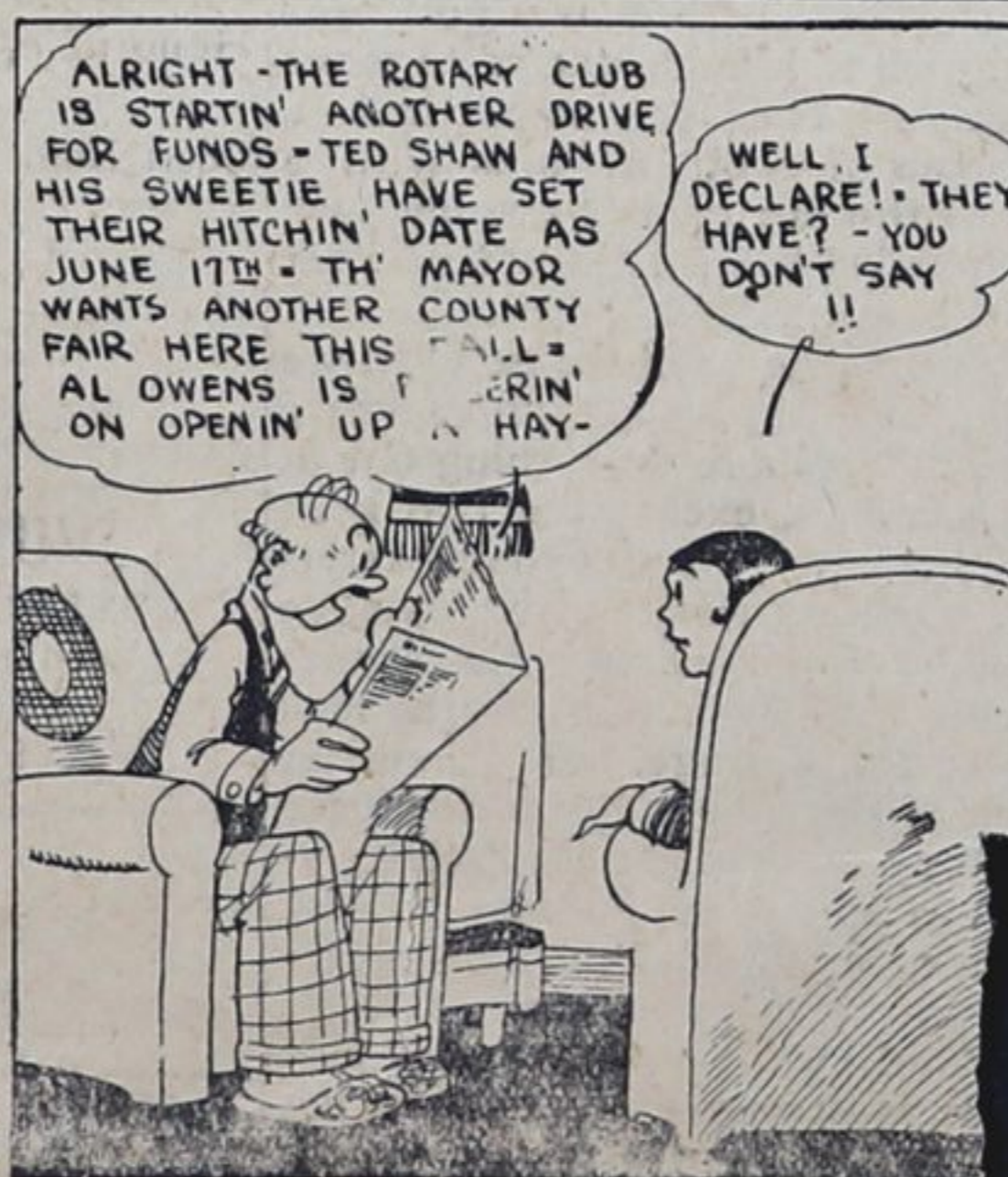
